Association Mid-Year Status

Board of Directors Report

John Snyder, Vice President, SCLH Board of Directors

he Association is now approaching the mid-point in its fiscal year. Results of operations are producing excellent results with a favorable variance to budget of approximately \$250,000 at the end of May. It is truly remarkable that virtually all operating segments are near or ahead of plan at mid-year. These results are positive testimony to the efforts of staff

and the active support you are providing each operation.

Believe it or not, the Association's **Budgeting process** for 2013 will begin shortly, with capital expenditure requests due by July 31. September is a big month for the development of the 2013 budget. Budget meetings are open to Members and the schedule will be

broadly announced beforehand. The first budget meeting is scheduled for September 10 and after a series of meetings the budget will be finalized by the end of September. If you haven't already done so, you really should see the budget process and your segment managers in action, learn more about each of your Association's operations, and ask any questions you may have.

I can report that your Board has been

non-stop busy, carefully considering new service proposals, several facility enhancements, multiple ADA improvements, interviewing and selecting professional service providers and key staff replacements along with the normal recurring and nonrecurring items and issues.

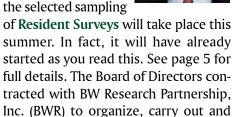

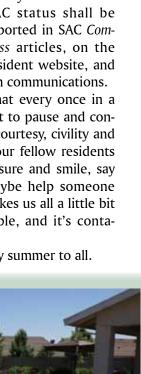
analyze survey results. The survey will

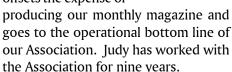

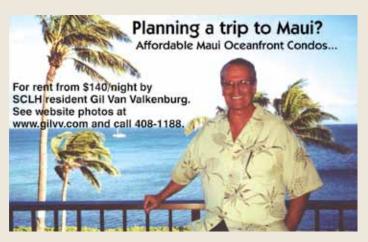

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Questions — Do We Have Questions!

The Strategic Advisory Committee (SAC) wants your feedback! From about July 12 through August 8 we will be



conducting critically important Resident Surveys to understand better how you feel about our community today and what you envision for the future, including SCLH's

facilities, activities, relationships, communications, etc.

Affirming a proposal from SAC, our Board of Directors contracted with BW Research Partnership, Inc. (BWR) to prepare, conduct and analyze a statistically valid survey of residents to help us identify current trends, future needs and priorities of our community. BWR was selected based on their demonstrated competence and experience with surveys of other senior adult communities.

The telephone survey will consist of a 10-14 minute interview (conducted July 12-24) of approximately 600 randomly chosen residents, representative of SCLH's demographics. Why 600? Because, based on statistical probabilities, that sample size will give us 96% accuracy in results for the entire community. So, if you are one of those called by the BWR team, please give them your time and attention so the community can benefit from your valuable input. For those not interviewed, a self-selected online and paper survey (available at the Activities Desks from July 25 to August 8) will be offered to all residents who wish to have their opinions recorded.

BWR will compile survey data that is statistically representative of our resident population. We anticipate that BWR will present the final results in an open workshop sometime in early September. The information will be accessible and useful for a broad audience of stakeholders, including the Board of Directors and staff. Furthermore, the Survey results will provide

guidance to SAC as it completes its work on a comprehensive five-year Strategic Framework for delivery to the Board by January 2013 which will ensure that our community remains a model for success and an extraordinary place to live.

Over the next few months our articles will continue to inform residents of our committee's progress.

This Is One Phone Call Worth Answering — Sun City Lincoln Hills Survey

Telephone Survey dates: Thursday, July 12 through Tuesday, July 24. If you have caller ID, it will say "IHR Research Group." All information submitted will be held confidential by BW Research and only aggregate information will be published in BW's written report to SCLH. This is a legitimate research call sponsored by SCLH. The research firm

may ask certain personal questions, but they will never be the kind of questions that could be used to procure identities. No one will be asked information such as account or Social Security numbers. For those on government Do Not Call List, you may receive a survey call. This type of legitimate research is exempt under the Do Not Call Law.

The Dog Ate My Homework!

The above is the classic lame excuse that school kids have used for generations to try to get out of trouble. No real statistics, but I bet the chance of success of that excuse is close to zero.

Your Compliance Committee hears another version of a lame excuse when a homeowner, faced with a violation notice or hearing, states:

"My contractor, painter, handy man, landscaper, vendor, etc. said I could do this project without any approval or application to the homeowners' association. He told me he has done this project many times in Lincoln Hills and everyone else does it without worrying about the rules of the community."

If you hear a comment like this from a contractor or other, run the other way and do not sign a contract or give him any money!

Any responsible contractor should know that there are mandatory rules that must be followed to determine if a project is permitted in a community like ours and that it is subject to CC&Rs. The consequences of proceeding with a project that needed prior approval are dire. The



homeowner (not the contractor) will face continuing fines until the violation is remedied and could be required to undo the project at obviously great expense. Be aware that the Association has no authority to require the contractor to remedy the violation and the homeowner would probably face an uphill battle seeking recompense from the contractor.

