





Six Month Round Up

John Snyder, Finance Committee Chair

he Finance Committee met July
15 and reviewed
and accepted the June
2010 financials for the

Association. For the month of June, overall operations were \$19,800 worse than budget. For the month, better than budget results of Maintenance \$11,600, Activities \$12,100, Food Services \$2,100, and Kilaga Springs Spa \$700 were offset by worse than budget results for Administration \$25,500, Landscape \$15,400 and Fitness \$5,400. Administration was over budget primarily as a result of non-recurring unbudgeted expenses while Landscape was over budget for the month, but under budget year-to-date (see next paragraph) as a result of certain activities being weather delayed.

Year-to-date operations were \$250,800 better than budget. Year-to-date better than budget results of Landscape \$153,000, Maintenance \$92,300, Food Services \$21,700 and Activities \$7,100, were offset by worse than budget results for Administration \$9,900, Fitness \$6,500 and Kilaga Springs Spa \$6,900.

Below is a schedule comparing the unaudited results of operation by segment for the six months ended June 30, 2010 and 2009.

This comparative schedule gives an overall perspective. Space does not permit a complete analysis of each segment's variance between periods. With the exception of Food & Beverage, which has experienced a significant positive turnaround chronicled here in the past, all segments are very close to the results for the same period of the

prior year. Landscape will be closer by year end as certain efforts scheduled in the first half of the year were weather delayed until the latter part of 2010.

These few words do not begin to tell the story as each segment has had numerous favorable and unfavorable events to which the managers and staff have had to react, measure, adjust, adapt and struggle in order to provide the best services and facilities at the best cost.

Periodically the Association reaches out to providers of selected services in an effort to keep current with the services provided by the industry and to measure incumbent providers of such services against the market. To this end the Association sent out a request for proposal for casualty insurance brokerage services to nine national and international firms. Six firms responded with lengthy and informative proposals which Staff and the Finance Committee reviewed. On July 8, the Finance Committee held a workshop where, along with Executive Director Bob Cook, the six proposals and the quality of services of existing providers were reviewed. After its review, the Committee concurred with Staff's recommendation to retain the services of Well Fargo Insurance Services, and to make that recommendation to the Board at its July 22 meeting.

> In October, the Committee will be interviewing applicants for membership to the Finance Committee. Applicants should have professional accounting and or management experience preferably in labor intensive service or related entities. 



Architectural Review Committee Update

Bi-Annual Report, Solar at SCLH, Neighbor Notification, Interior Fences and Walls

The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) had a relatively busy first

half of 2010 comprised of 12 meetings during which 499 applications were reviewed with the following outcome:

- 466 were approved
- 5 were not approved
- 28 were incomplete

Of the 499 applications reviewed, 295 applicants were present representing 59 percent of all applications submitted. Many of the applications that were incomplete or not approved were then resubmitted and approved.

Expedited Review Process for Solar Electrical Energy Systems Now in Place

The number of solar electrical energy systems reviewed for the period 2007 thru the first half of 2010 are as follows:

The expedited review process for solar energy systems is now in place where the Community Standards Director can approve the application provided the criteria listed on Checklist 24 of the Design Guidelines are met. If one or more of the criteria are not met, then the application will be submitted to the ARC for full review. Solar energy systems consist of solar electrical

panels, solar attic fans, and solar tubes for lighting.

Neighborhood Notification Form No Longer Required

The Neighbor Notification Form is no longer required and has been removed from the rack in the Business Office (OC) and replaced with a note stating that it is no longer required. The Design Guidelines will be modified at a later date to remove the statement that this form is a required document. When planning a project, particularly a major one, the homeowner should, as a courtesy, inform the appropriate neighbors as to what is going to take place and approximately when.

Interior Fences and Courtyard Walls

In the May issue of the *Compass*, we focused on fences constructed on property lines. This month we direct our attention to interior fences and courtyard walls.

