Board of Directors Report

John Snyder, Treasurer, SCLH Board of Directors

It is a great pleasure having Board President, Peter Gilbert participating again.

Two years ago PG&E first contacted Chris O'Keefe, Senior Director, of Facilities, about converting our street lights to a light-emitting diode (LED) system. After doing his homework, Chris presented the idea to the Properties Committee and they saw the "light," solicited bids and received seven responses. The Properties Committee and Jim Leonhard, the Finance Committee liaison, spent hours evaluating bids and clarifying issues. At their June meeting, the Properties Committee unanimously resolved to recommend proceeding subject to minor contingencies. The Finance Committee will review the project at its July meeting and make its recommendation to the Board. Please note that this would be a replacement/ improvement of an existing system and as such is a Reserve item. It can and would be funded without requiring new or additional homeowners' dues.

Replacing the lighting mechanism and globes on 1,850 street and parking lot fixtures is a big project and will take several months. So why do this? The answer is that this system provides significantly more usable light at a significantly lower cost of power and repairs. The savings at today's costs generates a pay-back in 7.52 years or better than a 13% return. With the projected increases in energy costs, this return will only go up. Updates on the status of this project will be forthcoming.

During the June Finance Committee meeting each department manager presented a status report on their 2011 business plan results. These reports were professionally prepared, well presented and informative. Each department is actively pursing the maintenance and improvement of service levels and results of operation. The presentations exhibited the highly competent and motivated professional staff management and the excellent mentoring and collaborative environment established by our Executive Director. See the Finance Committee Chair's article in this Compass for the results of operation through May. The Association is in excellent financial condition.

Clearly, our Association is thriving and on the move forward.

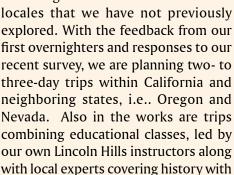

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Five Approved Items Already in Use

Note July 31 Deadline for 2012 Requests

While we're still only halfway through the year, Capital Asset Acquisitions recommended by the Properties Committee and approved by the Board last fall as part of the 2011 budget are already in use:

- Trash and cardboard compactors replacing dumpsters; renovation of OC trash service area
- Catering Sales Office redesign and furniture upgrade
- Security camera system for OC and KS Lodges
- Purchase of used forklift
- Additional Ballroom stage risers for the Lincoln Hills Singers (with a contribution from the group covering almost 2/3 the cost)

Adding to this list, a recent request for additional outdoor pool furniture was

approved by the Board in order to reap the benefits this pool season. Look for new tables, chairs, and umbrellas soon.

First stop for facilities improvement projects is the Properties Committee. Ideas come from individual community members, groups and clubs, other committees, and staff. Requests for 2012 Capital Asset Acquisitions (new items costing \$2,000 or more) must be submitted with three bids by July 31. Projects are evaluated at a joint meeting of the Properties and Finance Committees in September when we prepare our recommendations to the Board.

Among other proposals, we expect to be considering a new softball equipment storage structure at Del Webb Field and two NEV charging stations in The Wave parking lot. Contributions towards these projects have been offered by their respective interest groups. Major A-V upgrades for the Kilaga Springs Presenta-

tion Hall are also under consideration.

We'll be discussing proposed capital projects at our August 9 meeting. Community members are welcome to join us at 1:00 PM at Orchard Creek Lodge.

Interim Business Plan Review

Most Departments Meeting or Exceeding Goals/Objectives

Hank Lipschitz, Finance Committee Chair

Our Finance Committee held its regular monthly meeting on June 16,



accepted the Financial Statements and recommended acceptance by the Board. Financial results continue to be better than budget showing \$214,457 favorable for

five months. We continue to benefit

from our mild weather pattern that resulted in significant savings for water and electric utilities.

The Finance Committee heard presentations from each department on implementation of their business plans this year. The achievements are showing up in our fiscal results. Among the achievements are improvements in administration, operations, catering and

various improvements at the Spa and Fitness. A new health benefits program is also adding to our better performance.

The Committee also discussed the LED lighting project and the potential savings going forward. There are still some remaining issues that need to be clarified before we are ready to make a recommendation.

At May 31 we had \$3,504,000 in the Operating Fund which includes \$620,000 in Restricted Funds. The Reserve Fund totaled \$5,225,000. Virtually all of our funds are in FDIC insured or US Treasuries. There were 196 homes showing past due assessments of \$96,000. This compares to last month's 300 homes past due assessments of \$148,000.

