Important Aspects of Our Newly-Passed Budget

Board of Directors Report

On October 11, the 2011 budget for Sun City Lincoln Hills

Community Association was accepted by the Finance Committee, voted on and approved by the Board of Directors. A lot of time and effort was put forth by our management staff, members of the Finance Committee and Board of Directors to put this budget together. It includes both cost savings and increases.

After all of the budget reviews and presentations were completed, it comes out that our dues will be \$105.00 per month for 2011. This is an increase of \$2.00 per month after three years at \$103.00 per month. This works out to \$0.50 per month from budget year 2008 to 2011. This is less than the average inflation rate for the past four years. For comparison, if our dues stayed up with the annual inflation rate for the past 10 years, our dues world be at \$120.00 per month. So we are doing very well managing our finances. But let's take a look at the three key areas of the budget which are the operating fund, capital asset acquisitions and reserve funding.

The operating fund is what keeps the Association operating and working on a daily basis with paid employees along with the help of all of our volunteers. The operating cost for 2011 has been reduced by \$103,373 from the 2010 budget. This is very good savings by our management staff and shows

that they are always looking for a way to reduce operating costs.

Capital asset acquisitions for 2011 are up by \$83,838 from 2010. This cost will change from year to year based on the needs of the Association. All of these items for 2011 will increase revenues or will provide cost savings in the years ahead.

The reserve funding for next year

is an important element for the 2011 budget. The reserve fund is designed to take care of the future upkeep of the entire operation and



keep it all looking as beautiful tomorrow as it is today! By keeping all of our facilities looking great and working well adds to the value of our property. A lot of Homeowner Associations do not provide proper funding to their reserve fund and later find that a special assessment is required. A special assessment is detrimental for property values. There is a very good overview of the Reserve Fund in the Finance Committee report by John Snyder on page 7.

I would like to remind all of the members of the Association that when you pay for classes, events or services at the Fitness Center, Activities, Spa, Meridians, Sports Bar, Kilaga Springs Café or catering services that you are helping to keep our dues down. So please continue to use them when you can.




is done. If you have not received your CD with the budget and other mailing materials, it should arrive any day. A year ago we converted to the CD's from paper to save you significant expenses in printing and postage. The conversion also saves trees by using less paper. For those without a home computer we will still have traditional paper copies available at Orchard Creek Lodge. Staff is always excited to get the budget out of the way and begin to plan for the changes and improvements that come

This coming year you will notice a change in the area of capital improvements. As opposed to the reserves which replace existing capital assets, capital improvements are investments that enhance the community and/or reduce costs. The focus of three initiatives next year is projects that reduce costs. In the past few years these expenditures have been used to create additional amenities like Pickleball, the maintenance building, and the Sports Bar. Those initiatives that reduce costs are the conversion of all our pools and spas to a salt chlorination system, a trash compactor behind Meridians, and a reconditioned forklift for the Maintenance team. If you think about today's financial world this makes great sense. With interest rates so low, around one to two percent, a project that reduces costs by 10-25% a year is a much better investment. Those cost savings are reflected in the operating budgets and reduce upward pressure on dues.

We will continue to look for similar projects that make sense for our community. In 2011 we will be actively researching opportunities in the area of utilities. We all know what is happening to those costs. From LED street lights

What the 2011 Budget Means to You

September's Financials


The Finance Committee met October 21 and reviewed and accepted the September 2010 financials for the Association. For the month of September, overall operations were \$7,600 better than budget. For the month, better-than-budget results of Maintenance \$5,600, Food & Beverage \$2,300, Spa at Kilaga Springs \$2,000, Activities \$1,700 and Administration \$300, were offset by worse than budget results for Landscape \$3,700 (timing of expenses, see following) and Fitness \$600.

Year-to-date operations were \$294,200 better than budget. Year-to-date better than budget results of Landscape \$172,000, Maintenance \$81,400, Food Service \$31,500, Administration \$17,100, and Activities \$900 were offset by worse than budget results for Spa at Kilaga Springs \$6,600, and Fitness \$2,100.

