



The **2007** Strategic Advisory Report for Sun City Lincoln Hills followed the transition from Pulte/Del Webb management



to resident management and contained recommendations for maintaining an active adult community as established by Del Webb. The recommendations were oriented toward the com-

munity as a whole and based on the posttransition experiences – successes as well as pitfalls – learned from older Del Webb Communities. These recommendations were also supported by information from interviews with staff at that time and results from a short survey of the residents.

The work of the **2012** Strategic Advisory Committee (SAC) focuses on the specific needs of the residents of our community as determined by a baseline survey, data and information from staff, and a review of the 2007 report. This committee's recommendations may be incorporated into a Strategic Framework,

a guide or "road map," identifying specific goals, expectations, and proposals for SCLH during the next five years. The Framework may include methods for measuring progress toward and fulfillment of these expectations by annual or periodic checks between 2012 and 2017.

presented to the SAC a draft of the quantitative resident survey findings.

The preliminary findings showed a very high percentage of the residents participating in the July telephone survey are currently very satisfied with the services, programs, and amenities offered at SCLH and rate the quality of life either "excellent" or "good." At the same time, further study of these survey results point

out at least five areas or issues requiring further study. In early September, BWR provided cross tabs, linking factors such as age, gender, years of residency, and utilization of facilities and services to the number and types of responses. This additional information will enable the SAC to do further analysis of the identified areas.





You May Be Thin But Are You Healthy The Facts on Being "Skinny Fat"

Appearances are often deceiving. A common mis-

conception in today's society is that a thin person is healthy and an overweight person is unhealthy. A person may look visibly skinny but that doesn't always mean they are healthy. It can actually be considered worse if you are skinny and out of shape versus fit and slightly overweight.

Many people, especially older individuals, don't see a problem weight-wise when they step on the scale but are very surprised when they get their body fat tested. We have a lot of residents who are shocked to find they are in an unhealthy range for body fat, especially if they are thin. They are considered "skinny fat," which means they lack muscle and tend to have more fat than lean tissue. It has been found that skinny fat people tend to have

higher blood sugar levels, higher blood pressure levels, and more fat around their organs. These individuals usually don't have the same motivation for exercise as someone who needs to work out to lose weight. The opposite is true for those who may look slightly "thicker" but are in shape. These people have a greater desire

to work out, usually test lower in body fat, and reap all the other healthy benefits of exercise such as lower blood sugar and blood pressure levels.

If you think you are skinny fat or have a higher amount of fat than lean tissue,

your first step would be to start a weight training or resistance training program to increase your muscle mass. Orchard Creek Fitness Center offers body fat testing every first Thursday of the month in the Wellness Center. There is No Big Brother in Lincoln Hills

A common question I am often asked when a resident learns I am on the

Compliance Committee is, "Does the committee patrol the streets of Lincoln Hills to seek out and find violations so that the owners can be brought in for hearings?" The question seems to suggest that the Association engages in a type of "Big Brother" activity and not in the charitable sense.

The term "Big Brother" has its literary source in George Orwell's novel 1984. One definition of the term reads, "...the head of a totalitarian regime that keeps its citizens under close surveillance." I can assure you there is no Big Brother in Lincoln Hills.

Alleged violations of our Governing Documents come to the attention of Community Standards and the Compliance Committee mainly in two ways. The overwhelming majority of all cases are triggered by a resident complaint, either on a complaint form available at the Membership Desk or on the Associa-

tion website. These are submitted to the Community Standards Manager who will follow up by interviewing the complainant and/or the owner involved, or by a visit to the site of the alleged violation. The other most frequent way is the observation by the Community Standards Manager of a potential violation while she is out in the community following up on a resident complaint. There is no concerted effort by staff or committee members to regularly canvass the community with the express purpose of finding violations.