First, interior fencing for the purpose of subdividing the back or side lot for use as a pet enclosure will not be permitted with the exception of the required fencing around pool areas. Specifications for fencing around pools will comply with the legal requirements spelled out in the construction permit from the city of Lincoln. If necessary, the ARC may grant waivers in fence height limitations in order to comply continued on page 11

If you do have written Bylaws or Guidelines you should:

• Review your Bylaws or Guidelines to be sure they agree with the new Club Guidelines approved by the Board on January 13, 2010.

If you don't have written Club Bylaws or Guidelines you still must:

• Have a written method for conducting elections.

Election reminder for all Clubs – Steering committee or election of officers should occur every two years (or every year if the Club chooses). The results must be reported on the Club contact form, with the appropriate meeting minutes, to the Senior Director of Lifestyle and Communications within 30 days of the election.

Remember there is a four-year limit for any individual to serve on a board or steering committee. They must take at least one year off after the four-year term is reached.

Elections can be conducted at regular meetings by a show of hands, written ballot or secret ballot. They may also be conducted via email or regular mail.

The next CCOC meeting will be September 7 at 1:00 PM in OC Lodge. Come share your ideas or just listen.

Only You Can Prevent... A Summer Hazard—Bark Fires

During our dry and hot months, May through October, there is an extreme safety hazard, not only along our busy main roads, but even in our yards.


That is burning ground cover bark. No, it does not spontaneously ignite. The source of ignition is almost always burning cigarettes discarded by thoughtless people in vehicles or by pedestrians. During June and July our maintenance staff, backed up by the Lincoln

Fire Department, has extinguished at least a half dozen ground cover bark fires. Fortunately, these were all caught before major damage took place. A while back, there was a bark fire in grounds of Orchard Creek Lodge; this fire burned a segment of plantings that required removal and replace-

ment of damaged plants. Not only are these events a danger to plants and humans, but they become expenses that contribute to maintenance costs covered by our homeowner dues. To date, we have not had a grass fire along our trails started by discarded cigarettes. However, we do see occasional cigarette stubs on or by trails. Smoking is prohibited on our trails. Please be alert to this hazard. For smokers, take great care with disposal of cigarettes. For non-smokers, tell your friends and neighbors about this problem.

An innovation called **Dial-MyCalls.Com** will be introduced where computer messages will be transmitted by telephone to residents who do not have a computer. A prepared list of

telephone numbers will be automatically dialed when safety and security messages need to be communicated. We know many of you do not use a computer, and this new system will eventually have a huge impact on the number of residents who receive Neighborhood Watch communications.

This is part of the WARN system (Wide Area Rapid Notification) where large areas can be notified by telephone within a brief

with the minimum legal requirements.

Courtyard walls are usually confined to the front of homes. The wall will be constructed of materials consistent with the materials used on the home. If the home has a stucco facade, the wall will be constructed with a stucco facade. If the home has a stone trim, then the wall will be constructed from stone. The color of the wall will match the color of the house body or trim color.

The courtyard wall will be set back a minimum of 12.5 feet from the inside edge of the city sidewalk. This will allow sufficient room between the wall and sidewalk for the Public Utilities Easement. The wall will not exceed four feet in height from the finished courtyard floor elevation. Pillars or pilasters will be no more than six inches higher than the wall height and pillar caps will not exceed two inches in height.

A wrought iron gate may be added at the entry point along the courtyard wall. The gate may have a paint color of black, brown, SW2929 green or blend with the existing paint color of the home. Double or single gates may be no wider than 48 inches with a maximum height of 48 inches. The gate will be no higher than six inches higher than the wall. A decorative arch at the center portion of the gate cannot exceed six inches above the ends of the gate.

To summarize, the ARC has been quite busy with current issues and the ongoing review of the projects planned by the residents of the Community. Members of the ARC are available to provide needed advice to members of the Community during the planning stages of their projects.

Aging Gracefully

Teeth & Pain Management: Two Subjects Addressed by Upcoming Forums

"The best part of the art of living is to know how to grow old gracefully." This quote from the social philosopher, Eric Hoffer, holds a rather profound truth. The series of articles that I have been writing for the last several months about "Aging Gracefully" have really been aimed at providing the necessary know-how to age with the quality of life that each of us desires. It is to this end that the Health Education Task Force has been searching out topics that can improve our knowledge about commonly faced issues in the aging process. Having that knowledge can be very empowering. Take every opportunity to educate yourself.

