Favorable Results to Start 2011

Finance Committee Report

s the new Chair of the Finance Committee, I want to begin by thanking John Snyder for his more than five years of dedicated service on the Finance Committee, the



last two as Chair. Under his guidance, the financial structure of our Association has been greatly improved. The rest of the Committee and I look forward to working with

the Board of Directors and Community Association staff on financial issues that impact our Association. I also welcome our newest members, Molly Seamons and Jim Leonhard, to the Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee met February 16, and received the Independent Auditors Report for the year ended December 31, 2010 for our Association. The audit resulted in a favorable adjustment of \$69,800 from the preliminary results reported to you last month. This gives us a better than budget result of \$380,100 for the year. At year end we had \$3,533,000 in our Operating Fund and \$5,175,000 in our Replacement Fund. The final audit report will be distributed to you around the end of March.

At our meeting we also received

the January 2011 results, summarized below. We start the first month of the year with favorable operating results, showing overall operations \$90,400 better than budget. The Food & Beverage Department, for example, provided exemplary performance.

With revenue \$18,000 better than budget Food & Beverage showed a net favorable variance of \$22,000, and all departments in January were better than budget as shown below. With all of the Association's activities doing well, we are off to a fine start.

Did You Know?

If you see yellow security tape on a street light pole near your home that it is a good thing. Our security patrol services check various Villages as part of their evening patrol duties. When they see a street light out, they mark it with yellow tape and report it to the Facilities

& Maintenance Department staff who replace the bulb and remove the security tape. If you notice that your street light is out at any time, contact Facilities & Maintenance at 645-4500 and they will implement the replacement process.

The grazing herd of sheep and goats



is back on site, providing entertainment along with environmentally-friendly vegetation control in our Open Space preserves. Although the herd doesn't completely replace the need for

mechanical mowing, it does reduce air and noise pollution. Plus the sheep and goats spread their own organic fertilizer!

Our Association is responsible for managing some 490 acres of Open Space under the oversight of the Wildlife Heritage Foundation, which reports annually to the U.S. Corps of Engineers. Grazing helps maintain a healthy variety Lamb (forefront) "woolgathering" while the grown-ups work



of habitat types including grasslands, meadows, and wetlands. The sheep are particularly good at reducing thatch from invasive plants such as medusahead, clearing the way for native grasses and wildflowers. The herd is moved every few days when the vegetation

has been cropped to the desired level.

The "it" refers to any vehicle bearing a "For Sale" sign, and the "there" means any SCLH Association Common

Property and adjoining parking areas.

Responding to resident complaints, the Board of Directors recently approved a new rule prohibiting the use of Association areas as a venue for advertising or otherwise promoting the sale of private assets, businesses, or other properties. The impetus behind the rule was the ever increasing proliferation of cars, golf carts, and other vehicles

that were parked in Association parking lots for extended periods for the purpose of displaying For Sale signs. Not only were such vehicles hogging parking spaces for hours on end, but

were giving a visual impression akin to some high density "auto rows" found in some urban areas.

The new rule states: "Association Common Property and adjoining parking areas are for the use of members/ residents and their guests during participation in recreational or other Association-authorized activities. Use for other purposes, including but not

limited to promoting vehicle sales, is prohibited and subject to member discipline and possible fines in accord with Schedule A of the "Rules and Regulations." Use while on Association-related business is excluded from this rule."

Please note that you can, of course, park a vehicle with a sale sign in our parking lots while visiting the Lodges, playing golf, enjoying a restaurant meal,

taking a class, attending a seminar, working out in the Fitness Centers, or partaking in any of the many activities available to us. The true intent of the rule is to prohibit such parking where

the principal purpose is to promote a sale.

It is the hope of the Compliance Committee that your cooperation in observing this rule will allow you to prevent your "*it*" from causing you a visit to the Committee.

Aging is Normal

Skin: The Organ That Wraps Around You

Did you know that your skin is to the skin changes that occur with

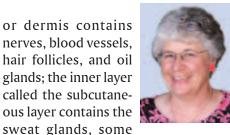
your largest organ? You are wrapped in skin. The skin is probably where the most noticeable signs of aging are when we peek in the mirror or look at our family and friends. Some of us might wish that we could take an iron to our skin to smooth it out. The American Academy of Dermatology softens the discussion by referring



aging as "mature skin," Their website offers some very good information at www.aad.org. Although skin changes are definitely normal with aging, not all skin changes are benign.

Skin Facts. The skin has three layers: the outer layer or epidermis is made up of skin cells, pig-

ment, and proteins; the middle layer



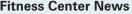
hair follicles, blood vessels and fat. You need your skin to protect you from the environment, to help control your body temperature, to help you maintain fluid and electrolyte balance, and its nerve receptors enable you to sense touch, pain and pressure.