Simply stated, before starting a project please contact Kimberly Parsons (625-4006) or Cecilia Dirstine (625-4008) who will give you a quick heads-up as to whether you need approval and how to go about it.

I'm sorry to say that the chance of success of the above excuse if presented to the Compliance Committee is absolutely zero!

Important Information for Our Fun-Loving Residents!

RSVP dates, when indicated on a trip or class, are used to determine the



status of the activity. By that date, we determine whether activity registration meets the minimum number required to continue without losing money for the Association. So, if you are on the

fence about a trip or class, enroll by the RSVP date to help make it happen. If the trip has met its minimum, you may buy additional seats for the trip for your guests aged 18 and older (21 for casinos) after the RSVP date. Classes

are exclusive to residents even after RSVP date. If you see "RSVP Now" on a trip or class, that means it is a go and we continue to accept registrations. For example, Two-Night Yosemite Trip (on page 47) and Baseball in Reno, Rivercats on the Road (on page 48).

The first two Amphitheater Concerts have been really successful. Thanks to all of you who came to the shows. There are five more fantastic Amphitheater performances coming this summer (see information on the adjacent page). You still have a chance to buy tickets and be a part of the experience. A couple of things to remember: Wristbands are required to enjoy our Amphitheater Concert Series. For those who purchase tickets online, turn in your eTicket confirmation to the Activities Desk to claim your wristbands. You may also exchange eTickets at the OC lobby two hours prior to the show. We encourage you to set up chairs in the morning

of the show. But if you choose to set them up after midnight, please be careful and bring a flashlight. Chairs are not allowed earlier than midnight.

Parking options: Two very popular concerts, the Eagles Tribute, July 19, and Frankie Avalon, August 14, have created new parking challenges for us to manage. To ease parking demands, we encourage you to carpool, walk, bike or drive your LSV or golf cart to the OC Amphitheater Concerts. To make room for concert parking, we will close the OC Fitness Center at 6:00 PM for both concerts. We have also requested permission from the city of Lincoln to park on Del Webb Blvd.

Shuttle Service: For the Frankie Avalon concert, we project about 2,000 attendees! Parking will be a challenge so we are offering free bus shuttles from KS to OC Lodge on August 14. The shuttle will provide service to OC beginning at 6:00 PM and will begin return trips to KS immediately following the concert. Guests arriving to KS after 7:00 PM cannot be guaranteed arrival to OC prior to the start of the 7:30 PM concert. Seats on the shuttle are first-come, first-served. The KS social and fitness facilities will close at 6:00 PM to accommodate concert parking at KS. Complete information regarding the shuttle service and available parking options are available at the Activities Desks. This is a great challenge to have! Thank you for your support.

Association Management Continues to Find Improvements

Financial results through May demonstrate that your Association



Management continues to find improvements in running our operations. As noted below, all departments except one are better than Budget. May results were \$58,578 better

than Budget, making our year to date results \$250,960 ahead of Budget.

At our Finance meetings we hear

about improvements that Operations are making such as reducing IT costs and improved results at The Spa at Kilaga Springs and the Food & Beverage Department. This month The Spa and Food & Beverage showed profits of \$2,249 and \$39,463 respectively. While some items are more noticeable, all departments should be recognized for making contributions to keeping our costs down.

As of the end of May, we had \$4,770,696 in the Operating Fund

including \$396,035 in Restricted Funds and \$1,643,259 in the ADA & Construction Settlement Fund. Our Reserve Fund balance was \$4,942,153 at month end. Our policy is that all funds are in FDIC-insured accounts or US Treasuries.

May saw our typical decline in the number of homes with past due assessments to 155 homes for a total of \$99,900 past due. In the comparable month of February we had 155 homes late for a total of \$101,900.

At our next Finance meeting we will hear department mid-year updates and all are encouraged to hear what each department head has to say.

that make this community a desirable place to live and can be summed up with these three little words, "It's the Lifestyle."

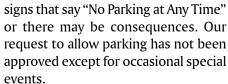

to Nature's heart, and break clear away once in awhile, and climb a mountain or spend a week in the woods. Wash your spirit clean."

hat could be better than walking outdoors in our natural environment? Absolutely nothing, according to the Hiking Group here in Lincoln Hills. Founded in 2000, their membership has soared to approximately 140 members.

Hikes are typically scheduled weekly and are rated: *easy*, *moderate*, and *strenuous*. An "easy" hike could be four flat miles, and a "strenuous" hike could be up to twelve miles at a 1,500 to 7,500 foot elevation.

According to the Hiking Club President, Dennis Ratay,

we are fortunate to live in "hiking heaven." Most hikes take place in the Sierras and the Auburn State Recreation area. Longer day trips can be up to 120 miles from Lincoln and include the Bay Area, Marin Headlands, Mt. Tam, San Francisco (via ferry), Carson Pass, Kirkwood area, and Lake Tahoe.

