Board of Directors' Report

Denny Valentine, Director, SCLH Board of Directors

his article represents my final *Compass* article as a member of the SCLH Board as I will finish my fifth year on the Board this winter. Serving the members of this Association has been a truly rewarding experience. It has also provided an opportunity to serve with some truly outstanding people including fellow Board members, committee chairs and members along with our wonderful and capable staff.

Attendance at the September Board meeting was at an all time low. This can be interpreted as reflecting far greater member satisfaction with Association operations or as a dwindling interest among our members. In response to the latter I would point out that through the committee reports there was as much new and exciting information presented as in any Board meeting in recent memory. For those not having attended a meeting in a while you should be aware that oral reports are now presented with graphs and text shown on our two overhead screens for easier comprehension by the audience.

Matters presented of significant interest to our members include the Finance Committee reporting a very positive cash to expenditure position year-to-date along with very strong 2011 budget presentations by Departments. This year



for the first time, annual business plans illuminated what is planned and expected for the coming year. Properties Committee spoke on 2011 Capital Asset Acquisitions Requests for trash and cardboard compactors to clean up the area in back of the kitchen, salt water systems to replace chlorine in all the pools and an interior security camera system. Also an Alternative Energy Task Force is investigating the potential of solar or other technologies to offset electricity rates currently paid to PG&E at the Orchard Creek Lodge. The Communications and Community Relations Committee reported positive feedback on the public website launched August 1 and intentions to integrate it with our private website with secure log-ins for our members.

As you can see, there continues to be a lot happening in our Association and I invite each and every one of you to become a part of it.



The Bermuda Triangle of Community Standards

As announced in last month's *Compass*, articles about SCLH community standards will rotate month-

ly between the ARC Chair, the Compliance Committee Chair (yours truly), and the Community Standards Director. I consider the three of us (and our Committee members) to constitute *The Bermuda Triangle of Community Standards ("TBTOCS")*. You may recall that the actual "Bermuda Triangle" was a location in the Atlantic Ocean where many planes and vessels disappeared



mysteriously without a trace. Fortunately, residents who enter our Bermuda Triangle do not suffer that fate but emerge with a greater understanding and appreciation of the rules that govern our lives in Lincoln Hills.

For new residents and for those who have not encountered "TBTOCS," a short description of how each of the three sides of the triangle works may be in order.

ARC (Architectural Review Committee) does exactly what its name says – it reviews proposed alterations or additions to your property and determines if the proposal meets the requirements of our governing documents. After reviewing your plans, ARC may either approve them, reject them, or ask for further information. The most important advice for a homeowner is to submit an application to ARC *before* starting any project.

Compliance Committee also has an appropriate name – it enforces the requirements of our governing documents by seeking compliance. It does so by first giving notices to homeowners of alleged violations, and if compliance is not reached at this point, calls the homeowner to a hearing where the matter may be fully discussed. The Committee may close the case because compliance has been reached, it may defer the matter to allow more time for compliance, or it may refer the case to

the Board of Directors with a recommendation for a fine or other penalty.

Director of Community Standards (DCS): Unlike the two Committees which are made up of volunteer residents, the DCS is a staff person who acts as liaison to both ARC and Compliance. He acts as a "first responder" for both Committees. If a resident needs information when planning a project, DCS can advise of the proper provisions of the governing documents that apply, can direct to the proper forms

for applying to ARC, and can assist in processing the application. If a resident wishes to lodge a complaint about a person or a property who he or she believes to be in violation of the governing documents, the DCS should be given all the details so that notices and/or hearings before the Compliance Committee can be arranged.

Some people may recall that the alternate name of the Bermuda Triangle is the "Devil's Triangle." I'm sure that if you have dealings with any of the sides of our "Bermuda Triangle," you will find the alternate name does not fit and that your experience will, hopefully, be more heavenly.

July Financials Better Than Budget

Applications due today for Finance Committee

The Finance Committee met August 19 and reviewed and accepted the July 2010 financials for the Association. For the month of July, overall operations were \$39,600 better than budget. For the month, better than budget results of Landscape \$31,800, Administration \$23,500, and Fitness \$10,700, were offset by worse than budget results for Food & Beverage \$11,300, Maintenance \$9,800, Activities \$4,900 and the Spa at Kilaga Springs \$400.

Year-to-date operations were \$290,500 better than budget. Year-to-date better than budget results of Landscape \$184,900, Maintenance \$82,500, Administration \$13,600, Food Services \$10,400, Fitness \$4,200 and Activities \$2,200, were offset by worse than budget results for the Spa at Kilaga Springs \$7,300.