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Compliance Process — Part II

David Stone, Compliance Committee Chair

Last month, I described the early stages of the compliance process involving various written notices to hom-

eowners seeking voluntary compliance for a reported violation of our Governing Documents.

If voluntary compliance has not been reached within the ample time frames allowed, or the homeowner has not responded or cooperated, a call to hearing letter will be sent by the Compliance Committee. It will give the date and time of the hearing and a description of the alleged violation previously stated in the notices. The homeowner is encouraged to attend and discuss his or her position on the matter. The letter will advise that if the Committee finds a violation, the Committee may make a recommendation to the Board of Directors for a penalty to be imposed for non-compliance.

The hearing is set for an open ses-

sion where anyone in our community may attend. However, if the homeowner is not comfortable with the matter being aired in

public, he or she may elect an executive session where only the concerned parties may attend and the proceedings are confidential and private.

The hearings are relatively informal; after all, the Committee members are just residents who share a desire to maintain our community according to the governing documents we all agreed to abide by. The homeowner is given every opportunity at the hearing to present his or her case and may be asked questions so that the Committee has a full understanding of the issue. There are three possible outcomes when the hearing concludes: (1) the case is closed because of compliance or a finding that no violation occurred, (2) the case is deferred to a later hearing to allow



more time for compliance or because the homeowner cannot attend, or (3) the case is referred to the Board with a recommendation for a penalty. It is important to note that the Committee cannot impose a penalty; it can merely make a recommendation.

If the case is referred, another call to hearing letter will be sent advising the homeowner that the Board will meet to consider whether the recommendation should be accepted. The Board procedure is similar to the Committee's procedure except that the Board can impose penalties.

The main goal of these procedures is to achieve compliance not to penalize. With cooperation from the homeowner, that goal is usually reached.

Sun City Lincoln Hills Community Association ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE (ARC) RECOMMENDATION FOR AMENDMENT TO DESIGN GUIDELINES SECTION 85. SIGNS.

At its regular committee meeting on May 23, 2011, the ARC approved a motion to recommend the Board of Directors consider an amendment to the Design Guidelines for garage/estate sale signs.

As stated in Section 8.09(e) of the CC&Rs, the ARC may develop and approve written guidelines for "other signs, such as open house or garage sale signs."

The ARC recommends adoption of the following amendment to the Design Guidelines:

Proposed Addition to Design Guidelines Section 85

85 Signs.

85.7 Garage / Estate Sale Sign.

No more than one unlighted, temporary sign pertaining to the sale shall be permitted for any one (1) residence. The sign shall not exceed nine (9) square feet in area (typically 3 feet x 3 feet). The maximum height of the sign shall not exceed four (4) feet.

- a. Time The garage/estate sale sign shall not be placed earlier than 8:00 AM on the day of the sale. The sign shall be on display only when the sale is open and must be removed immediately upon conclusion of the sale or no later than 7:00 PM of the same day. The city of Lincoln restricts garage / estate sales to one per year.
- b. Place The garage/ estate sign shall be located only on private residential property with the consent of the property owner. Signs shall not be placed on a vehicle, fence, pole, tree, median, or railing. The sign shall not contain any balloons or wind devices and shall not be placed on common area, public property or right-of-way.
- Responsibility Each Owner, or representative of the Owner, is responsible for the placement and removal of their respective sign. In any case, the Owner is ultimately responsible for making sure his/her agents comply with the Design Guidelines and may be subject to penalties for failing to do so.

