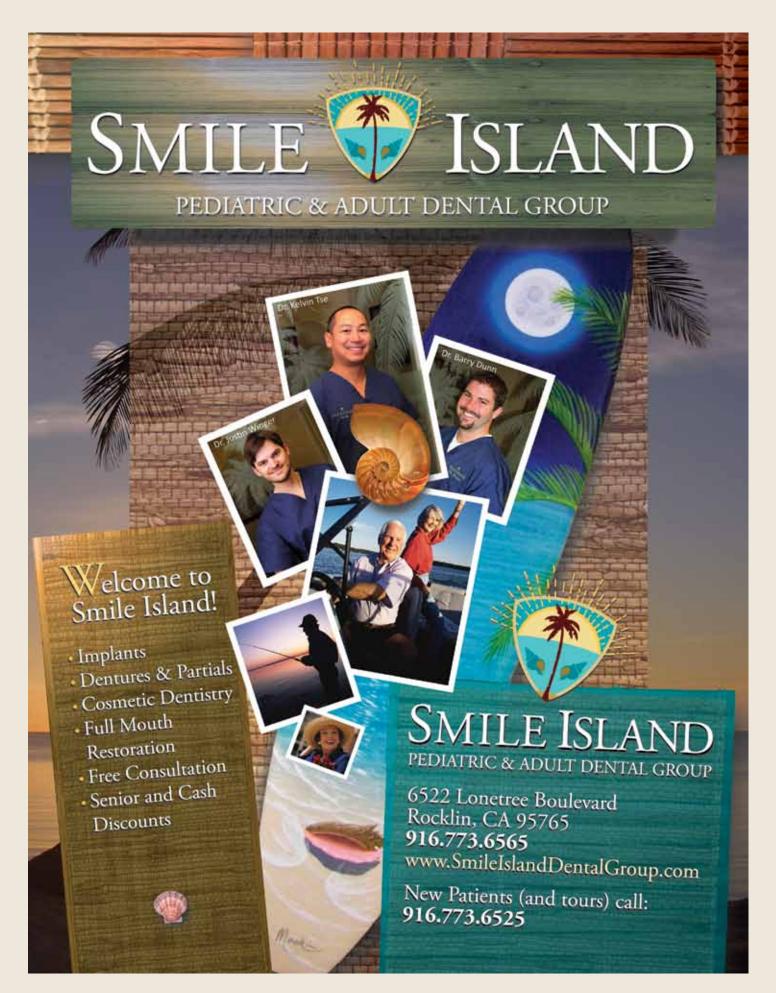

- The Tour de Lights event last month met with rave reviews as did the fireworks on New Year's Eve.

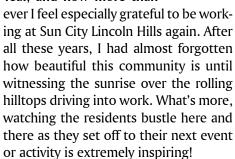

I've found that as long as we apply the Golden Rule — "One should treat others as one would like others to treat oneself" — mutual respect, communication and kindness go a long way.

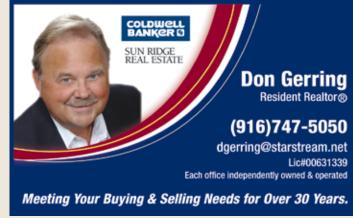

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Almost Year End: All Segments in Excellent Shape

Finance Committee Personnel Changes

John Snyder, Finance Committee Chair

The Finance Committee met December 16 and reviewed and accepted the November 2010 financials for the Association. For the month of November, overall operations were \$33,800 better than budget. For the month,

better than budget results of Maintenance \$20,500, Administration \$14,500, Landscape \$6,600, Activities \$6,700, Spa at Kilaga Springs \$3,800 and Fitness \$2,400 were offset by worse than budget results for Food & Beverage \$20,700.

Year-to-date operations were \$483,000 better than budget. Year-to-date bet-

ter than budget results of Landscape \$184,400, Administration \$131,900, Maintenance \$107,300, Food & Beverage \$53,800, Activities \$9,100 and Fitness \$800 were offset by worse than budget results for Spa at Kilaga Springs \$4,300.

All segments of operations are in excellent shape. Thanks to Member participation, the Spa at Kilaga Springs had excellent results in November and in one month cut its year-to-date budget deficit in half. Food & Beverage results of operation for the month, even though less than budget, were better than expected. Operating results for November had the added unbudgeted expense of the Meridians' two-for-one promotion, the higher cost of our Thanksgiving celebration and a reduced number of catering events. The Directors and staff of all segments have produced excellent operating results.

As a result of term limits, Michael Drucquer will attend his last Finance Committee meeting in January. His tireless participation and insight have been an inspiration and a strength on which all members of the Committee have come to rely. I know I speak for each Finance Committee member past and present in thanking Michael for

his years of diligent work on behalf of the Association.

The Committee's January meeting will also be my last. I have participated on the Finance Committee for over five

For any elections — start early to appoint an election committee, remember the four-year term

Club meeting room needs — be sure to submit your room requests and audio/visual needs early with Club and Group Coordinator Judy Hogan.

Club events on-site and off-site — have all your members sign a recommended Event Release Form.

If your Club contacts have changed, have you submitted a new/revised Club Contact Form to Judy Hogan?

If your Club has a website, is that information listed correctly on the Association website?

Club Special Event banners — Before ordering your banners, consult with Lifestyle Program Manager Lavina Samoy. Lavina will assist you to assure your banner meets Association standards.

When approved banners are completed, they are to be delivered to Lavina Samoy at Kilaga Springs three weeks prior to the event.

For your Club's Special Event, flyers can be placed in the Plexiglas sections below the counter between the TVs in OC Lodge, or handed out by Club members. They are not to be placed on the counters at OC or KS Lodges.

