Three of the seven positions on our Board of Directors

are up for election this year. Get ready to meet the great people who have volunteered their candidacy to vie for the Homeowners' Association Board of Directors seats to be filled on February 16, 2012. An exceptional panel of five candidates has filed to compete for these three seats.

Outgoing from our Board are Peter Gilbert and Bill Kassel, who have served admirably for the past four years and must step down in accordance with our Association Bylaws. Two well qualified residents, who have been active in varied aspects of Lincoln Hills life have placed their names in candidacy: Gay Mackintosh is currently serving as chair of the Properties Committee, and Mar-

cia VanWagner has served a President of the Lincoln Hills Foundation. Gary Younger is an incumbent Director who is eligible for re-election and is running to serve a second two year term. Both Ken Silverman and Denny Valentine have previously served as Directors and, after taking appropriate leave, are ready to again serve on our behalf if elected. We thank all of these fine people for their willingness to serve on our governing board.

It will be up to us as voters to select three of this panel of five to serve for the next two years as Directors. We can do this only by getting to know these volunteers and understanding how they intend to participate in the governance process. During January there will be three forum sessions in which these

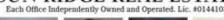

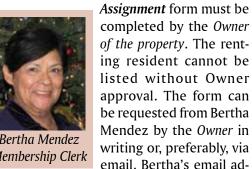

Holiday Cheer & Good Financial Results

Hank Lipschitz, Finance Committee Chair

During this holiday season we have much to be thankful for. We live in a wonderful community that is well run and financially strong. At the November



16 Finance Committee Meeting we received the October financial report from your Association staff and our results continue to be outstanding. It may seem like I am repeating myself each

month but we seem to only have good news to report. What a problem! October results were \$73,561 better than budget, bringing the net for 10 months to \$453,122 ahead of Budget. Food & Beverage and The Spa at Kilaga Springs

turned a profit in the month of \$21,253 and \$865 respectively. In addition, all other departments were at or ahead of budget for the month. All the members of our Staff deserve a special recognition for their fine work making Sun City Lincoln Hills such a great place to live and keeping our expenses down.

Please note that effective January 1 your Association dues will decrease to \$104 per month and you should adjust your payments accordingly. If you have enrolled in the Association ACH payment method the amounts will be automatically adjusted.

As of October 31, we had \$4,680,468 in our Operating Fund which includes \$588,012 in restricted cash and our Reserve Fund showed a balance of \$5,523,100. Virtually all of our funds are in FDIC insured accounts or US Treasuries according to our policy.

Following our normal pattern, we had 280 homes with past due assessments totaling \$150,000, compared to

the prior month's 138 homes owing \$103,000.

As I mentioned last month, we are looking for a volunteer to fill an opening on our Finance Committee. We will be conducting interviews in January and If you have

an interest in helping our community and can dedicate the time we would like to hear from you. Having a business or financial background would be ideal but we consider all candidates that feel they can contribute to maintaining the financial health of our Association. The year 2011 is almost over. Were there things you thought of doing but just put off and now it's too late? Then you have time in 2012 to do those projects; but it takes some thought and planning.

The spring of 2012 is just around the corner. Thinking of going solar? A solar project takes more than just a few weeks or even months. You must first find the best deal. Interview different solar companies and decide if you want to buy or lease. Whoever you select will then design a system for your roof. The design must be approved by the city of Lincoln and the Sun City Lincoln Hills Architectural Review Committee (ARC). The Committee expedites your application so approval takes only two or three days. Next comes installation followed by inspections by the city of Lincoln and PG&E, our electrical supplier. It's about a four-month process. So, if you want to capture the summer sun and reduce your electric bill, my advice is to start now.

What about paint? We have an expedited process now. Come into Orchard Creek Lodge and look at



the paint book, select one of 130 paint schemes for your home, drop the application in the application box and you will get an approval in several days. You need not appear before the ARC for the paint or solar applications.

