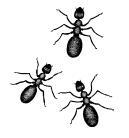

Our Association for the benefit of all residents pays the subscription costs for the following investment materials. They are stored in binders near the computer stations in KS Library.

The Value Line Stock Service: This covers 1700 stocks, with analyst comments for each. The index contains rankings for each stock and for type of performance, such as timeliness, dividends, safety, etc.

Morningstar Mutual Fund Service: This performs the same function

for 1500 Mutual Funds as Value Line Service does for stocks. Their rankings are by stars, five down to one, with five being the best.

Morningstar Fund Investor: This monthly booklet covers 500 Analystrecommended funds of the Morning-Continued on page 35

Grow Your Own Veggies?

David Stone, Compliance Committee Chair

Vegetable gardens are permitted in backyards and the annual plantings of vegetables do not require approval of the Architectural Committee (Design Guidelines sec. 100). There are some Design Guidelines limitations however and they are as follows: Vegetable gardens visible from neighboring property shall be maintained to keep weeds, debris, uncontrolled vines and dead plants to a minimum; plant supports such as poles, cages and trellises shall be in good condition; and garden implements, equipment and supplies shall be stored out of sight (100.1-.3). Vegetable

gardens should have an automatic drip or spray system.

For the planting area you can dig up a patch and add soil amendments or you can construct a raised bed using concrete blocks or redwood planks and fill the area with good



quality soil and fertilizer. Another alternative would be to use wine barrels. You can also intermingle flowers among your vegetables for some color. A colorful annual is "Nasturtium."

Consult your garden supply store as to what vegetables grow best here. We are in zone 9 in the *Sunset Garden Book*.

Consider joining the **Compliance Committee** which ensures that we all adhere to those rules and regulations we agreed to when we bought our homes. We are involved in resolving complaints about violations of our governing documents. We hold hearings where we listen to all sides of disputes, apply the laws and rules that are relevant, and determine

if a violation has occurred. If a violation is found, the matter goes to the Board of Directors who has the final say as to whether a fine or penalty is assessed. Applicants need only bring a willingness to listen, to consider the facts in an unbiased manner, and to apply common sense and fairness to their decisions. Applications can be found on the SCLH website, or at the Activities Desks (OC/KS).

How Much Water is Enough, Or Not!

By the time you read this, the LED street lighting project should be completed and we are all enjoying the newly-remod-

eled Meridians.

I have heard lots of nice comments about the upgrades, but the most common question is "have we lost tables and seating?" I asked Food & Beverage Director Jerry McCarthy this question and he reports that they change the tables around based on the event but the total number of tables and chairs has not changed. It just feels like it is more spacious and comfortable.

I hope you are also enjoying the new furniture in the Kilaga Springs Café and the refinished floors in the Multipurpose Rooms. Also, the water temperature in the pools (OC) should be more consistent due to new boilers.

Have you seen the strange white pole full of "whirlygigs" and "whatchamacallits" between the Sports Pavilion and the tennis courts? I asked Chris O'Keefe, our Sr. Director of Facilities and Maintenance, "What is that?" No, it's not art, but an automated weather station. It monitors the weather on a continuous basis, then does a wireless transfer of the data to the maintenance facility where it works with our existing Rainbird irrigation system to distribute more accurate irrigation scheduling, and helps to reduce water usage while still keeping our landscaping green and healthy. (I wish I had one for my home!) In the past we received this data from the golf course or city of Rocklin, but both of them changed systems so we had to purchase our own.

Your committee continues to work with

the Pickleball players to make a recommendation to the Board of Directors concerning the appropriate number of courts we should have.

Some Minor Adjustments to 2011 and January is Off to a Good Start

he Finance Committee accepted the audit report from our accountants that showed a net negative adjustment of \$25,125 for the year ended December 31, 2011 previously reported. The most significant item was caused by an incorrect estimated life for the Bocce Ball Courts that were re-surfaced in 2011. The fiscal year ended with a favorable variance to budget of \$382,411.

As shown on the chart, January

results were favorable to budget by \$35,713. Administrative expense was favorable by \$21,261 mainly due to professional expenses that will likely be incurred later in the year. The Spa continues to have higher revenues that result in better than budget results. Activities had lower revenues in the month but they were able to adjust spending to make up most of the shortfall. While Food & Beverage was very close to budget, the results were about \$29,000 worse than last year because of the renovations (that are now complete).

Having seen the improvements I am sure we will see better revenues over time. I am very pleased with the way our Association Staff adjusts and makes sure we get the best value for

our dues.

On January 31, we had \$5,478,525 in our Operating Fund. This includes \$488,252 in restricted funds and \$1,646,250 in settlement proceeds for ADA and construction defects. The Reserve Fund balance was \$5,577,115.

Per our policy, all funds are in FDIC-insured accounts or US Treasuries. It should be noted that as of January 31 we had not paid for the LED Street Light Project.

Homes with past due assessments at month end were 269 units and \$158,100 past due compared to 280 units and \$150,600 at the end of October. We continue to vigorously manage collections.