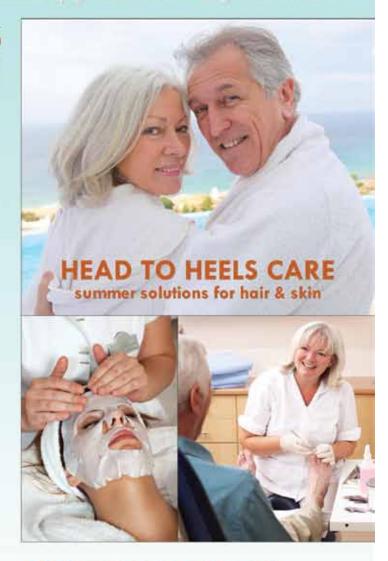

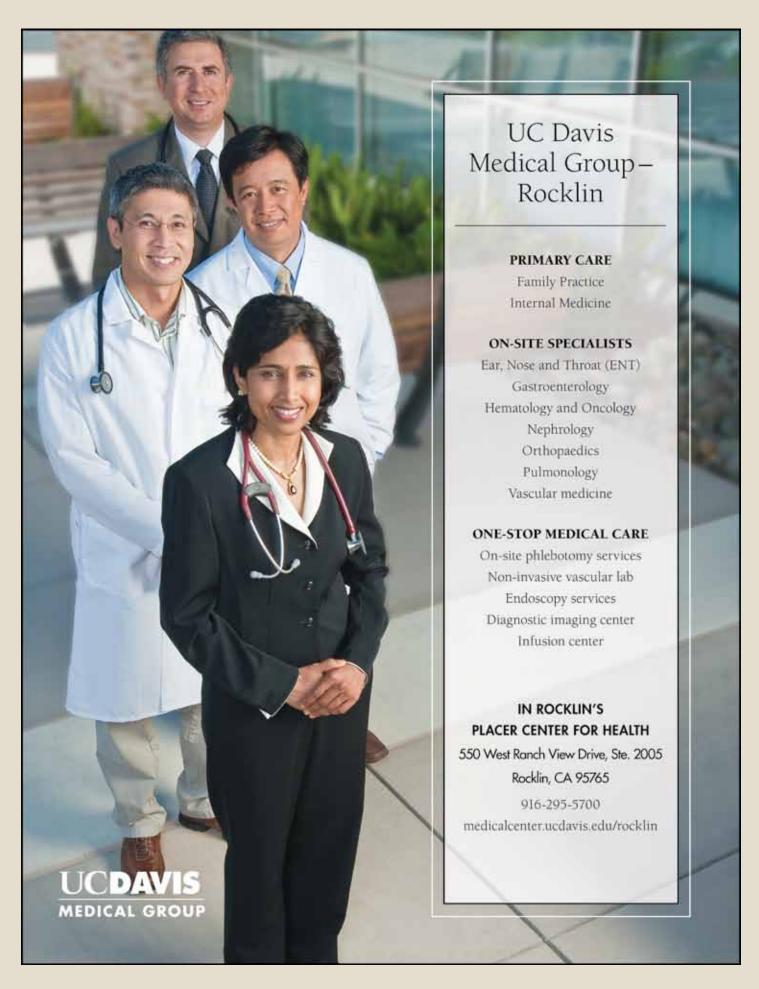

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The Process Works & Perseverance Pays Off

Spotlight on Pickleball

rticles have appeared in the *Compass* this year emphasizing our "sense of community" theme.

This month, the spotlight is on **pickleball**, focusing on how the sport developed as a new amenity for our Association, based *solely* on resident interest.

Pickleball is currently

the fastest growing sport in the nation. A multi-generational sport, it is very appealing among active senior adults. Pickleball is easy to learn and can develop into a quick, fast-paced game, and for more experienced players, a competitive sport.

Bill & Sandy MacCullough were instrumental in bringing pickleball to SCLH. After playing in Arizona, they had a clear vision of bringing pickleball to SCLH. After being advised of the process involved, they first approached the Sports Advisory Committee in April 2007. Within four months, the first courts were authorized on the basketball courts and opened August 2007, on a trial basis.

Enthusiasm for the sport immediately grew. The players' representatives began making formal presentations to the Sports Advisory, Properties, and Finance Committees, and the Board of Directors. They asked for new courts to be funded from our existing

Capital Improvement Fund, and built within the Sports Complex, which the Board eventually approved. Plans were drawn and the bidding process began. The Board approved building three courts, at a cost of \$150,000. Construction began in July 2009 and,

remarkably, was completed in October 2009!

The process has been described as an "adventuresome challenge," as no group-initiated capital improvement had been made in our community. What a success, both physically and socially, pickleball has become! Our "early" players trail blazed where no one had gone before! They proved our system does work.

Estimates are that approximately 350-400 residents have "trained" for

Watch and listen for additional communication enhancements as this industrious committee continues its beneficial work for all of us.



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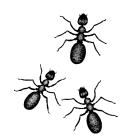
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Are You Saving Energy and Conserving Water?

Summertime Homeowner Tips from Neighbors InDeed *Doug Brown*

Temps are up. The AC is cranking. Yards are thirsty. Yes, summer's here. Are you doing everything you can for efficient house cooling and yard irrigation?

Neighbors InDeed's Handy Helpers are trained volunteers ready to give you assistance and advice to save money, be cool, and have healthy yards during the hot, dry summer season. Just call 223-2763.

Meanwhile, consider these tips and pointers:

Indoor Temperature Control

Filter cleaning/washing. If you haven't done so already, your AC/furnace filter is a key to efficient circulation of air in your house. You'll need a ladder, of course, to reach your filter, then you should either replace a disposable filter with a new one or wash a permanent filter. Need assistance? Call for a Handy Helper.