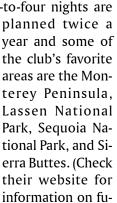

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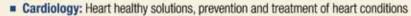

Preventive Maintenance

The Scoop on Poop

In the field of paleontology,



finding fossilized feces called Coprolites from some ancient species is an exciting and wonderful clue about the dietary behavior of that

creature. However, in the here-andnow, when you are so constipated that you think that you are pooping a Coprolite, it is neither exciting nor wonderful news. You will likely be suffering from significant abdominal pain and perhaps other symptoms. One thing is certain: the contents of your bowel are a clue to your fluids, dietary intake, and other lifestyle behaviors.

The gastrointestinal process starts with what enters the alimentary canal, the mouth. A swallow empties it down the esophagus and passes through the cardiac sphincter into the stomach. Once mixed up with some hydrochloric acid, the stomach contents pass through the pyloric sphincter into the upper part of the small intestine called the duodenum. Those contents are then acted upon by bile from the liver, or from the gallbladder storage reservoir, and then by digestive enzymes from the pancreas. On its journey through the small intestine, the contents give up those digested parts that can be absorbed through the intestinal wall into the blood stream. From the small intestine, the unabsorbed contents pass through the ileocecal valve into

the large intestine. In the large intestine, also called the colon, the alimentary contents give up much of their fluid through the ongoing absorp-



tion process. Finally, at the end of the colon is the rectum where the contents are excreted through the anus.

Just as one can develop varicose veins on the legs, one can develop varicose veins around the anus, called hemorrhoids. Straining to poop and sitting on the toilet for long periods with the rectal muscles relaxed are common causes of hemorrhoids. Therefore, don't sit and read on the toilet – poop or get off the pot! 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Lincoln High School Farm

Teens Plant Their Feet in Two Worlds

Just a few years ago Lincoln was a small town centered on farm and

ranch life. Now it is a city with a population of almost 43,000 and the challenges of growing urbanization. It is nice to note that some wholesome vestiges of the past are still here. One remarkable and lasting feature is the Lincoln High School Farm.

Throughout California there are several high schools with farms and agricultural curricula, but most of those claim just a few acres contiguous to the school campus. Lincoln High can boast the largest high-school farm in the West!

The 405-acre Lincoln High School Farm, a mile off Dowd Road west of Lincoln, got its start in 1974 when the McClellan Air Force Base donated 280 acres of its antenna farm to our Western Placer Unified School District. While it

took several years to get the land cleared for agricultural purposes, over the next 24 years, shops, a hay barn, fencing, and classrooms were added. In 2006, an additional 125 acres of wetlands were donated by Wildlands, Inc.

Today the farm has a small orchard, demon-

stration forest, cold water aquaculture facility, pens and corrals, hay and rice fields, pastures, wetlands, vernal pools, and an extensive bird sanctuary, all of which support the Agricultural Technology and Environmental Science curriculum of Lincoln High School. The four teachers of the professional staff provide instruction in a broad range of academic subjects, including agricultural science, biology, chemistry, metallurgy, welding & fabrication, farm power, agri-

cultural economics, and government. In addition, leadership development is fostered by mentoring enrolled students in Future Farmers of America. Much of the livestock on the farm belongs to students who show and sell their animals at the Placer County Fair.

Tours and Day Camps are conducted for middle school children as an introduction to farm-related education. An open house for the community is held each spring. Plans are underway for a fall open house and pumpkin fair — keep your eyes open for this announcement. There may be volunteering opportunities available through our SCHOOLS Program.

Students spend part of their days at the in-town high school, then are bussed to the farm for the specialized agricultural courses. The farm is self-supporting, with only classroom support as a cost to the school district.

It is an outstanding opportunity to live in a community with feet firmly planted in two worlds.

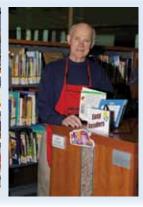

There has been quite a bit of discussion lately about tires. The general consensus (of both pros and folks in our club) is that one can deflate one's tires 10-20 lbs for more comfort, without sacrificing performance. While it is counter-intuitive, some studies have suggested slightly softer tires actually roll faster. One can also run slightly larger tires in the rear

for more comfort without causing any problems. Generally speaking, 40% of your weight is on the front tire, 60% on the rear, which explains why more flats and faster tire wear occur in back. If you are going to put on just one new tire, put it on the front. A 23cm/25cm or 25cm/28cm configuration might even give you longer tire life, especially if you are not a 145 lb sprinter. However, some bikes do not have enough fork clearance for anything above a 25 cm tire.

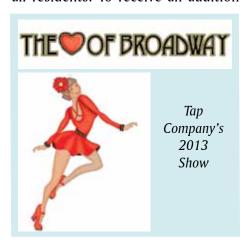

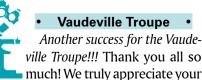

Many factors affect the transit of contents through the gastrointestinal system, including fiber intake, exercise, and other factors that influence peristalsis (progressive wavelike movements of the intestinal walls).
