Why the Dues Increase?

Board of Directors Report

Nobody likes a dues increase. And believe me, nobody likes one less than those of us on the Board who must explain why it's necessary.

At our September meeting we approved raising our monthly Association dues from \$104 to \$107 for 2014. We did this after deliberating long and hard over recommendations from our expertly

staffed Finance Committee, following three budget meetings open to all homeowners.

Where will the \$3 dues increase go? We must provide now not only for 2014 operations but also for a healthy level of Maintenance Reserves projected through 2042.

Every third year we hire an outside firm of Reserves experts, as required by law, to go through an exhaustive on-site inventory of Association assets with a life expectancy of 30

years or less. The 2013 Browning Reserves Study anticipates repair and replacement of some \$15.5 million in assets over the next 29 years. About \$1.5 million of that had to be added this year to cover major items whose useful life now falls under 30 years (like Angler's Cove Dam) as well as to reflect more realistic replacement costs. Additional investment is therefore necessary to boost Reserves funding.

So \$2.13 of our \$3 dues increase is dedicated to Maintenance Reserves. To further bolster Reserves without impacting dues, the Board voted to immediately contribute \$171,000 from the Building/

Capital Enhancement Fund, the balance after the capital projects ap-

proved for 2014. Our goal is to ensure sufficient funding in Reserves to support our property values and protect homeowners from special assessments.

The balance of 87 cents in dues per household will support 2014 operations.

Despite substantial cost increases beyond our direct control — in health insurance, workers' compensation, utilities including water — staff in all departments have done an outstanding job of holding the line on expenses and implementing initiatives to cut costs while enhancing value for each of us.

Fortunately for us who must approve them, most everyone realizes that periodic dues increases are necessary to maintain our community's extensive facilities,

programs, grounds, and amenities in the face of rising costs at the level of quality we've come to expect.

Our dues remain remarkably low considering all we get for them. Since 2001, they've gone from \$97 a month to \$107 in 2014, a 10.3% increase. That's a \$10 increase over 14 years. Meanwhile, the Consumer Price Index has risen 32%. Had our dues kept pace with other prices, we would now be paying \$128 per month — well over the \$107 we'll pay next year.

Even at \$107, does anyone think we're not getting a great bargain here?

Our wonderful community is financially healthy and administratively well run. It is by our selection of dedicated and capable volunteers that these conditions continue. It is up to each of us as member stockholders of our fine corporate community to ensure election of candidates of our choice.

Doing the Right Thing

We have just completed the 2014 Budget and there was a healthy discussion at our final Budget meeting regarding reserve funding. Our reserve analysis covers all assets that have an expected life of 30 years or less and as our community has been in existence about 14 years we have some significant revisions. This means that some assets that were previously excluded because of an expected original life in excess of 30 years are now in the study. Our reserve fund is an approximation prepared by an

outside firm that projects our funding for the next 30 years. As a result of this year's study we needed to take actions to enhance

funding. The Finance Committee's recommendation and the Board's approval resulted in "doing the right thing" for the long term financial health of our community. Before I go into greater detail let's look at the results for this year.

As you can see from the accompanying chart we are currently \$180,186 ahead of Budget. August was favorable to budget by \$26,927 with all departments essentially

at or better than budget except for Landscape and Food & Beverage. Landscape variance was mainly caused by higher water rates and Preserve maintenance while Food & Beverage missed because of lower than expected Catering revenue.


As of August 31, the Operating Fund totaled \$4,499,877 of which \$237,281 was in Building/ Capital Enhancement Fund and \$1,325,270 are in the Settlement Proceeds Fund. The Reserve Fund balance was \$4,764,126.

At the end of August we had 151 homes with past due assessments of \$94,800 which is in line with the comparable month of May's 142 homes and \$85,800 past due.

Christine: Sure! Of course, it's a good idea to check with your doctor first but most likely he or she will tell you to "go for it"! We also have disease prevention and man-

agement programs. Great classes to start with could be Arthritis Foundation Land and Water, Basic Chair, and SGT- First Steps to Fitness. And if they're worried about osteoporosis or weak bones they could try a yoga class.

weights, stretch, and do chair aerobics to increase range of motion, improve muscle tone, and promote cardiovascular health.


Doug. Okay, but what about those who




Trigger Point: Gentle holding of pressure points allow muscles to release and relax.

Aging Well

The Bs in Your Belly

For some reason we English-speaking people tend to describe our symptoms of upper gastrointestinal (UGI) activity with



words that start with "B": belching, burping, and burning. The "B" words extend on down into the intestines with bloating and borborygmus (that's the medical term for the rumbling sound in

the bowel caused by the passage of gas). Everybody has experienced these symptoms at one time or another.

Although not always culturally acceptable in public, belching is a normal part of the digestive process. To counteract the social stigma against belching, the World Burping Federation (yes, you read that right!) was founded to conduct a series of belching competitions throughout the world in hopes of ushering in a new era where belching is accepted. The current World Burping Record is 18.1 seconds! On

a more serious note, if you are concerned that you are experiencing excessive belching, or if it is accompanied by persistent heartburn, sour taste in your mouth, or burning in the throat, you should discuss this with your doctor.

