Let me focus this article on urging each one of you to attend one of the three up-

coming Board of Director's Candidate Forums. Our Association is preparing to elect four candidates to replace those cur-

rent Board members with two-year terms expiring. This could mean a majority of all new Directors.

Some residents were disappointed that the Candidate Forums normally offered were not held prior to the last elec-

tion even though the number of candidates equaled the open positions. As a result, the Elections Committee has decided that a Forum will take place regardless of the number of candidates.

These Forums are your opportunity to listen to candidates answering formal questions posed to them by an Elections Committee and allowing you to see how they handle themselves with unexpected challenges.

I urge you to not choose on personality but on level-headed responses. Remember, it is at the Board level that decisions are made affecting finances and ultimately your dues and how they are spent.

I am pleased to say that our Association is in excellent financial condition and our property and buildings are well maintained and that has happened with no dues increases for a number of years.

We are blessed with excellent expertise in members of our Finance and Properties Committees and their well thought-out recommendations to the Board on their

findings.

It still means that the "buck stops here" at Board level (as President Truman said). On that point, in my tenure on the Board, some past recommendations have been sent back because they were

too expensive or problematic. We have asked for new architectural approaches or to get new bids.

This shows that every Board should never "rubber stamp" everything sent. It reinforces the Board's fiduciary responsibilities which must overshadow what would be nice to have.

This election may bring four new faces to the Board, so I hope you will continue to vote accordingly as you have in the past and elect a Board that will continue to maintain our sound financial structure, our outstanding picturesque image, and at the lowest dues possible.

I believe that it is your wish for this to never change.

## What is Happening in our Open Space and...?

Bob Cook, SCLH Executive Director

I often receive questions about what is happening in, and what projects are planned for, our Open Space areas. It is

clear to me from the feedback I get that our preserves are viewed as our greatest asset by many. Here is an update of ongoing activities there.

As you know, we cut the firebreaks every year. Recently with the assistance of the Wildlife Heritage Foundation, we have begun testing various seed mixes in these fire break areas. The goal is to provide lower growing vegetation and more indigenes wildflowers – all compatible with soil conditions that exist. We had mixed results this spring in the test areas and will continue to try new seed mixes.

Chris O'Keefe and his team are looking into adding appropriate trees to the area. As they mature the trees will provide shade and additional wildlife habitat This may come to fruition as we get a better picture of the irrigation issues. Providing water to any new planting in a cost effective and environmentally sensitive way is the key. We

are all hopeful that we can make this work.

You will be seeing activities around the areas affected by the large blackberry bushes. The blackberries are highly intrusive and need to be controlled. Unfortunately the sheep and goats have more tasty things to eat so we need to deal with it manually. Speaking of the sheep and goats, they will be back. Residents may not see them as often next year. Everyone enjoys them, especially during lambing season. Currently we are trying to determine if there is any connection between the animals and a resurgence of Star Thistle. The Star Thistle may be a result of our wet spring, and we need to watch it.

Lastly, I have a request. On a number of occasions, the Maintenance team has been requested to trim behind homes after the fire breaks have been completed. With few exceptions, this service at a cost to the entire membership resulted from either yard irrigation overspray or leaking water features. So as summer turns to fall and as you start turning down your sprinklers and/ or water features, please continually check for overwatering and/or leakage.

## YTD Financials Continue Better Than Budget

The Finance Committee met September

16 and reviewed and accepted the August 2010, financials for the Association. For the month of August, overall operations were \$3,900 worse than budget. For the month, better than budget results of, (Now Pay Attention)



Food & Beverage \$19,000, and Administration \$3,100, were offset by worse than budget results for Landscape \$9,300, Maintenance \$6,700, Fitness \$5,700, Activities \$3,000 and Spa at Kilaga Springs \$1,300.

Year-to-date (YTD) operations were \$286,500 better than budget. Year-to-date better than budget results of Landscape \$175,600, Maintenance \$75,800, Administration \$16,700, and Food Services \$29,200, were offset by worse than budget results for Fitness \$1,500, Activities \$700, and Spa at Kilaga Springs \$8,600.

To date, the Committee has attended two of four scheduled 2011 Budget presentations. It has been a pleasure. In my five years of being involved, the Department Directors and Managers did the very best business plan and budget presentations ever. We are lucky to have such committed, capable and professional individuals on staff.

The monthly and year-to-date financial statements are available on the Association's website under Document Library/Financial.