The goal and the culture of both staff and the committee is to resolve violations by working with owners in a collaborative and cooperative manner to find the easiest, least expensive, and most peaceful solutions. This approach is very successful as the number of cases coming before the committee for discipline has been declining for several years. This is attributable to dedicated work by staff and the committee, and as importantly, to the responsible actions of our fellow residents who care for the integrity of our community.

Solid Financial Results Year-to-date and No Change in 2013 Dues

eptember is always a busy month for your Finance Committee and this year we held three Budget meetings plus our regular Finance Meeting on September 20. August results continue better than budget with operating activity \$87,653 favorable to budget. This brings our year-to-date (YTD) positive variance to \$356,826 better than budget. Some of the highlights were a profit of \$10,284 at The Spa at Kilaga Springs, Activities \$13,224 better because of the excellent concert

results and a profit of \$17,727 for Food & Beverage.

As of August 31, the Operating Fund had a balance of \$5,129,381 of which \$396,275 were in the 'Restricted' Building/ Capital Enhancement Fund and \$1,645,578 in Settlement Proceeds. The Reserve Fund balance was \$5,090,522. In accordance with our policy, virtually all of our funds are in FDIC-insured accounts or US Treasuries.

There were 155 homes with past due assessments totaling \$95,400. This fol-

lows our typical quarterly fluctuations and is in line with expectations.

Our budgeted dues for 2013 will remain \$104 per month. At our Budget meetings, each de-

partment head explained their plans to improve performance and contain costs to reach this figure. I only wish we had better attendance at our meetings so that you could see the well thought-out plans and professionalism of our staff. They are to be commended for their dedication and hard work. The Board also approved \$389,003 in Capital Improvements which will be funded from the 'Restricted' Building/Capital Enhancement Fund that is funded from prior year excess revenue over expenses. All together this allowed us to keep our Association's dues at \$104.

Over the past four years I have watched the improvements in the budget process that are making the job of the Finance Committee a lot easier. Soon you will receive the detail budget package that explains our budget in much greater detail.

We have a current open position on the Finance Committee and two other members will term out early next year. I encourage any interested residents to apply to join us on this important committee.







A Day Trip for the Season

Apple Hill & Placerville *Al Roten, Roving Reporter*

es, this is the season for getting away for a delightful day of exploring, with the promise of eating well and bringing home more than memories. I recommend an excursion to Placerville and Apple Hill. We begin with a cross-town drive to Highway 50, heading east toward South Lake Tahoe. On that trail we are soon out of cityscapes and cruising through beautiful undulating hills covered with oaks and conifers of endless varieties.

Within 50 miles, we are in the town of Placerville, also known as Hangtown. If it is already lunch time, we may stop to eat and explore here, but I recommend that we hurry on about seven miles to Camino, the entry to Apple Hill.



Apple Hill is not a single place; it is an area of more than 50 orchards, commercial compounds, and craft-fair grounds. These range from a small parking spot with a nearby fruit stand to sprawling acres of crafts booths with surrounding bakery and restaurant aromas. And it's all connected by miles of country roads meandering through the forested and planted hillsides. Maps are available for viewing and downloading at www.applehill.com.

In the early 1960s a disastrous pear blight caused local growers to switch to apples. Then, in 1964, a local team invited members of the press to come and sample fresh cider and apples. They also distributed thousands of grocery bags with a printed offer of free apples if people brought the bags back to be filled. This began the annual fall season trek to Apple Hill.

Now, we may sample and purchase not



only several varieties of apples, but pears, berries, nectarines, and many varieties of fall vegetables. Of course, apple pie is a specialty at some of the stops with cider, local wines, and food from sandwiches to mouth-watering barbecued chicken. We may eat in a restaurant or take our food and drinks out under the trees.

If we have resisted eating too much during the Apple Hill tour, the short jaunt back to Placerville will avail us of a wide range of restaurant selections. It may be time to work off the calories by walking the colorful main street. With a visit to Placerville Hardware, we may recapture the gold mining era by viewing the slot in the counter where gold dust was brushed after weighing.

We return home with goodies and memories of exploration.