Finally, landscaping is best done in the spring. We are in zone nine according to the Sunset Garden Book. By summer it will get very warm here. Our

FIRST AMENDMENT TO RESTATED BYLAWS OF SUN CITY LINCOLN HILLS COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION

RECITALS

- A. Sun City Lincoln Hills Community Association, a California nonprofit mutual benefit corporation (the "Association"), is a homeowners association organized to manage and maintain the Sun City Lincoln Hills development (the "Development") located in the County of Placer, California.
- B. The Restated Bylaws of Sun City Lincoln Hills Community Association (the "Bylaws") at Section 15.04(a) provide that the Board of Directors, upon written advice of legal counsel and after notification of Members of the Association, may approve Bylaw amendments by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Directors in order to conform the Bylaws to State statutes that are amended in a manner which requires corresponding amendments of the Bylaws in order to properly reflect underlying State law.
- C. The Board of Directors, upon written advice of legal counsel and after notification of Members of the Association, has approved the following amendments by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Directors since the State statutes of Civil Code Sections 1363 and 1363.05 have been amended pursuant to Senate Bill 563 in the year 2011 in a manner that requires corresponding amendments of the Bylaws in order to properly reflect underlying State law.
- D. On ______, the Board of Directors of the Association approved the following amendment to the Bylaws.

AMENDMENT

1. Section 5.04 now provides:

Notice of Members' Meetings.

- (a) <u>Requirement That Notice Be Given</u>. Notice of all regular and special meetings of the Members shall be sent or otherwise given in writing to each Member who is in Good Standing and otherwise eligible to vote at the meeting as of the record date for notice established in accordance with Section 5.08, below. Notice shall also be posted in the Lodges or another appropriate location in the Common Area.
- (b) <u>Time Requirements for Notice</u>. The notice of membership meetings shall be given in the manner specified in subparagraph (e) of this Section, and except in the case of special meetings of the Members called in accordance with Section 5.03(b), above, notice shall be given not less than ten (10) nor more than ninety (90) days before the date of the meeting. If notice is given by mail and the notice is not given by first-class, registered or certified mail, the notice shall be given not less than twenty (20) days (nor more than ninety (90) days) before the meeting.
- (c) <u>Minimum Requirements Regarding Content of Notice</u>. The notice shall specify the place, date, and hour of the meeting and (i) in the case of a special meeting, the general nature of the business to be transacted, and no other business may in that case be transacted, or (ii) in the case of a regular meeting, those matters which the Board of Directors, at the time of giving the notice, intends to present for action by the Members; but any proper matter may be presented at the meeting for such action so long as a quorum is present.

2. Section 8.01 now provides:

Place of Meetings; Meetings by Video or Conference Telephone. Regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors may be held at any place within Sun City Lincoln Hills or the County that has been designated from time to time by resolution of the Board and stated in the notice of the meeting. In the absence of such designation, regular meetings shall be held at the Association's Orchard Creek Lodge facility within Sun City Lincoln Hills. Notwithstanding the above provisions of this Section, a regular or special meeting of the Board may be held at any place consented to in writing by all the Board Members, either before or after the meeting. If consents are given, they shall be filed with the minutes of the meeting. Any meeting, regular or special, may be held by video or conference telephone or similar communication equipment, so long as all Directors and Members participating in the meeting in accordance with Civil Code Section 1363.05 can hear one another, in which case all such Directors shall be deemed to be present in person at such meeting. teleconference in accordance with Section 8.09 herein.

3. Section 8.05(a) now provides:

Meetings Generally Open to Members. With the exception of executive sessions of the Board (see subparagraph (c), below) any Member of the Association may attend meetings of the Board of Directors. For purposes of the Open Meeting Act, the term "Board meeting" has the meaning as set forth in Section 8.09 herein, includes any congregation of a majority of the Members of the Board at the same time and place to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item of business scheduled to be heard by the Board, except those matters that may be discussed in executive session. Nothing herein shall preclude the Board or its members from gathering at workshops or other gatherings at which no formal action is taken and no matters are discussed which, at the time of the workshop or gathering are scheduled for action by the Board at a later time.

