Board of Directors Report

Gay Mackintosh, Secretary, SCLH Board of Directors

"To be the most desirable active adult community on the West Coast, providing residents with an extraordinary experience in an attractive environment." This is the vision for Sun City Lincoln Hills developed by the Strategic Advisory Committee (SAC). According to the SAC's 2012 resident survey, many of us feel we're already there.

How can we best use our resources to fulfill this vision?

The SAC's Strategic Framework calls

for an ongoing effort to build on our strengths and adapt to changing circumstances. That special committee dedicated more than 4,000 person-hours in assessing the current state of our community and developing proposals to keep our vision always in

sight. The Board of Directors held an open workshop with residents on March 20 to review those proposals.

At the March 28 Board meeting, we acted on recommendations in the areas of governance, facilities, remaining competitive with similar communities, life transitions, and ongoing strategic frameworks. We agreed to promote better interaction among committees and use multi-discipline task forces to evaluate and justify significant investment projects. To encourage volunteerism, committees and the Board will expand recruiting efforts, maintain a shared file of applicants, and participate in

the upcoming Volunteer Symposium.

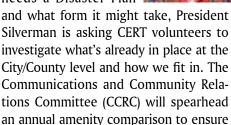

that our community remains competitive in attracting new active adult residents.

The 2012 survey revealed that 77 percent of residents intend SCLH to be their last home and 54 percent would like the Association to play some role in easing life transitions.

The SAC suggested considering options that don't involve operating or financing direct services. In response, the Board has authorized a task force to develop an educational outreach program focusing on challenges to aging in place.

Finally, to keep us on track, the Board is appointing a team to audit progress quarterly on the SAC proposals and update our strategies. Annual demographic analyses and resident surveys will monitor trends to enable timely course corrections.

Your participation at committee and Board meetings will help realize our shared vision.

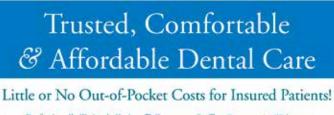

Activities Classes Open to Guests and Public

Purpose: To extend Activities Class registration to include guests and public for selected classes. Classes open for outside registration will include the following:

- Lecture type classes held in Presentation Hall (KS)
- Classes recommended to be taken with a partner; e.g. Country Couples Western Dance, West Coast Swing, Ballroom Dance

Justification:

 Singles and/or residents whose partners are infirmed or not interested in dancing have a difficult time learning

- the dance because of the absence of a regular partner. Although some classes provide a partner for students without partners, having a partner that you normally dance with at events/parties makes for a better, faster and more enjoyable learning experience.
- Students without partners may have to wait for their turn to dance with the designated partner to be available when more that one "single" student is enrolled in the class.
- Allowing a regular guest partner to enroll in the class

- will enhance not only the learning experience but also the social and leisure interests of residents.
- Lecture classes held at Presentation Hall (KS) allow a large number of registrants which if maximized, can provide high revenue for the Association.

Procedure:

- Lecture classes held at Presentation Hall (KS) guests/ public may register after RSVP date to prioritize residents' needs. Priority registration is provided to residents with a two-week cut-off prior to class start date.
- Classes with Partners residents must register their guests. Guests may not register themselves independently of resident; resident must provide guest's name and birth date upon registration. Resident will be responsible for their guests' behavior. Guests will sign a hold harmless form prior to start of class session.
- A premium fee will be added to public purchase for classes.

Do Not Go There... Please!

The "There" mentioned in the title of this article refers to the Lincoln Hills Open Space Preserve. Under a permit issued by



the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, allowing Del Webb to develop Lincoln Hills, and to mitigate the loss of waters and wetlands, Del Webb set aside some 489 acres as a preserve

protected in perpetuity by a conservation easement awarded to the Wildlife Heritage Foundation.

The goal of the easement is to preserve the abundance and diversity of the native plant and animal species in the Open Spaces. To protect these spaces, the easement provides very specific and

mandatory restrictions on the activities allowed in the preserves. Among the many activities prohibited are off-trail pedestrian or pet access, depositing any type of vegetation or debris on the preserve, watering, planting or applying herbicides or pesticides, trimming or maintenance of any vegetation, removing or adding any rocks, minerals or vegetation, feeding any animals or birds, storing or dumping any wastes, fill materials, or goods, operating motorized vehicles, and failing to remove pet waste. A full list of these restrictions can be found in the governing documents on the Association website or at Orchard Creek Lodge.