Next Year's Budget Approved

At its fourth 2011 budget meeting on October 11, the Finance Committee accepted the 2011 budget for the Association and recommended approval by the Board of Directors. In a subsequent meeting, the Board unanimously approved the 2011 Budget. The budget calls for homeowner's dues of \$105 per month, an increase of \$2.00 or 1.94%. This is the first increase in three years. This outstanding accomplishment is the result of very diligent work by Staff, the

Board of Directors, its standing committees and the volunteers and Members



Assessing 1,100 Items in Reserve

by \$2.24 and \$1.03, respectively.

In 2010, the Association's reserve consultants, Robert Browning and Associates, performed a complete detailed on-site review. They perform this detailed review every three years, with updates done on off years. This review entailed the following tasks; a detailed listing of each component in the reserve (over 1100 items), the assessment of the condition of each component, its remaining life and a valuation of the cost to repair, replace or restore each component.

The results of this review indicated a net higher replacement cost and shorter lives on enough of the components that the reserve fund balance, and percent funded amount, while by no means at alarming or critical levels, were clearly at levels needing additional funding to maintain a strong

conservative position. Using the 30-year cash flow method as called for by State Law the Browning funding analysis indicated that a 2011 increased contribution of \$2.24 projects the Association to a very strong conservative position.

The decision, while difficult, was strategic and clearly indicated when one

considers the potential higher cost associated with delay. It insures continued strength in our reserves and should provide a high level of assurance to our Members.

Capital Asset Acquisitions

The capital asset acquisition portion of the monthly dues increased from \$.72 to \$1.75 or \$1.03. Each of the capital asset acquisitions has as its basis return on investment, Member lifestyle enhancement or operational safety and security.

Impressive Business Plans/Budgets

The presentations of business plans and budgets by Department Directors and Staff were the best in my five years on this Committee. Our Controller, Tim Mulligan, again, packaged the budget in a concise, precise and informative format. I know the Finance Committee was very impressed and wishes to thank one and all involved for their diligence, commitment and professionalism.

Powerful Committee Additions

On October 5, the Finance Committee interviewed candidates to fill an existing vacancy and two future vacancies in February 2011. The Committee selected three very qualified individuals, Mike Creasy, Molly Seamons and Jim Leonhard. Mike will be presented to the Board for acceptance in October 2010, while Molly and Jim will be presented to the Board in January 2011. These individuals are highly credentialed, bring a wealth of experience and I know will be significant and powerful additions to the Committee. Please give them hearty thanks for their commitment to the Association's well being.



Dear Running Rick, A great question! The standard across the US for indoor tracks is that the most inside lane is used for running. The outside lane is used for walking. So basically, from the inside lane to the outside lane the speed decreases. Here at Lincoln Hills we only have three lanes, so the outside is for walking and the inside for running. The middle lane can be used for passing or an intermediate speed. Sometimes a resident is not aware of this system so a gentle suggestion can be helpful. Also when groups of individuals get together to socialize while they walk it can cause walkers to end up in the running lane. As Bob has shown, good health and an expanded social life are two of the main benefits of exercising at SCLH. Keep up the good work, Bob!


Behind the Scenes



Neighbors InDeed Celebrates 10th Anniversary

the rattle and rumble of construction was

very much in the minds – and ears – of the new Lincoln Hills residents. Ubiquitous moving vans competed with construction trucks. The community was growing fast in late 1999, and so were people's needs.

"As more people moved into Lincoln Hills, we began to notice that some had health and physical issues," noted Marcia Van Wagner, an early mover and shaker seeking to help others, "so a few of us met to form support groups for those in need." The seeds were planted for what was soon to become **Neighbors InDeed** (NID).

Last month, NID celebrated ten years of serving as a highly successful grass roots organization. At a recent potluck, President Joan Brant-Love presented a cake to honor the occasion and congratulated those present for a decade of amazing accomplishments.

One of the earliest support groups, the **Sunshine Committee**, led by Kathy Himmelhoch, offered get-well cards, ran errands, and shared advice on medical care. More support groups blossomed: the Sunshine Committee became the Support Group, and then the Support Team, led by Shirley Schultz, Judith Jogis, and Joan Logue.