In October, the Committee will be

interviewing applicants for membership to the Finance Committee. Applicants should have pro-



fessional accounting and or management experience preferably in labor intensive service or related entities. Application forms are available at the Membership Desk and on the Association website. Please return the completed form to the Membership Desk no later than September 15.

The monthly and year-to-date financial statements are available on the Association's website under Document Library/Financial.

The next regularly scheduled Finance Committee meeting will be held on Thursday September 16, 2010 at 10:00 AM. The second and third 2011 Budget meetings will be held at 9:00 AM on September 21 and 30 respectively.





Committee Profile Car 54, Where Are You?

Compliance Committee

I fondly recall "Car 54, Where Are You," the 1960's TV show with big hearted Gunther Toody and Francis

Muldoon who lovingly patrolled the Bronx.

Prior to my interview with Compliance Committee Chair David Stone, I had imagined that our Compliance Committee volunteers similarly took loving care of our community. In fact, my imagination soared and I pictured them driving little black and white Volkswagen "geek" bugs as they patrolled our neighborhoods.

I was wrong, wrong, wrong!

Our Compliance Committee does not police our community. No, they are not out to get us! We may stop those rumors right here!

Compliance issues are brought to the attention of our Director of Community Standards, Steve O'Rourke. He observes them or is informed of issues by residents. The Committee, using information provided by Steve, endeavors to bring the homeowner into compliance.

Normally, after two notices if the homeowner has not corrected an issue, the case is brought before the Compliance Committee.

Common issues include "naughty" pets, prohibited yard decorations, unapproved yard installations (they may be within the guidelines but ARC approval was not obtained), maintenance issues, and miscellaneous items such as noise or nuisance concerns.

To my delight, I learned that in working with these issues, the Compliance Committee is founded on communication and seeking a solution which is compliant with the governing documents.

Communication is an indispensable component for this committee. When researching cases, it is not unusual to find that a noncompliance issue does not exist but rather, it is a situation where neighbors need assistance communicating.

Also, just one letter from the Community Standards Department may communicate to the homeowner a CC&R issue they were unaware of; hence, it is remedied quickly.

Confidentiality is a priority for this dedicated group. Committee members treat all cases with confidentiality during, and outside of, meetings.

Hearings are open sessions unless the

homeowner requests in writing that they wish a closed session. This private session request is always respected. As a Committee member noted, the Committee handles their responsibilities with compassion and respect.

The goal of Committee members is compliance, not fines. They may however recommend fines or other action to the Board of Directors for cases which remain unresolved.

I attended the August meeting and immediately felt an upbeat, positive, atmosphere. The Committee members were knowledgeable and open for discussion.

Our current Compliance Committee members, David Stone, Chair, George Glaush, Vice Chair, Shirley Ludwico, Dan Larsen, Mike Guantone, Janet Baugh, John Glynn, enjoy the benefits of their volunteer work.

If you were on this Committee, you too would be communicating with residents, problem solving to improve life in our neighborhoods, educating homeowners,

Happy 50th Del Webb!

hat, you might ask, is the importance of acknowledging a builder and a name? In search for this answer, I did a quick, unscientific poll, of approximately 50 homeowners. I asked them, "why did you buy in Sun City Lincoln Hills?" and "what role, if any, did our being a Del Webb community play in your decision to purchase?" The reasons for buying here were varied; however, being a Sun City by Del Webb community represents a legacy of quality and community and to the question of the name as an influence, I received a resounding, "Yes!"

Del Webb 1899-1974: Born in Fresno, California, Del learned carpentry as a hobby when he was a young child. Like his father, he was passionate about baseball and began playing at an early age. Later he went to work as a carpenter's apprentice, trading an academic career for life as a carpenter and base-



ball player. Typhoid fever ended his dreams of becoming a professional baseball player and he concentrated on his carpentry skills. He went on to build several casinos, high rises, hospitals, and communities. He began moving forward at a fast pace, keeping up with the times — perhaps even ahead of the times. In 1945, Del became an owner of the New York Yankees, purchased for \$2.8 million. He became well respected and powerful in baseball because, in part, he brought sound business principles to the sport. After winning 10 World Series, he sold the Yankees in 1965 for \$14 million to CBS.