What does this mean to our residents? If you live in a residence on an Open Space, do not allow your sprinklers to overspray, do not mow, weed, spray or otherwise dis-

turb the natural habitat over your knee wall, do not store or dump furniture or gardening or construction debris on the Open Space, and do not access or allow visitors to access the preserve. Enjoy the preserve from the comfortable confines of your property.

If you use the trails, stay on the trails (pets too!), pick up pet waste, do not remove any vegetation or rocks, and do not bring your golf cart or other motorized vehicle on the trails. Enjoy the preserve from the comfortable confines of the well maintained trails (*see photos*).

Our uses and maintenance of the Open Spaces are monitored by various agencies and if we violate the restrictions, the Association can be severely penalized. Further, if maintenance of the Open Spaces as an important element of our lifestyle and property values is not sufficient incentive to respect these habitats, a violation can bring you to hearing before the Compliance Committee, with recommended fines beginning at \$300. Our Open Spaces are a valuable asset of Lincoln Hills. Let's appreciate them and preserve them for ourselves and future residents of our fabulous community.

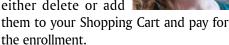
A few items to point out:

Logging in Online: When you login to the Resident Website, make sure that the top of the screen says "Welcome, (Your Name)!" Ensure that the Events/Classes page welcomes you by name. By doing this, you are assured that your login has been successful and secure.



Wishlist: You may have noticed an icon that looks like a scroll near the shopping cart of Trips and Classes. You can click on this icon to add the enrollment to your Wishlist. When you are ready to enroll, click on "Wishlist" at the top of the page, then add each item on your Wishlist to

Timing Out: To keep the registrations pool available, your session will time out after 20 minutes of inactivity and your shopping cart will be emptied. Because of this, it is a good idea to add items to your wishlist, and then transfer them over to your shopping cart when you are ready to make payment.

Will Call: We have simplified ticketing for online buyers. No need to locate an email or waste precious printer ink, we will do the printing for you! On the day of the event, stop by the Activities Desk at the location of the event, any time after

12:00 PM, and you can pick up your event ticket. No need for an extra trip to the Lodge or early arrival to get your tickets as the Will Call process is sure to be smooth and timely. Other benefits of standardized tickets include increased ticketing security, easily verified

information, more efficient collection from ticket takers and, of course, smoother entry into events.

It's All about Safety and Accessibility

ast year the Association received a monetary settlement from Pulte to upgrade our facilities to meet the



requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). A comprehensive review of these requirements identified 180 corrective actions. The two areas requiring the most attention are wheel chair

safety and accessibility and safety for the visually impaired.

Wheel chair safety was the reason for the major project at the Presentation Hall to reduce the slope of the aisles. This project, completed earlier this year, also included provision for a portable ramp to allow access to the right side of the stage. The current upgrade of the Amphitheater includes leveling of the concrete area in front of the stage and correcting the slope of walkways. The photo shows our newly constructed stage and the work being done on the walkway. Safe access to the pool at Kilaga Springs is provided by a poolside lift device. Similar lift devices

will be added to the lap pool at Orchard Creek, and the spas in both Fitness Centers to benefit wheel chair users and those with ambulatory difficulties.

A second ADA requirement for wheel chairs is to ensure the occupant can easily utilize items such as water fountains, bathroom fixtures, countertops, and sinks. It is also necessary to provide tables that allow sufficient leg room in our Libraries and other rooms. The drinking fountains at Orchard Creek and the Sports Pavilion have already been lowered, and further

accessibility items have been identified for implementation throughout our facilities.

The applicable ADA requirements for the visually impaired fall into three categories: signage, detectable warnings, and protruding objects. Signage is governed by the ADA requirements on location and size of lettering. Detectable warnings include truncated

domes (the knobby yellow metallic plates on sidewalks warning of transition into areas with vehicular traffic) and grooves in the sidewalk to indicate a ramp. Protruding objects are items such as wall-mounted display cases that unsafely extend into walkways. There are many items in these three categories that will be corrected in our buildings and parking lots.

The completion of these ADA improvements will enable fuller and safer utilization of our great facilities for those of us who can benefit from these fixes now, and for those of us who will benefit in the future.

Aging Well

The Skeleton in You

Perhaps not everyone has a skeleton in the closet, but everyone has a skeleton



inside of his or her body. Your 206 bones are actually living, growing tissue made up of three components that make them both flexible and strong: collagen that gives bones

some flexibility, calcium-phosphate mineral complexes forming hard and strong bones, and living bone cells that remove and replace bone tissue that is weakened.