Aging Skin. The single greatest factor contributing to skin changes as we age is sun exposure. In addition, diet, heredity, lifestyle and personal habits contribute to the effects of aging on the skin. The skin becomes rougher, it becomes slack due to loss of elastic tissue, the epidermis thins and the skin becomes more transparent, and the skin becomes more fragile as we age.

Skin Disorders. There are many factors that play in to the development of skin disorders: heart and blood vessel diseases, diabetes, liver disease, nutritional deficiencies, obesity, reactions to medications, stress, allergies, and even indoor heating to name a few. Especially in sun-exposed areas, most people will develop skin spots which they refer to as age spots or liver spots. Actually, these spots have nothing to do with the liver.

Which skin changes are normal and which ones are not normal and should be evaluated by a physician? To get answers to your questions about the skin you are wrapped in, plan to attend the informative presentation by Dr. Donita Abangan, MD, Dermatologist, "How Skin Changes With Age" on April 5, at 7:00 PM (see page 82).

Quick Workout Tips

Many of us have a very hectic schedule. Between doctors' appointments, social engagements, helping neighbors, volunteering, and taking classes, little time remains to really focus on exercising. So here are some quick tips to perform all your exercise in a short 30-45 minute window.

• Do your cardiovascular exercise in 10 minute increments. This could be a quick walk around the block, marching in place, etc. All you need is a cumulative 30 minutes per day to get a cardiovascular benefit.

- Strength training only needs to be done twice a week to maintain. To make these workouts effective. do one exercise per body part and make it a full body routine.
- A great time saver is "supersetting."Super-set" means to do one set of an exercise and then do one set of a different exercise (preferably a different body part). Alternate the two exercises until you have completed all sets.
- This form of strength training can keep your heart rate elevated and therefore allow you to burn more calories.
- This also means that you won't be confined to just one machine and someone else can alternate on the machine with you.
- After you have finished all the sets, do stretching exercises for the muscle group you have just worked on.

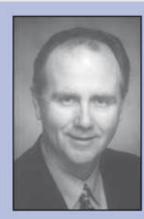

Buddies (breast cancer support), Friends of the Lincoln Library (computer classes for seniors), and Neighborhood Watch. As our community ages, we know that there will be an

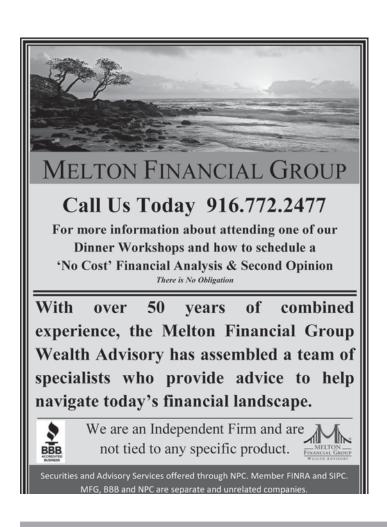


increasing demand for support services.

Pedro, who has been coming to the Youth Center after school while his parents are both still at work, says that coming to the center has helped him to improve his grades from a C average to his current As and Bs. He is no longer interested in following his older brother into gang membership. Jocelyn has improved her grades in school work and finishes her homework early so that she can participate in center activities. There are many more stories to relate in which individual and family well being is being advanced.

Some Lincoln Hills residents are avid supporters of the center, but there are opportunities for more of us to become involved in the life of this investment in the young people of Lincoln. What does Lincoln's Youth Center need?

> Funding for the Youth Center is a constant concern. The need is for operation from 3:00 to 6:00 PM Monday to Friday. Current funding only

supports opening of the center on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday. Lincoln's PAL, and a local charity, ReDirect are primary sponsors of the Youth Center. The Rotary Club of Lincoln has taken an active role in fund raising and volunteer support.

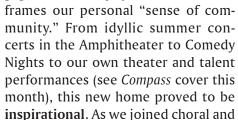

tire must go flat. Most flats will give you enough warning to stop safely and some will leak so slowly, you might be able to make it home. We can't describe the entire process of changing the tube here, but here are a few tips to make it easier: (1) Put the chain on the large ring in front and the small ring in back before you remove the wheel. (2) Practice in your garage. (3) Check the tire inside and out, for what caused the flat. (4) Even if you use CO2 cartridges, be

sure to have a good pump with you. (5) Carry two tubes. (6) Be sure the tube seats in the rim properly before filling it with air. (7) Check your tires after every ride for shards of glass, thorns, sharp rocks or cuts that might eventually cause a flat.