4. Section 8.05(e) now provides:

Members' Right to Notice of Meetings. Members shall be given notice of the time and place of any Board meetings (as defined in subparagraph (a), above) other than "emergency meetings" or a meeting that will be held solely in executive session, at least four (4) days prior to the date of the meeting. Except for an emergency meeting, members shall be given notice of the time and place of a meeting that will be held solely in executive session at least two (2) days prior to the meeting. This notice may be given by posting the notice in a prominent place or places within the Common Area, by mail or delivery of the notice to each Lot within Sun City Lincoln Hills, or by newsletter or similar means of communication, or with the consent of the Member, by electronic means. For purposes of these Bylaws this subparagraph (e), an "emergency meeting" of the Board means a meeting called by the President or by any two (2) members of the Board under circumstances that could not have been reasonably foreseen which require immediate attention and possible action by the Board and which of necessity make it impracticable to provide prior notice to the Members as required by the Open Meeting Act.

5. Section 8.07 now provides:

Waiver of Notice. No Board Member may challenge the validity of The transaction of any meeting of the Board of Directors, however called and for lack of proper noticed or wherever held, shall be as valid as though taken at a meeting duly held after regular call and notice, if: (a) a quorum is present, and (b) either before or after the meeting, each of the directors not present, individually or collectively, signs a written waiver of notice, a consent to holding the meeting, or an approval of the minutes. The waiver of notice or consent need not specify the purpose of the meeting. All waivers, consents, and approvals shall be filed with the Association records or made a part of the minutes of the meeting and shall have the same force and effect as a unanimous vote of the Board. The requirements of notice of a meeting shall also be deemed to have been waived by any Director who attends the meeting without protesting the lack of proper notice either before or at the inception of the meeting.



6. Section 8.09 now provides:

Action without a Meeting.

The Board may not take action on any item of business outside of a Board meeting, and may not conduct a meeting via a series of electronic transmissions, including, but not limited to, electronic mail, except that electronic transmissions may be used as a method of conducting an emergency Board meeting if all members of the Board, individually or collectively, consent in writing to that action. Written consent to conduct an emergency Board meeting may be transmitted electronically.

An emergency Board meeting may be called by the president of the Association, or by any two members of the Board other than the president, if there are circumstances that could not have been reasonably foreseen which require immediate attention and possible action by the Board, and which of necessity make it impracticable to provide notice as required by these Bylaws.

As used in these Bylaws:

- (a) "Item of business" means any action within the authority of the Board, except those actions that the Board has validly delegated to any other person or persons, managing agent, officer of the Association, or committee of the Board comprising less than a majority of the Directors.
- (b) "Board meeting" means either of the following:
- (i) A congregation of a majority of the members of the Board at the same time and place to hear, discuss, or deliberate upon any item of business that is within the authority of the Board.
- (ii) A teleconference in which a majority of the members of the Board, in different locations, are connected by electronic means, through audio or video or both. A teleconference meeting shall be conducted in a manner that protects the rights of Members of the Association and otherwise complies with the requirements of these Bylaws. Except for a meeting that will be held solely in executive session, the notice of the teleconference meeting shall identify at least one physical location so that Members of the Association may attend and at least one member of the Board of Directors shall be present at that location. Participation by Board Members in a teleconference meeting constitutes presence at that meeting as long as all Board Members participating in the meeting are able to hear one another and Members of the Association speaking on matters before the Board. A Member of the Association shall be entitled to attend a teleconference meeting or the portion of a teleconference meeting that is open to Members of the Association, and that meeting or portion of the meeting shall be audible to the Members in a location specified in the notice of the meeting.

Any action required or permitted to be taken by the Board of Directors may be taken without a meeting, if all members of the Board, individually or collectively, consent in writing to that action. Such action by written consent shall have the same force and effect as a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors. In accordance with Corporations Code Section 7211(b), an "interested Director" is not included in the vote determining unanimity under this Section. If the Board of Directors resolves by unanimous written consent to take action, an explanation of the action taken shall be posted at a prominent place or places within the Common Area within three (3) days after the written consents of all Board members have been obtained and announced at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting. Any written consent or consents of the Board shall be filed with the minutes of the proceedings of the Board.

