The biggest most powerful objects that move through and around our Villages are, of course, automobiles. In addition, we have golf carts, bicycles,

In addition, your Board of Directors is well aware that parking at Kilaga Springs and the Sports Pavilion is sometimes a problem. Additional parking is being studied by our Properties Committee, although no easy solutions are apparent. In the meantime, we encourage our members to carpool when you can to help ease the demand for parking at these locations.

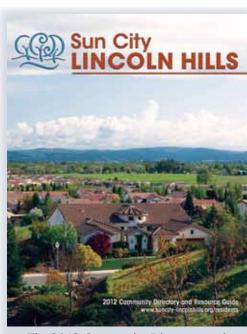

Answer: Your Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers! These volunteers are able and ready to help you in case of an emergency as they monitor Sun City Lincoln Hills' 2012 Summer Amphitheater Concerts.

The CERT volunteers are trained

and certified by the Lincoln Fire Department. The basic training course focuses on the development of critical skills that include but are not limited to: 1) first aid; 2) light search and rescue; and 3) fire safety. As a result, volunteers are better prepared to help themselves, family, friends, neighbors and

community in the event of medical emergencies, natural and humanmade disasters or other hazards that pose threats. Professional responders may not be able to reach victims right away so CERT volunteers are prepared to help professional responders save lives, protect property and assist with community recovery.

### You May Be Fit, But Are You Functionally Fit?

Functional Fitness is the hottest buzzword and biggest trend in

the world of fitness these days. Being functionally fit is learning to train your body for everyday situations and real life movement patterns. These movement patterns include twisting, bending, pulling, lunging, and squatting. Think about moving in a multi-joint, multi-plane pattern. You may think, "I can bench press 100 pounds at the gym; I don't need to worry about this." That's great but can you lift a suitcase in and out of your car without hurting your back? Can you pick up your grandkids and swing them around without pulling a muscle?

This doesn't mean you need to stop your regular strength regime at the gym. It means you need to think about why it is you want to be stronger. I doubt your main goal is to brag about the amount of weight you put on the leg press machine. Your goal is probably to be active longer and to carry out your daily living activities without pain... that's functional fitness!

Conventional weight training isolates certain muscle groups, yes, but it doesn't teach the muscles to move with other muscles or to reach out at different angles. Machines work in a single plane. Picking something up off the ground, doing laundry, putting dishes away are all movements that work in

multi-directional planes. To be honest, most of your lifting should be done in a standing position. We sit most of the day, so sitting to workout is not very challenging. You may want to consider starting with your own body weight. Can you control your body by doing a one-legged squat enough without falling

over? Start trying movements that build up control and balance with your own body before adding additional weight.

We have many Group Exercise classes and Small Group Training classes that promote this philosophy. We even have a Small Group Training Class that's called "Fun"ctional Fitness! Our TRX small group classes train you to use your body weight as resistance and our Strictly Strength group exercise classes teach you strengthening moves you can do without a machine. You can always sign up with a trainer or ask one of the fitness staff members for help or ideas. Let's get functional!

### Did You Know?

Our trails have trail name signs. Please consider carrying a cell phone and make note of the trail name in case there is an emergency along the way. Hat and sunscreen are a good idea too.

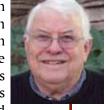
## The CC&Rs, Landscaping and You!

Architectural Review Committee Chair

The CC&Rs are the "Covenants.

Conditions and Restrictions" which apply to each of us as residents of Sun City Lincoln Hills. When we purchase a home we sign a contract that says we will abide by the CC&Rs and other rules adopted



to implement the CC&Rs such as the "Design Guidelines."

Section 7.02 of the CC&Rs, in general, requires homeowners to maintain their property so as to present a neat and attractive appearance. What this means is that landscape changes are to be submitted to the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) by the use of an application form and checklist available in the kiosk next to the Activities/Membership Desk (OC). The forms are also available online by going to the resident website, www.suncitylincolnhills.org/residents.

For landscape, plants and trees, the checklist is #16. The checklist requires a landscape or plot plan showing the type and size of plants. At least 40% of the ground service in the front yard, not planted with lawn, must be covered with living

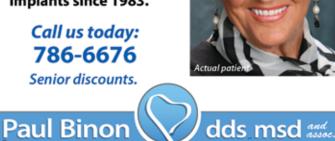

### Taking Care of 487 Acres of Lincoln Hills Property

Our committee is working on drawings for additional Pickleball courts as

well as an evaluation of our needs for additional parking and the basketball amenity. This leads me to think about what Chris O'Keefe, Sr. Director of Facilities and Maintenance, and his staff do all day every day — they maintain the items listed below. The work is done by staff employees and service contracts with specialty contractors.