When you eat, your stomach produces acid that helps digest food. If this acid backs up or refluxes into the esophagus, it is called GERD (gastroesophageal reflux disease), and it causes pain or burning in the chest. With continued exposure to stomach acid, the esophagus may actually erode. Prolonged erosion could even lead to bleeding or cancer. Rather than frequently using over-the-counter antacids, which could mask a developing serious condition, it is best to seek medical attention. It is also unwise to use the overthe-counter H2 Blockers such as Prilosec. Pepcid, Zantac, etc., without first consulting with your physician, as some of these drugs may actually cause kidney damage.

Preparing for Increased Water Rates

Part One: Where Does our Community Get Its Water?

Pete Savoia, Properties Committee Chair We are all aware that our residential



water rates will be increased over the next several years, and these rate increases will also impact the Association's costs. To better understand how these rate changes may impact the Association, it is instructive to be aware of

the sources of water used by our community.

We obtain potable water from the city of Lincoln for the following:

- All buildings
- The neighborhood parks in Villages 16, 20, and 40 and the smaller parks on Blue Heron Loop
- The water features at both Lodges

- The waterfalls at the North and South entrances on Joiner Parkway
- Some of the landscaping adjacent to these entrances
- The swimming pools and spas at both Lodges

Our usage of potable water is about 34-44 million gallons/year, and will be subject to the same rate hikes as those for residential use.

The reclaimed water used for almost all of our landscaping is obtained through an agreement with Billy Casper Golf (BCG), owner of the golf courses. BCG acts as a utility, charging us for storage and transport, as well as for the water. This water is pumped to 23 connection points throughout the community. BCG stores this water

in two storage ponds and maintains a pump house for each location. The first is located along Hole #2 of the Hills Course, and is surrounded by Villages 16, 27 and 30. The second is along Ingram Parkway and includes the lower pond bordered by Angler's Cove, Hole #13 of the Orchard Course and Village 4. (See accompanying photos.) BCG's water comes from three sources: the Nevada Irrigation District (NID), the South Placer Wastewater Authority (SPWA) and rainfall. NID provides about a third, and SPWA about two-thirds of the water purchased by BCG. We purchase between 83-120 million gallons from BCG during the summer months. It is expected that the rates for water obtained from BCG will increase about 6-8% over the next year.

Currently, about 68% of our total expenditure for water is to the city of Lincoln, and 32% is to BCG.

At our Budget meeting on September 24, Staff presented the final budget proposals for 2014. Even though we are faced with higher insurance, utilities and general increases, the Operations portion of dues will increase just under 1% or 87 cents. As a result of the changes in the reserve study, we recommended that Funds in the Building/Capital Enhancement fund that will not be needed in 2014 be moved to the Reserve Fund. This amounted to \$171,000. In addition we recommended that the reserve contribution per residence be increased from \$13.25 per month to \$15.38. The committee is pleased that the Board approved these recommendations. We now have a plan to improve our funding levels over the next few years so that we

can retain our strong reserve position. This will result in Dues going up in January by less than 3% to \$107 per month, our first increase in three years.

I want to commend our Staff for their efforts during this budget process and we all need to recognize that our community is maturing and all of the great amenities we have need to be maintained at the level that reflects our standards.

Preparing for a Terrorist Attack *Bill Beal*


The 21st century will be remembered as the age of the terrorist. By taking a few


week, alternating between square and line dancing — he took up the latter 11 years ago here in Lincoln Hills.

eat right, and drink moderately." "Red wine," adds Betty, with a twinkle in her eye.







Behind the Scenes at Neighborhood Watch Alerts Annual Meeting/Dessert Potluck, Thursday, November 7

Have you wondered about our recent very few burglaries? Barry Johnson, our



Neighborhood Watch liaison with the Lincoln Police Department, recently discussed our "good luck" with me.

Several years ago a group of Rocklin hoodlums decided SCLH was an area of "affluent

and vulnerable" seniors. They made our lives miserable with frequent burglaries until Barry Johnson and Bruce Marovich, both retired San Francisco Police Department members, organized concerned citizens who guarded our seven entries and identified the culprits. Result: This group moved on.


Over 20 "walk-in" burglaries were the nightmare of last summer. A single criminal cased the neighborhoods until he found an unlocked door or window. Again, SCLH volunteers were organized and patrolled the streets in the wee hours. Result: A young

man is now serving eight years in prison.

So, what are we doing that has crime currently diminishing? "Residents began 'hardening access' by barricading garage back doors, putting a dowel in locked windows, and installing security screen doors," said Barry. "Residents are becoming more alert to unfamiliar pedestrians and cars, and noting an automobile license number and description 'just in case.' Most of all, more people are locking their doors."

Many local burglars now understand that SCLH is not "easy pickings," but that could change overnight. Criminals new to the area could find SCLH an attractive target. Unlocked doors and windows invite a "crime of opportunity."

When preparing your plan, review the previous Disaster Preparedness articles that appeared in the *Compass* this year, especially those on Emergency Action Plans, pets, building a Grab and Go Bag, and on water storage and purification. These articles can be found at www. suncity-lincolnhills.org/compass.html.

Identify several out-of-town contacts that your family can call or email. If you're

separated during an evacuation this will help you get reunited. Keep this information in your purse or wallet.

Have a predetermined meeting place outside of our community where family members will go to be reunited.

Be prepared to remain in your home even if utility services are disrupted for several days.

If disaster strikes:

- Remain calm
- Listen to your radio or TV for news

and instructions

- Follow the advice of local emergency officials
- Comply with all evacuation orders immediately and take neighbors who can't drive with you.

Next month we'll explore how to survive in your home without commercial power or running water. Until then, stay safe.

The 1973 Roseville Railroad Explosion