Your bones are subject to changes as you age. A peak bone mass is reached and then you start to slowly lose more bone than you form. Both men and women usually have increased bone loss starting in middle age, a condition referred to as osteopenia or osteoporosis. Due to a sharp drop in estrogen, it is estimated

that women can lose up to 20 percent of their bone density in the five to seven years after menopause.

Osteoporosis means "porous" bone. It means that the bones have lost density or mass. Decreased bone density means weaker bones which are more likely to break. The National Osteoporosis Foundation estimates that about 10 million Americans have osteoporosis and that about 34 million are at risk of developing it. They further estimate that 50% of women over 50 and one in four men will suffer a fracture in their lifetime due to osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis is a "silent" disease that can sneak up on you because you can't see it or feel it. Unfortunately, a bone fracture is often the first symptom. The uncontrollable risk factors for osteoporosis include being over age 50, being female, menopause, family history, and being too small and thin. However, there are risk factors that you can control such as not getting

enough calcium or vitamin D, not eating enough fruits and vegetables, getting too much protein, sodium and caffeine, having an inactive lifestyle, smoking, and drinking too much alcohol.

A host of health conditions may cause bone loss: rheumatoid arthritis, inflammatory bowel disease, weight loss surgery, diabetes, hyperthyroidism, premature menopause, testosterone and estrogen levels in men, blood and bone marrow disorders, and eating disorders to name a few. Many prescription and over-the-counter medications such as aluminum-containing antacids, Prilosec, Prozac, and Prednisone can contribute to osteoporosis. 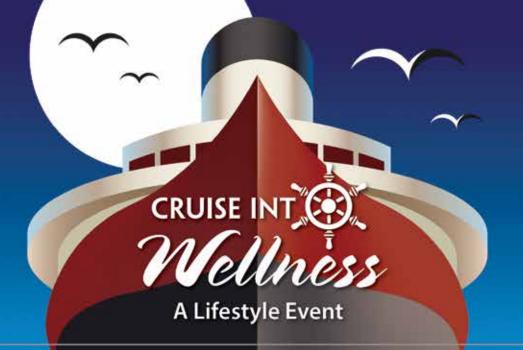

Thanks Go to Two Committee Members Terming Out **Finances Remain in Good Shape**

It's April and spring and change is in the air. It is time to say a big thank you

to committee members Mike Hilton and Carl Gronau for serving on the Finance Committee for four years. They have helped keep our Association running well and financially strong and

having completed their maximum term, will be moving on. Our community is very fortunate to have volunteers such as Mike and Carl that selflessly donate their time to all of us.

February results show our Association continues to run favorable to budget. The month overall had a favorable variance to budget of \$17,197 and brings us to \$71,703 favorable for the year. Administrative showed favorable results due to lower professional expenses. With revenue 18% above a year ago, the Spa at Kilaga Springs

> was able to show a profit \$3,487 in spite of the expansion going on. Rec. Center Maintenance was also better

than budget with \$10,642 favorable and offset the higher utility costs that caused Landscape Maintenance to have a negative variance of \$9,515. Lastly, lower revenue at Food & Beverage caused us to have a negative variance to budget of \$20,527.

Operating Fund cash showed a balance of \$4,940,449 at month end, with \$913,980 in restricted Building/Capital Enhancement Fund and \$1,565,513 in the Settlement Proceeds Fund. Our Reserve Fund had a balance was \$4.583.440. All of our funds are in FDIC-insured accounts or US Treasuries per our policy.

Homes with past due balances declined to 161 units and at total of \$88,900 owing. This is in line with past quarter.

A Grab & Go bag is a duffle bag or back pack containing at a minimum:

- Water (four 16 oz. bottles)
- 24 hour supply of ready-to-eat food
- Pet food, medications and water bowl
- A complete change of seasonal clothing and comfortable shoes
- Check book and cash

- Copies of important documents and prescriptions
- Medications, toiletries, an extra phone charger and address book

Until the all clear sounds, you'll have the essentials needed to make an evacuation bearable.

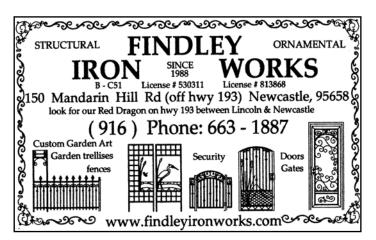

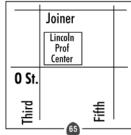

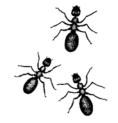

Program: Limit of coverage is \$1 million per claim afforded to club members with Sun City Lincoln Hills Community Association listed as an additional insured.