They maintain 487 acres of land and buildings. In addition, one of the big daily tasks is the changing and set up of all rooms between functions. They also coordinate various tasks with the City, the Corp of Engineers, and the Fire Department. Chris is also the Wilder-

ness Director. A short list of the areas they are responsible to maintain are:

**Buildings:** Orchard Creek Lodge and Meridians Restaurant; The Wave Fitness Center, including the indoor and outdoor pools; Orchard Creek

parking lot and entrance roads (except for the portion maintained by golf course); Orchard Creek Lodge exterior deck and landscaping; Kilaga Springs Lodge; Kilaga Springs deck and oriental gardens; Kilaga Springs Fitness Center and swimming pool; Kilaga Springs parking lot; Maintenance buildings; Maintenance yard.

**Grounds**: Sports Plaza; Softball Field; Tennis Courts; Bocce Ball Courts;

## It's Great to See When a Plan Comes Together

Your Finance Committee is once again all smiles as all departments are

ahead of Budget year-to-date. April results were \$54,811 better than Budget and that brings us to \$192,388 better for the year. We have now completed and fully paid for the LED Street Lights as well as the Meridians Restaurant upgrade.

The big contributors to our positive results were Administrative and Food & Beverage at \$28,040 and \$24,901 ahead of Budget respectively this month. All other departments were very close to

budget. I might add that Food & Beverage turned a profit of \$23,534 for the month.

At the end of April we had \$5,495,467 in the Operating Fund and this includes \$395,875 in Restricted Funds and \$1,646,879 in the ADA & Construction Settlement Fund. Our Reserve Fund balance was \$4,993,433 at month end. In accordance with our policy, all funds are in FDIC-insured accounts or US Treasuries.

In April, our Controller Tim Mulligan resigned to take advantage of a unique opportunity and we wish him well in his

future endeavors. At our May 17 meeting, Bruce Baldwin was introduced. Bruce comes to us from C.A.H.P. Credit Union and is a CPA. We look forward to working with Bruce.

## Surviving a Stroke — Time is Critical!

Every 40 to 45 seconds, someone in the U.S. has a stroke. "Time lost is



brain lost" when it comes to stroke treatment, 9-1-1 should be called immediately when someone is having a stroke. The general rule is that proper treatment

given within one to three hours of the first occurrence of symptoms will be most effective in preventing permanent damage, disability, or death.

Strokes have various causes, but the most common is a blocked vessel from a clot. A clot-busting drug called tissue plasminogen activator (tPA) will break up the blockage and allow blood and oxygen to return to the affected part of the brain. Other things such as a cholesterol plaque or a ruptured blood vessel can cause strokes, and these require different treatments.

Common stroke symptoms include:

 Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm, or leg, especially on one side of the body

A Few Highlights from the Community Forum on Elder Financial Abuse

A stitch in time saves nine! Speakers at a recent Community Forum provided

valuable information on elder abuse.

Ninety percent of elder abuse is **theft**, according to Suzanne Gazzaniga, Placer County Supervising Deputy District Attorney. The perpetrators are usu-

ally family members or trusted helpers. Karen Bone of the Placer County Adult Protective Services cautioned against adding someone to your bank account. "When the money is gone, it's gone!" Every senior is a target for scams, explained Detective Sergeant Brian Whigam of the Placer County Sheriff's Office, and we're all seniors here in SCLH.

Lincoln Elder Law Attorney Therese Adams pointed out the potential legal problems of hiring home care assistance without going through a licensed agency. Of the eight cases of elder abuse brought to her law firm in the first four months of 2012, six were from SCLH.

"We are problem solvers," emphasized Karen Bone, "and

keeping people safe in their homes is our goal." The speakers all emphasized calling for professional help when there are concerns about a friend or neighbor. (All calls are confidential.)

### The Pleasures of Placer Produce

Al Roten, Roving Reporter

Go back in time to the period between the 1890's and 1950's and take a trip around the triangle bor-

dered by Lincoln-Loomis-Auburn. What do you think you would see? Surprise! The answer is that you would be traveling through seemingly endless fruit orchards! The era of fruit production followed on the heels of the Gold Rush, mining boom, and railroad development. As transportation systems improved, the earlier-ripening fruits to the south got to their destinations ahead of those of Placer County, flooding the market ahead of our locals. Then, in

1947 a pear tree disease wiped out those orchards, causing the commitment of land and efforts to more profitable endeavors.