Soon Lincoln Hills residents numbered in the thousands, with multiplying needs. With the goal of creating a



network of resources for the growing community, Charlotte Fisher, Kay Birkholz, Maggie Forte, Jean Ebenholtz, and Marcia Van Wagner engaged in some lengthy discussions. (See photo below.)

The outcome was the incorporation of NID, with Kay as the first president.

Under the new aegis, three purposes were accomplished:

- **1. Handy Helpers**, who had been actively assisting in minor home maintenance and repair jobs, became an official part of NID.
- **2. Information and Referrals** on services and agencies were catalogued, at first in large binders but today the data is computer-managed.
- 3. Health support groups were consolidated and the **Medical Equipment Loan Program** was established to provide temporary medical equipment loans to residents.

Jean Ebenholtz recalled those early days. "One of the first steps we took was to obtain a cell phone – the same number we have now, 223-2763. Whenever the phone rang, we were very excited. Perhaps eight calls a month. Compare that to the present numbers... in the hundreds! But it was a beginning."

As NID celebrates its 10th anniversary this year, it proudly claims over 120 volunteers serving in a systematized network. Thanks for the leadership of Kay Birkholtz, Charlotte Fisher, John Flaherty, and Joan Brant-Love over this span of time!

We raise a glass to the movers and shakers for their perseverance and compassion in helping SCLH become such an amazing community! And if you have needs that NID can meet, call 223-2763.



A Walk in History McBean Park Expansion Al Roten

We have all driven Ferrari Ranch Road between Highways 193 and 65. Op-

posite Lincoln Hills is a walking trail and wetlands adjacent to the Auburn Ravine waterway. This area is city property designated McBean Park Expansion. With just a little bit of research and imagination, we find this to be an interesting tract in history.

In 1849, Claude Chana, in search of gold with an entourage of workers, was on a trek to Sutter's Mill in what is now Coloma. Coming from the Wheatland area, they followed Auburn Ravine from the Lincoln area and camped overnight near Auburn. Chana noticed something glittering in the channel — and the Gold Rush in Auburn and on to the Lincoln area was on! Subsequently, Auburn Ravine waterway was incorporated

into the Nevada Irrigation District channel system bringing agricultural and pros-

ral reclaimed mitigation wetlands be created. So, the approximately 60 acres between Ferrari Ranch Road and Auburn Ravine were restored to their natural condition and deeded to the city of Lincoln. What was a typical ranch yard, replete with rusting vehicles and farm equipment, became the pristine natural habitat we see today. Between

2001 and 2004, thousands of yards of earth were excavated from the project area and were used in construction of Lincoln Hills. The park expansion area was designed both as a flood control area to drain off excess water from Auburn Ravine during heavy rain periods and as a wetland refuge for Steelhead Trout and salmon species fingerlings. The young fish can stay in this protected environment until

they grow mature enough for their trip to the sea. The accompanying photos show a trail sign by ranch remnants, new plantings in reclaimed wetland, and healthy wetlands of today.

Like all our Open Space preserves, this wetland is under control of U.S. Corps of Engineers and the California Fish and Wildlife Commission. Monitoring of the health of this important natural resource has been entrusted to the Wildlife Heritage Foundation via a perpetual easement. So, we may enjoy this renewal project, but must stay on provided trails as we do so.

A walk on the paved level trail running by Ferrari Ranch Road is an enjoyable thing to do. The city of Lincoln has placed seven information plaques along the way. Reviewing these will provide interesting tidbits on history, fauna and flora of this valuable resource.

The Advance Directive is a set of instructions given by individuals speci-

fying what actions should be taken for your health when you cannot speak for yourself, due to illness or incapacity, and appoints a person to make such decisions on your behalf. You name someone *in advance*, while you are healthy and in control of every aspect of your life, to speak for you.

On this simple document signed by you, you're able to file with your medical care provider and your family...

- the person you want to make care decisions for you when you can't
- the kind of medical treatment you want or don't want