AC settings

Thermostat settings. Because our temperatures vary so much in the summer, Neighbors InDeed recommends using manual controls to switch on the AC only when you need it – say, in the late afternoon on a warm 90+9 day.

Most residents are comfortable with a 78-80° setting.

Nighttime cooling. When you go to bed at night, how about opening your windows (and then shutting them in the morning), or making sure your **smart vent** (if you have one) is set to kick on at approximately 70° .

Ceiling fans. Ceiling fans use a fraction of the electricity that an AC system uses, and still keep you quite comfortable. Ceiling fans should be in the down draft position now.

Outdoor Irrigation

Sprinklers/drippers. This is a good time to do a midsummer's visual check of sprinkler heads and drippers, and replace or repair as needed.

Programming timers. Many of us are tempted to overwater yards for fear that our favorite flora will perish. To save both water and money, try a conservative watering schedule. Usually, three days a week is sufficient, with minimal watering times for each station. For lawns, Neighbors InDeed

recommends watering grass only in the **morning** (afternoon watering is vulnerable to rapid evaporation) in **two** five-to-eight-minute watering times about an hour apart.

Some Advice on Medication Safety *Shirley Schultz*

he media would have us believe that there is a pill or a preparation for nearly every situation.

The pharmaceutical industry is of-

ten all too eager to push a pill at us to cure our ailments. In our eagerness to feel better or to prevent some change in our health status or self-image, we

tend to focus on "what works" rather than on "what's safe." Moreover, many people mistakenly believe that herbal preparations and other nutritional supplements are not medications. And over-the counter agents that you can buy without a prescription can be just as potent as prescription medications and



carry similar risks. All of these agents can interact with each other.

Polypharmacy is a term used to describe the unnecessary or excessive use of medications (more than five), the taking of medication for no therapeutic reason, taking more than one medication to treat the same thing, or taking medication to treat the side effects of some other medication. It is no surprise that the older population is at higher risk of suffering drug

Maintenance Building Caps Seven Years of Planning Al Roten

Whether it is in our homes or as an Associa-

tion, it is inevitable that stuff accumulates. In 2004 during the transition of transferring control of our Association from Del Webb to us residents, the undeveloped service yard on Joiner Parkway was deeded to SCLHCA. At that time, the Board of Directors set aside capital funds for projects such as

Later, the Properties Committee, Finance Committee, and Board approved a plan to build out the Joiner Parkway Maintenance Facility. Original estimates exceeded the single year expenditure limits set in our controlling documents, so improvements were split into two

stages: yard improvements, and a storage building with personnel accommodations. The yard improve-

ments were completed in 2009. In the meantime, the inevitable accumulation of documents and hardware items has overflowed storage space in our Lodges and

maintenance facilities. Finally, building design and construction type were agreed upon, a budget of \$230,000 was established, and building permits were acquired in 2010.

The Joiner Parkway Maintenance Facility is now ready for use. The ac-

commodations of the 3750 square foot building make available a much needed break room for our landscape crew of 25 to 35 workers, restrooms, and an office for landscape supervision. The bulk of the building is dedicated to storage. Initial stocking of the bulk and rack storage areas will be by elimination of six rented off-site storage cubicles. This will provide welcomed efficiency for maintenance staff in storing and retrieving items. There is a separate interior secure storage area for sensi-

Completion of this second and final stage of this facility has been brought in on budget. This is a significant milestone capping almost seven years of planning. Since this is a working facility with many vehicles coming and going, most of us will not have the opportunity to see it at work. However, there will be a Grand Opening/Ribbon Cutting session at the new facility on Wednesday, July 27, at 9:00 AM. We are all invited. The Joiner Parkway facility is next to the golf course maintenance yard, about halfway between the two ends of Del Webb Boulevard. Parking is very limited, so ride share if possible.

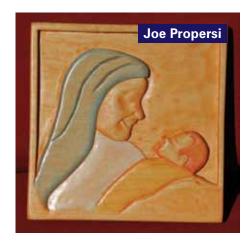

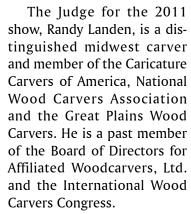

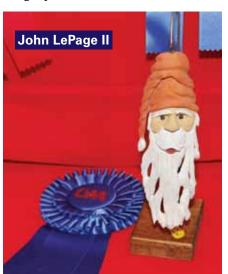
Place White ribbons. What makes this even more impressive is that the members of the group have won ribbons for each of their 36