The next regularly scheduled Finance Committee meeting will be held on Thursday October 21 at 9:00 AM. The final 2011, Budget meetings were held at 9:00 AM on October 11. My November article will advise you of the outcome.



### Roasted Salmon with Caramelized Cauliflower & Fennel Fettuccini w/ Pistachio Pesto

- (4) 5-6 oz salmon fillets
- (1) fennel bulb
- (4) leaves of sage (chiffanade)
- (1/2) Tbl garlic (chopped)
- (1) small head of cauliflower
- (1) lb of cooked fettuccini
- (1) Tbl butter

Slice fennel & cauliflower into ½ inch strips. In a hot sauté pan add a tsp oil (your choice) and sauté on high heat, fennel first and when it gets a little color add the cauliflower. Season the mixture with salt & pepper. Continue to sauté stirring constantly making sure not to burn. When cauliflower looks to be done (the smaller pieces of cauliflower will start to mush), add the butter, garlic and sage and toss with mixture and set aside. Boil fettuccini and toss with just a little of the pesto. Cook your salmon fillets (roasted, poached, or grilled). On a plate or bowl, put down your fettuccini, top with fennel and cauliflower mixture, place salmon on top and finish with a Tbl of the pesto.

- (1/2) cup parmesan
- (1/2) cup pistachio
- (1) cup olive oil

pools and hot tubs (outdoor pools as well). The Board gave its approval of this Capital Asset Request at its September Board meeting. We will make the conversion in December. This conversion will coincide with our regular annual maintenance so there will be no additional down time of the pools. There are many great benefits the Association and its residents will reap with this conversion. Health benefits include less irritation to skin, eyes, hair, and airways. With salt water systems there are no harsh additives added to the chemical chlorine as the chlorine comes from the breakdown of salt. People who suffer from asthma or allergies may be able to use the pools as this type of system is more suitable. Gone will be the days of smelling like chlorine after your water class or laps; the salt system will almost completely eliminate that smell. The cost of salt is much cheaper than the cost of chemicals used in the current system. Those toxic and dangerous chemicals which need to be stored on site will no longer have to be thus creating a safer work area. Swimsuits will last longer in a salt water system so there will be some savings to the regular users. We are very excited about this conversion and look forward to seeing all the residents enjoy this fantastic improvement come 2011!







### **Neighborhood Watch**

### **An Ounce of Prevention!**

"An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" as the old saying goes. Probably we learned this at our mother's knee, and it is still true.



We recently received an email from a Village Coordinator enumerating a number of questions from the residents. They want to know why we keep Residents' Lists, promote the Vial of Life, and have block

get-togethers. Do we have anecdotal evidence that we have prevented crimes or saved a resident from a medical emergency?

We appreciate your assistance in helping us answer these questions. Please share instances in your neighborhood where you or your neighbors have assisted each other. Please contact me at 408-2307 or send an email to pevans318@aol.com.

Our present response to these questions is that we hope that our "ounce of prevention" forestalls or mitigates as many problems as possible, but it is very difficult to establish what number of incidents have been avoided. Sometimes we just need to use good judgment and go on faith that what we are doing makes sense. Neighborhood Watch feels that encouraging neighbors to become acquainted, and knowing their emergency information, usually gives us the capability to handle problems before they reach a crisis. Take medical emergencies for instance. Even though medical emergencies — where we need to assist a neighbor — may be rare, if you're the one with an emergency and your neighbor comes to your aid, it is 100% an incident!

Being prepared is like having fire insurance. Even though, to my knowledge, there have only been two residential fires in SCLH which did serious damage, we know we would be foolish to be without fire insurance. We know we need to be prepared



to handle the unexpected. By the same token, we know that our Lincoln Police Department provides safety by their mere existence. When the LPD has to reduce their force, we all feel more vulnerable. The LPD frequently tells us that they depend upon all of us to be "the eyes and ears of the police" in our neighborhood.

At the very least, when neighbors are friendly and know each other it makes a warm and comfortable atmosphere. Liv-

Neighborhoods where residents are aware of the usual habits of their neighbors set up an invisible defense screen which criminals prefer to avoid. Knowing when our neighbors are out of town protects their property and yours, as well.

When seniors look for a retirement area, their first consideration is safety and security where they can relax and enjoy all the amenities of the good life. When you contribute to the safety and security of our area, you are protecting the value of your property!