One issue that many of us perhaps do not think about in terms of our overall health and longevity is that of dental health. There is a fundamental question about whether poor oral health compromises




one's quality of life. Studies have shown that tooth loss can lead to malnutrition, poor quality of life, and can have serious negative psychosocial outcomes. Even the World Health Organization has weighed in on the

issue of tooth loss as a significant predictor of mortality. In plain English, maintain good oral health to enhance your chances of living longer. Prevent and/or get treated for dental carries (tooth decay); prevent or get treated for periodontal (gum) disease; prevent or get treated for mouth lesions, which may be precancerous or cancer; maintain good bone health by preventing or being treated for osteoporosis. Statistics have shown that people with periodontal disease are nearly 50% more likely to suffer from coronary artery disease than people without. Learn more about the relationship between dental health and your general health by attending the free Community Forum presentation called "The Whole Tooth...And Nothing But the Tooth!" by Dr. Larry Wilson, DMD, on August 18. 2-3 large ripe nectarines or peaches

1/4 cup English Cucumber (diced)

1 full chicken breast (grilled and sliced)

4 big handfuls of baby spinach

2 Tbls slivered almonds (toasted in oven @ 300° 4 minutes)

1 Tbsp. chopped shallots Oil to desired thickness (1/4 cup





The Compass Roving Reporter

They *Do* Let the Stars Get in Their Eyes, These Astronomers!

In the glow of the evening twilight, Venus was already brightly twinkling in the Lincoln sky, heralding the scheduled appearance of Mars and Saturn, which promised to form a straight line across the sky. We knew what to look for because we had just exited Kilaga Springs where the **Astronomy Group** had held its monthly meeting.

At this meeting, Steering Committee member Joel Thomas kicked off the evening's agenda with a brief but enlightening presentation on what an ordinary mortal without a telescope or binoculars could see in the night sky that week. Thanks to his informative talk, later that evening, as darkness framed thousands of celestial orbs, we found constellations such as Taurus, Leo, Perseus, and Virgo. Beauty and mathematical precision all served up in another feast of lights!

The featured speaker of the evening, geochemist and Lincoln Hills resident **John Neil**, offered a mind-flexing account

of some of the latest findings on asteroid impacts (in the Yucatan, for example). He explained how their association with the rare element Iridium confirms the location of asteroid impacts and, through geological dating, their possible contribution to momentous "paradigm shifts" such as the extinction of the dinosaurs. So that's why they all disappeared! This was no speech for feeble brains, but in language we scientific neophytes could comprehend, John deftly wove the geological threads of connection.

Meetings since then have been equally fascinating. In June, professional astronomer **David Wood** gave a "stellar" pre-

sentation on how the "Cosmic Distance Scale" enables astronomers to determine the distance

between Earth and stars, clusters, and galaxies that are billions of light years away. David and others form the Cosmology Interest Group (CIG), which meets monthly.

Not all gatherings of the Astronomy

Group are as brain-busting. For some simple old-fashioned outdoor fun, the Binocular Interest Group, conveniently knows as the BIG, schedules outings for novices and experts alike. In July, BIG observers witnessed a very slim Day One crescent Moon and nearby Mercury. Also visible were

Venus, Mars, and Saturn.

Of course, in the company of the technology-gifted group pictured on the *Compass* cover this month, you can view star clusters such as the "Engagement Ring," "Napoleon's Hat," and much more! Then, with just your naked eye in your backyard, you might check out the Perseids Meteor Shower, which peaked August 12-13, a light show that can feature up to 60 meteors per hour. But hurry! They're




already waning, and after August 22, they will be gone for this year.

Wouldn't you like to be better informed about the magnificent cosmos that surrounds us? And stimulate your brain cells with fascinating presentations? Or join the Astronomy Group for an occasional skywatching evening? Check your *Compass* or visit www.lhag.org for upcoming meetings, events, and information. "Beginners" are welcome! 


cart instead of returning to the shelves. Check the lost and found area by the printer – we sometimes find family photos, etc., in books.