Vial of Life (VOL) current? SCLH resident Esther Brunetti was amazed at the way her VOL speeded her way to the hospital. "I could barely breathe," explained Esther, "but I managed to say one word to

the Emergency Medical Technicians, "refrigerator." The EMT's immediately retrieved my VOL from the top shelf of the refrigerator, read the medical information, and we were on our way."

A stitch in time saves nine when we expect the unexpected. Your Vial of Life can be there to help you if your information is up-to-date. This is also a good time to check the information on your wallet-sized Personal Medication Record card. They can speak for you when you cannot speak for yourself!

Yes, we should change both of these records each time we bring home a new prescription or change medical providers.

Every spring, Neighborhood Watch Captains revisit each resident to bring emergency information up-to-date for our Resident Contact Infor-

mation form. This information provides the names and telephone numbers to call if you or your house has an emergency. We have also accommodated frantic relatives from time to time who have been unable to contact their loved ones.

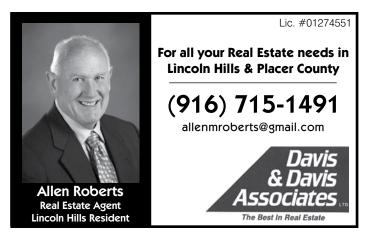

A Road to Riches

Take a drive out McCourtney Road

In and around Lincoln are many reminders of the rich historical heritage of

this area. One of my favorites is a drive down McCourtney Road, which begins near the north end of East Avenue in

Lincoln and takes you, in about 12 miles, to Camp Far West Reservoir. The beauty of the rural countryside is abundant all year round, but is most spectacular in the spring months of March and April. Beyond the natural beauty is the historical significance of the route.

What we now know as McCourtney Road was originally called The Old Spanish Trail. John McCourtney, an entrepreneur in the area during the 1848 California gold rush, settled on the north side of the Bear River and in 1850 built a bridge across it. This connected a trail from the Grass Valley gold mines

to the flatlands leading to Sacramento and civilization. The trail became Mc-Courtney Road, which established a new route from Nevada City to Sacramento through present day Lincoln. McCourtney built a small hotel and livery near the north shore of the Bear River to capitalize on travel between the mines and Sacramento. This route contributed significantly to later developments in the Western Placer area.

About a mile downriver was a U.S. Army post called Camp Far West, estab-

lished in 1849 to protect emigrants and settlers from local Nisenan Indians, who occasionally stole items from the interlopers, but were not warlike. The post was active only until mid-1852 when the Army moved a detachment to a more western outpost on the Sacramento River. Some soldiers were discharged at that time and stayed to work gold mines or settle on farms and ranches.

In 1962, a dam was built across the Bear River forming Camp Far West Reservoir. The backup of waters covered McCourtney's bridge site, resulting in longer routes to travel between Lincoln and Nevada City.

My recounting of local history is credited to Jerry Logan and the several books he has written about Lincoln and surroundings. These fascinating volumes

may be purchased at the newly-opened Lincoln Area Archives Museum located in the old City Hall at 640 5th Street. The museum is open Monday-Wednesday 9:00 AM-12:30 PM and Thursday-Friday, 9:00 AM-4:00 PM.

The Prostate: When Bigger is Not Better

Most men, if they live long enough, will have an enlarged prostate gland. Picture the prostate as normally being about the size and shape of an unshelled walnut. Then the analogy turns to a doughnut because the prostate has a hole going through the middle of it. Through this hole, the urethra carries urine from the bladder as well as being the path for seminal fluid to pass during sexual ejaculation. As the prostate enlarges, the hole in the middle gets

smaller. It does not take a rocket scientist to understand that a man will develop some symptoms if that hole gets too small.

Benign Prostate Hypertrophy or Hyperplasia (BPH) is the medical name for an enlarged prostate that has nothing intrinsically wrong with it such as infection or cancer. As long as the man is having no symptoms of obstruction from the smaller hole in the middle, then there is no treatment necessary for BPH. The key is to know whether the enlargement or other abnormality is benign or

potentially harmful. To that end, men need to be checked regularly in an effort to find any signs of prostate cancer which is quite common in older men.

The most important initial evaluation of the prostate is done by the digital rectal exam (DRE). Yes, guys, this is recommended to be done annually. The physician will be able

to tell by the "finger wave" whether there are lumps or bumps, whether the prostate is abnormally tender, and to estimate its size. These findings plus the man's history and symptoms will help determine the need for further investigation. Since the National Preventive Health Task Force came out in 2011 serving notice that the PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) will no longer be considered a reliable *screening* tool for prostate cancer, the medical community is split in opinion on the use of that blood test. There will still definitely be times that the PSA is a useful test, but this should be discussed with your physician.

As with any cancer, prevention or at least early detection of prostate cancer is the ideal. At times, the best treatment is "no treatment," but at other times it can be life-saving to treat prostate cancer.