The year 1960: The Original Sun City was developed between 1960-1978 consisting of 26,000 homes and approximately 46,000 people. In order for Del Webb continued on page 33

Aging Gracefully

End of Life Decisions Shirley Schultz

With every journey, there is a beginning and an end. We are all on a journey through life, and, like it or not, each of us, at least in the physical sense, will one day cross the finish line. Every day is a day closer to that finish line. We all have gone on a journey before, and we generally do a considerable amount of planning beforehand to make sure that we get to the destination. At least, we know what the destination is and we have plans about how we will get there, about what we will do along the way, and what will be our contingency plans if we cannot follow what we had mapped out. Why is it then, that in this journey through life, we find it so very difficult to make plans for the end of our journey to make sure that we reach the finish line in the way that we want?

Our social norm is to **not talk** about end-of- life issues, to **not talk** about death and dying. Yet, barring a strike by lightening, almost every one of us will have to deal with those issues in some fashion. Modern medicine offers us many options for prolonging the inevitable. Each day we are dying a little, and there are many different choices that we may need to make — or someone else will need to make for us — about what kind of health care we want or do not want that will directly impact our quality of life. You can tell others what your decisions are with an Ad-

vance Directive that includes a living will and appointment of someone to speak for you in the event that you cannot speak for yourself. You can communicate your decision about whether you want the "works" to keep you alive



(curative care) or whether you want only that care which will keep you comfortable (palliative care).

You owe it to yourself and your family to attend to these issues.

A famous pioneer in bringing the process of death and dying to the forefront is Elisabeth Kubler-Ross, MD. If you have difficulty thinking about or talking about the final stage of your life, consider reading some of the information from this doctor including her quotes or her book, *Death: The Final Stage*

of Growth. Her writings, based on research, are full of insight, positivity, and hope when it comes to helping us understand the end of life process.


Grandkids Take Over Orchard Creek Lodge Second Annual Camp Another Success

Corporation to deliver a complete and functioning town, it conformed to three basic concepts: Activity, Economy, and Individuality. Much research was done prior to building Sun City that included utilizing many specialists of the day. The grand opening was New Year's Day, 1960. The amenities were in place as well as five carefully appointed model homes. Ten thousand people were expected for opening day. At the end of the day, 100,000 people had shown up! Sun City sold 400 homes in its first month.

Was the idea of Sun City a supernova in the real estate development world? Fifty years ago, people were skeptical of such an undertaking and questioned, for instance, how to sell a 35-year mortgage to a 65-year-old man; and would the owners die faster than new ones could move in? Today we know it as a fantastic real estate explosion whose time had come.

Del Webb died July 4, 1974. His legacy

and visions live on. The Corporation built several more Sun Cities, and recreational properties. In 1987, Del Webb Corporation divested itself of all activities except real estate development, specializing in adult communities. In 2002, Del Webb Corporation sold to Pulte Homes, Inc.

Construction of Sun City Lincoln Hills began in 1999, and represents the departure from previous communities located only in the year-round Sun Belt areas. Northern CA offers a mild, four-season





location and supports the research that shows pre and early baby boomer retirees much prefer to be closer to their families.

fire fuels is cited as a success which should be continued. Invasion by beavers continues to be a challenge. Management of the beaver population is critical to protection of the wetlands and maintenance of the small remnant of trees in our Open Spaces—and sometimes in residents' yards. Several years ago we obtained permission to implement an eradication program for Yellow Starthistle, a non-native plant that has invaded much of California. Our preserve areas still have a small scattered population of this noxious plant, but growth is controlled by selective spraying and hand pulling. Since seeds of this plant can survive for years before sprouting, control is a long-term project.

Three other non-native weeds were pointed out for control: Stinkwort, Rush skeletonweed, and Klamathweed (also known as St. Johnswort). Stinkwort and Rush skeleton are members of the sunflower family. These weeds like damper areas although Klamathweed will also flourish in dry areas. Our Facilities Department was provided Open Space maps with infestations of these weeds noted. It is interesting how such weeds migrate to new areas. Nature

has provided them with the ability to have seeds carried on the winds, on animals or humans, or by passing through the digestive systems of migrating birds or other animals. Our facilities staff has reviewed the biologist's report and made site inspections for all locations listed. Schedules have been prepared to address these areas, taking into consideration seasonal aspects of these plant's lives.

It is interesting to note that the biologist's report list more than 110 plant types within our preserve areas, almost 90 bird varieties, and several mammals which have been observed during site inspections. During the presentation to our Board, a question was asked about the current proliferation of voles (also known as meadow mice) that seem to be eating our lawns and shrubs. Dr. Shea told us that these creatures grow in three-year cycles and that this is a banner year. Between the predators that consume voles and the natural cycle, we should see them become a much lesser problem soon.

So, enjoy using our trails and the sights of our wonderful connection with nature. Just leave the care of the Open Space preserve areas to our Facilities Department and consider what a privilege it is to have these resources at hand.