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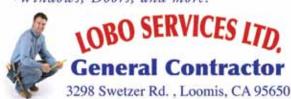

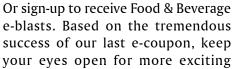

Aging Gracefully

"Aging Is Normal" is the theme for the Community Forums on health topics for 2011. Ideally, each of us has been tuned in to this concept long before retiring and before crossing that arbitrary line to becoming a "Senior Citizen."

Visualize yourself on your birth day. In reality, you have been aging ever since that day. Aging is a process that is indeed normal, although there are those transhumanist voices out there who hold that at least some key parts of the human body can be changed fundamentally through technology so that aging will not occur. We all age at different rates, depending on many factors such as genetics, environmental influences, and how we look after ourselves. We were born with our unchangeable genetic markup, but then there are things we can do to influence the aging process and how it affects us.

Our society does not take kindly to aging and would have us believe that there must be a magic pill or some type of treatment or procedure that will keep its occurrence at bay. The ancient Hebrews must have known something that we do not since Methuselah is said to have lived to age 969 (at least to their way of counting). The truth is that knowledge about the process and behavioral changes based



on that knowledge are the best tools we can have to ensure healthy aging. If you understand how and why your body ages, then you can take responsibility for doing what you need to do to slow down the process.

It is a common societal stereotype that aging means infirmity, disease, and dementia. We need not subscribe to this stereotype. "Many people sail through the aging process without walkers or pacemakers. Age-related diseases: diabetes, heart disease, cancer, stroke, osteoporosis, and dementia leave us disabled rather than the normal aging of our bodies." (Eskaton) There are ways to prevent or alter some of these things. Beyond the body, there are psychological aspects to successful aging whereby we grow emotionally and adapt to bodily changes that come with age. Those who successfully master the later part of their life gain a sense of in-

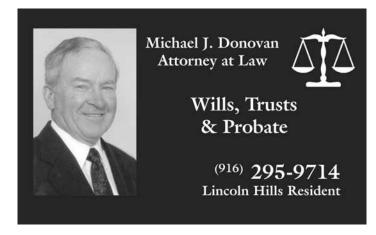

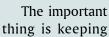

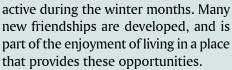
Finally, there are card games for those who want to exercise their brains and still want to maintain couch potato status. Organized poker games are avail-

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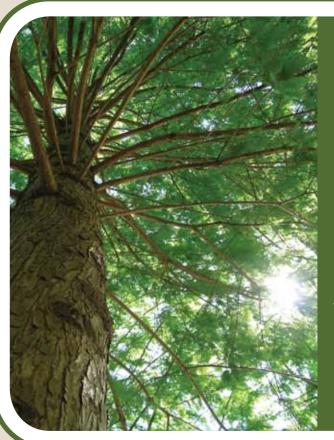
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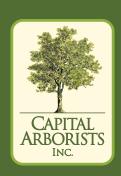


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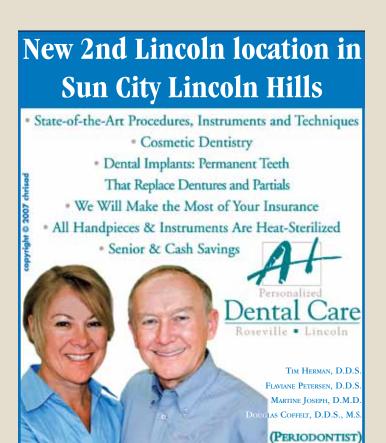
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A Conversation With Lincoln Hills Golf Club

hange happens! We are seeing changes in management of the Lincoln Hills Golf courses here in



the midst of our home development. We sat down with Sean Silva, the new General Manager of our Golf Club. Sean arrived to take on the challenges of managing the Lincoln Hills courses in mid-August, 2010. His life has been a

continuing whirlwind of activity ever since, as he embraces the challenges and opportunities of his responsibilities.

Golf in our locale is not new to Sean. He previously was employed by ClubCorp, and managed both Empire Ranch and Turkey Creek courses. For non-golfers, the Empire Ranch Golf Course is integral to homes, much like Lincoln Hills. So, the unique challenges of managing the sport among homes are well known.

Sean emphatically affirms his commitment to the position that our golf courses are part of the community and that being a good neighbor is an essential element to successful management. A great deal of his time is spent reviewing email from, or listening to, concerns of our residents.

The unique soil conditions of the Lincoln Hills courses present difficult course maintenance challenges. Therefore, constant attention is being directed toward watering schedules and seasonal seeding of grasses appropriate to our locale. Billy Casper Golf, our course owners, has committed to Audubon Certification which attempts to strike an appropriate balance between tailored terrain and environmental friendliness to natural conditions and habitat for the critters of this area. Sean is well versed in the various levels of Audubon compliance and is attentive to community interface.

Sean expresses a double-edged mantra: Commitment to being a healthy part of the community, and that golf customers are guests of his enterprise. He is

dedicated to paying attention to issues raised by our residents and to initiating programs which will bring our resident golfers to consider the Lincoln Hills courses as their home for learning and playing the sport.

While he was settling into this new job, Sean saw that scheduling golfers was not as timely and smooth as it should be. Investigation indicated that there was a failure in the communication network: this was raised as an urgent need and investment was made in the system. Significant improvement has been realized.

A new feature called Gold Rush Membership has been initiated. Golfers who join this can earn free golf rounds by making Lincoln Hills their regular playing course. Sean declares that this is the best value in the marketplace. An existing Adaptive Golf Program which caters to golfers with various physical limitations is being continued with enhanced awareness and participation. Planning is ongoing toward development of additional programming, clinics,

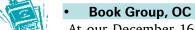