CHANGE TO RULES AND REGULATIONS CONCERNING PARKING SPACES RESTRICTIONS

The current language in the Rules and Regulations, page 17, as follows:

GOLF CARTS (PRIVATE) & NEVs

Golf carts and NEVs should only be parked in designated golf cart parking spaces if available and if not, when using a vehicle parking place, please leave room so that two golf carts or NEVs can park in one space.

Proposed Change:

PARKING SPACES

Golf carts and NEVs must park in designated golf cart/NEV parking spaces on Association Common Area Property, if available. If not available, such vehicles may be parked in automobile spaces so that two golf carts/NEVs can park in the one space. Golf cart/NEV designated parking spaces are for the exclusive use of such vehicles, and no other type of vehicle shall park in such spaces. Violation of these provisions will subject the vehicle owner to fines as described in Appendix A (Schedule Of Charges) to these Rules, plus any costs incurred in identifying vehicle ownership.

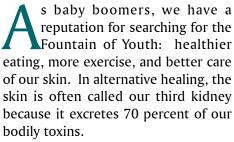

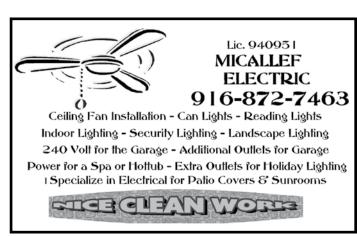

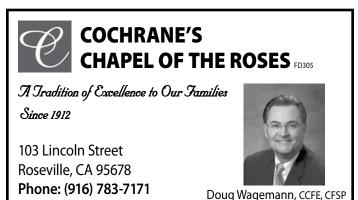

Minding Your Mind: Part II

Are you eating the right "brain food"?

When the brain works well, you feel good. The chemical messengers for the "feel good" mood chemistry involving serotonin, norepinephrine, and dopamine come from the food that you eat. Good nutrition is required on a consistent basis for optimal brain health. The holiday season is a time of



year when many tend to feel depressed and stressed. Perhaps this

would be a good time to improve your dietary intake of those items that give your brain the food it needs for the mood messengers.

Tryptophan is one of the essential amino acids that people need, and it is the precursor of serotonin. It has been used for years in the mental health field as an option for treating anxiety and insomnia. Dietary intake is usually better than pills, and it has been found that tryptophan absorption is better with a low protein, complex carbohydrate diet. Foods rich in tryptophan are pumpkin and squash seeds, seaweed, chia seeds, sesame seeds, sunflower seeds, black walnuts, flax

seeds, and tofu.

The essential amino acid tyrosine is the precursor for norepinephrine and dopamine. It also absorbs better with a low protein and complex carbohydrate diet. Rich dietary sources for tyrosine are tomatoes, edamame, eggs, almonds, oats, sunflower seeds, Spanish peanuts, pumpkin and squash seeds, and seaweed.

The brain cells that communicate with one another are called neurons, and their membranes are made up of fatty acid molecules. Hence, it is essential that one's diet include some fat. Good fats are monounsaturated fats such as olive oil and polyunsaturated fats. Good fats contain Omega-3, the most essential fat, and you can get this without taking a pill by eating walnuts, pecans, ground flaxseed, chia seeds, canola oil, wheat germ oil, green

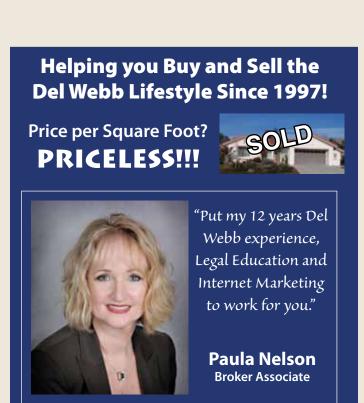
Writers
