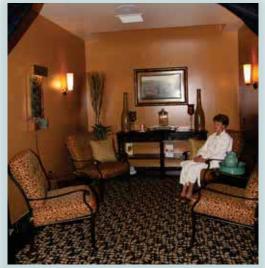

Changing Rings around Our Trees To Preserve Trees in Our Common Areas

Beginning in mid-February you may have seen a phenomenon developing around trees in grassy areas of our many landscaped common areas. At first, circles of close-cut grass appeared, then the grass died, then was cut out and bark

appeared. Why was this happening?

Chris O'Keefe, Senior Director of Facilities provided this logical explanation:

Our arborist recently completed a detailed tree management plan. One of the recommendations was to install mulch rings around trees planted in turf areas to accomplish the following:

- Reduce the potential for damage from landscape equipment;
- Help retain moisture and cool tree roots;
- Move nutrients from the mulch into the tree root zone.

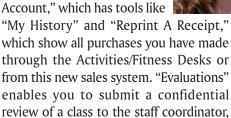

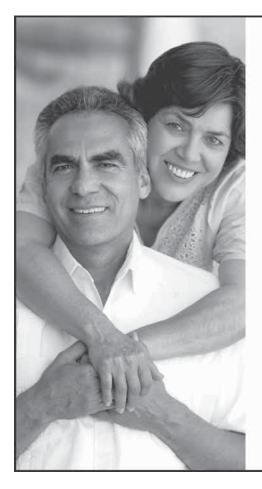

It should be noted that in nature, leaves fall from the tree and provide this mulch base naturally, which provides nutrients essential to the tree's health. We also find that in narrow turf strips the competition for water between the trees and the turf leads to the spread of subsurface tree roots which in turn inhibits the ability of the turf to establish itself.

This is another example of our membership dues being put to work to keep our community of Lincoln Hills beautiful — a place we may enjoy with pride.

Two other projects will be underway in the near future. The tile floor at the Orchard Creek indoor pool will be replaced with non-slip materials. This project will start later this month and take 10 days to complete. The addition of three more pickleball courts will begin about April 10, and will require six-to-eight weeks to complete.

Finally, if the sheep and goats are not here by the time you read this article, they should be grazing in our open space before the end of March.

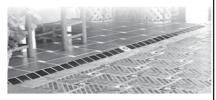

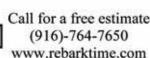

A Few Adjustments to 2012 and a Good Start to the New Year

Hank Lipschitz, Finance Committee Chair

The Finance Committee this month received the 2012 Audited Financial Statements from our new CPA

firm, Levy, Erlanger & Company. The report had a few adjustments that decreased our positive variance to budget by \$45,798 for the year. The adjustments were caused by a loss on disposal of retired gym equipment, late billing for water (from Golf Course) Unemployment Tax accruals and adjustment of vacation accruals. These adjustments brought the total favorable variance to budget for 2012 to \$250,861.

January results show a \$55,082 variance favorable to budget. Administrative expense was favorable because of lower postage, computer and professional services. Fitness had strong revenues and lower wage expenses, Rec Center/Maintenance favorable results were from lower personnel costs and lower utilities. Landscape Maintenance was positive because of lower Preserve Maintenance and lower than expected Utilities. Activities had a very strong month, with revenue 47% ahead of budget and 58% better than last year. We sold out on seven of ten trips and excellent results from shows generated lots of interest from our residents. Food & Beverage was close to budget with higher than Plan sales. We had an exceptional turnout for New Year's Day brunch.

The Operating Fund had a balance of \$5,547,313 at month end including \$921,376 in restricted Building/Capital Enhancement Fund and \$1,578,100 in the Settlement Proceeds Fund. Reserve Fund had a balance was \$4,873,078. All of our funds are in FDIC-insured accounts or US Treasuries per our policy.

The number of homes past due jumped to 271 likely tied to some members feeling too much of a New Year hangover (I hope). The amount past due increased to \$126,600 which is not too far from our recent history. I recommend that you enroll in the auto bill pay. Forms can be downloaded from the website or ask at the Orchard Creek Membership Desk.

Disaster Preparedness: Part Three What to Buy and How to Store It

fter a disaster strikes, grocery stores may be closed and water service could be disrupted. As a general rule, you should store two weeks worth of non-perishable food and water in your house.



Here are a few of the things I like to keep on hand.

- Water minimum of one gallon per person, per day. I recommend 50 gallons for a family of two.
- Store foods that are pre-cooked such as canned hams, chicken breast, tuna, and everyone's favorite, Spam.
- Round out meals by using a variety of canned fruits and vegetables.
- Dried beans and whole grain rice can supplement meals made with canned meats and vegetables; consider 25 pound sacks of each.

between having cancer or high blood pressure, most of you would choose high blood pressure. This mythical example is used to help put the potential for dying of cancer in to proper perspective. According the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data, around twice the number of people die every year from conditions related to high blood pressure such as heart disease, strokes, and kidney disease than those who die from all types of cancers.

Cancer certainly is not always fatal, and, in many instances, is preventable. Terminology and specifics are important in understanding a condition. People often assume that if the word "tumor " is used, it is cancer. In fact, a tumor is a lump or enlargement and can be benign or malignant. In this sense, a pimple is a benign tumor.

Perhaps the very tendency to not seek screening for early detection is one of the reasons that more men than women die from cancer. However, the overall lifestyle

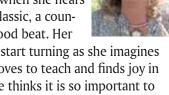
Sandy Gardetto

- Keep two five-pound sacks of flour in your pantry.
- Peanut butter and crackers are always tasty.
- Pre-cooked canned pastas such as raviolis and spaghetti are easy to prepare.
- Canned soups and bouillon cubes store well.
- Dried salami and sausages add flavor to meals.
- Dehydrated milk is very useful.

Water can be stored in plastic jugs, or in foil bags that are kept in cardboard boxes. I use five-gallon water boxes and foil

bags from BePrepared.com because they are both easy to move and reasonably priced.

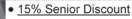
Dry goods should be stored in air tight containers. I use five-gallon food storage pails sealed with Gamma Lids from Winco Foods in Rocklin.

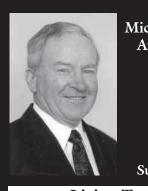

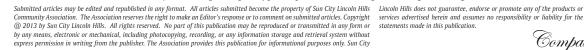