Even though the period in which Placer County was the primary producer and shipper of fruits in all of California is passed, there still are many smaller acreage orchards and ranches in operation. In fact, we still are the leading growing area for Mandarin Oranges, and each November the Mountain Mandarin Festival is held in Auburn. Other primary fruits of the area are peaches, plums, pears, cherries, and persimmons. It is asserted that the cooler days and nights here produce sweeter, tastier quality of fruit than competing areas in the Central Valley.

There is a wonderful guide to Placer County Agriculture called "Placer Grown," a publication of Placer County Ag Marketing, available free at the Chamber of Commerce on 5<sup>th</sup> Street

in Lincoln. The guide lists ranches, farms, produce markets, and wineries of Placer County, along with addresses, phone numbers, and maps.

- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding
- Sudden difficulty seeing in one or both eyes
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, or loss of balance or coordination
- Sudden severe headache with no known cause

Some of the less common symptoms associated with stroke (more common in women) include:

- Sudden hiccups
- Sudden pain in the face, arm or leg
- Sudden nausea
- Sudden tiredness

The National Stroke Association has coined the mnemonic, FAST, to help identify a stroke:

• <u>Face</u>: Ask the person to smile. Does

one side of the face droop?

- Arms: Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?
- Speech: Ask the person to speak a simple sentence (e.g., the sky is blue).
   Are the words slurred? Is the sentence repeated correctly?
- <u>Time</u>: Stroke is an emergency! Call 9-1-1.

Sometimes the symptoms of a stroke will go away within a few minutes. This is called a "mini-stroke" or a "transient ischemic attack" (TIA) but it may herald a major stroke. Seek medical attention if you have a TIA as there may be medications or surgery to prevent you from progressing to a full-blown stroke. You can learn more about stroke by attending the presentation, "Time Is Brain" on June 20 (see page 86).

### Kilaga Springs: A Story of Mining and Magical Waters

We all enjoy the ambiance and attributes of Kilaga Springs Lodge. Some



of us recognize that our Lodge got its name from Kilaga Springs, located in the countryside off Mc-Courtney Road northeast of Lincoln. But there is an intriguing story about this

odd name that has become a part of our everyday lives.

In the early 1850s, Whiskey Diggins ditch, which furnished water to gold miners, gave rise to the Whiskey Diggins Mine (later called Valley View) at the end of the waterway. On this

90-acre site, some mines were vertical holes dug into the earth and others were horizontal tunnels in hillsides. Later, when gold played out, copper became the money-making metal.

In time, spring water filled the main horizontal mine shaft and flowed out onto the bed of mine tailings. Later it

DIRECTIONS FOR USING

was discovered that this water had a high mineral content that, when applied to the skin, had healing properties, said to cure eczema, itches, rash, poison oak, dandruff, athletes foot, cuts, abrasions, and various other skin conditions! A chemical analysis of the water shows that it was high in iron, aluminum, zinc, magnesium, sulfuric acid, and many trace elements.

In 1922, a three-member combine purchased the mine property and named it Valley View Products Company, the purpose of which was to market the mineral water, both in bottles and as a spa/resort. The owners of this enterprise, E.M. Kimberlin of Oakland, Judge J.B. Landis of Auburn, and E.C. Gaylord of Lincoln, created and promulgated the myth that the local Indians had used these waters for their magical healing power. Then they came up with the name **Ki-La-Ga**, or **Kilaga**, as a combination of the first

two letters of each of their last names. And Kilaga was born!

From 1923 until about 1940, Kilaga Springs mineral waters were sold in drug stores as a powerful and mystical healing product. Bottling works, a spa, and bathhouse were built and rebuilt after fires in the 1920s and early 1930s. Hard economic times of the Great Depression caused the company to close.

Today, the property is privately owned and is unsafe for exploration due to open pits and crumbling tunnels left behind by these enterprises of our heritage.

It is a tribute to the colorful past of our home locale that we have our Kilaga Springs Lodge.

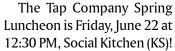

Continued from page 9 plants within one year of installation. The front yard must also have at least one tree.

The irrigation system must be a fully automatic "underground" system and be described on the plan. Note the word "underground." This word means under the ground, not just laid out on top of the ground, bark or rocks. There are many reasons for requiring the spaghetti tangle of irrigation pipes to be placed underground, but the main one is to meet the CC&R requirement of "neat and attractive appearance." Placing pipes underground also pro-

tects the pipes from damage due to the hot sun and prevents those working in the garden from tripping on the pipes and falling.

While the ARC approves the landscaping plans, it is the Compliance Committee that enforces any deviations from the plan. With few exceptions, this committee is the sole and final judge as to whether or not landscaping after installation has met the approved criteria and whether or not it is, at any given time, maintained properly to the standards established by the CC&Rs, the Design Guidelines and the application as approved by the ARC.