### **Aging Gracefully**

### **Your Future Health Care**

While reading through the *Medicare* & You 2010 manual from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, the re-



current question that came to mind is, "What changes have been made by the new Affordable Care Act of 2011?" One thing I realized is that I really do not know the details of what is in the Medicare 2010 manual let alone what

is in the new health care legislation. Most likely I am not alone in this. On November 3, guest speaker, Margaret Reilly, will discuss the new legislation that is predictably going to affect all of us in some way. (See page 77.) To prepare for the talk, it might be helpful to take a bird's eye view of the categories that Medicare currently covers. Even though the categories are listed below, one must read the parameters and limitations to determine if Medicare actually covers certain things in your individual case and how much out-of-pocket cost you can expect. If you do not have a copy of the official government handbook called Medicare & You 2010, you can obtain one by calling 1-800-633-4227.

Currently, *Medicare Part A* covers certain costs for hospital inpatient stays, blood, home health care, Hospice care, and Skilled Nursing Facility Care. *Medicare Part B* helps cover medically-necessary doctor's services, outpatient care, home health services, some preventive services, and other medical services. Although most citizens automatically start receiving Part A starting the first day of the month in which they turn 65, there are some who must sign up for it such as those who are

not receiving benefits from Social Security or Railroad Retirement Board (RRB). The same holds true for Medicare Part B. but there are special rules that govern Part B as to when you can sign up for it and what penalties will affect you if you do not meet these requirements. Currently, your costs for Part B depend on whether you are on Original Medicare or whether you join a Medicare Advantage Plan (called Medicare Part C) such as an HMO. Your costs are also affected by whether or not you have other health insurance called a Medigap policy. Medicare Part D is available to everyone with Medicare if you join a plan run by an insurance company or other private company approved by Medicare, and each plan may vary in cost and drugs covered.

Part D is not necessarily the cheapest nor the most efficient way to obtain your prescription drugs.

One of the areas that I find especially confusing is that of Home Health Care. Many people cannot rely on Medicare for this because it is part-time or intermittent and **requires that you must be home-bound**. Often supplemental insurance policies or Medigap policies do not fully cover home health care. Plan to attend the upcoming Community Forum, *The A, B, C...* and *D's of Medicare*, to become educated about how you will meet your health care needs in the future under the new national health care legislation.



## The Compass Roving Reporter Calling All Car

o there I was, sitting in the Lincoln Hills Patrol car, a 2008 Dodge Charger. It is the only car used by the three rotating shifts of operators of the Security Service for Lincoln Hills. (See, the headline is not a typo.)

After signing the standard waiver form, Lt. Patrick McElroy, a two-year veteran and I were off and running. Patrick started explaining his duties and what he could and couldn't do. Patrick told me that most people have the wrong idea about the

Security Service, "they look at us as police officers, and we are not" he stated.

He does not carry a weapon, cannot make arrests and his main job is enforcing safety issues. He stressed this several times as we stopped at the small parks and trails that surround our community. When his view was obstructed in the car, he would vacate the vehicle and walk around to get a view of the hills. He was looking for fires or possibly people who may have fallen.

He did mention that if he saw someone who didn't seem to fit into the picture, he would interview them and make sure all was okay. He was clear that he was not

there to irritate or bother them. It was evident to me that Patrick was the type of person who gets along with people and enjoyed meeting them.

The Security Service runs two shifts from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM and from 5:00 PM to 1:00 AM daily. As we drove up Del Webb Boulevard, he noticed a street sign had been knocked down. He got out, photographed it and reported it to the city. He is locked in by radio to Lincoln Hills and the fire and police departments. In case of a local catastrophe, he is ready to assist in crowd control or

any way he may be needed. He has had anti terrorist training and is very familiar with Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation, CPR, and Automatic External Defibrillator, AED usage.



Patrick was very adamant about the residents helping themselves out by making sure their garages are closed during the day and at night, and to keep an eye out in their neighborhoods for anything suspicious. Usually the call that something is wrong is made after the fact.

One thing is clear, the man is dedicated to his job, your protection and your well being to the point of even loving your pets. If he runs across a stray dog or cat, he takes it to his home and cares for it until he can locate the owner or contact the proper authority.

Personally, I felt a great relief that a good man was watching over Lincoln Hills each day. If you have an emergency, call 911. If you have matters of trespassing, fire or any local problem, you can call the security number 1-800-983-1932. Patrick said that most small problems can be handled within five to ten minutes response time.
