Board of Directors Report One Pumpkin Spice Latte

At the September 24 meeting, the Board of Directors approved the 2016 Budget with an increase in dues—less than one Starbucks' Pumpkin Spice Latte a month.

September is budget month for the Community Association. The Properties and Finance Committees meet with staff to clarify needs, evaluate mandates, and propose a budget for the Board's approval. Fourteen committee members, eight staff, and seven directors attended the meetings, along with about ten interested residents. The Association's 2016 Budget is \$9,034,956, an increase of about 3%, a \$3/ month increase, meaning the Association dues will be \$111/month/household.

Why a \$3 increase? There are four important reasons. Let's look at the Operating Budget first. Beginning January 1, the State of California mandates that the minimum wage rises to \$10/hour and that all part-time employees receive sick pay.

Second, the effects of our drought affect the cost of food, a major budget item in the Food & Beverage Department budget. How much more are you paying for eggs, produce, and protein? The drought also impacts the cost of water. Over the year, the Association has reduced the water usage by 40%, yet the cost for this lower amount of water rises by 16% for 2016.

Have you seen this increase in your water bills?

Third, for the first time in many years, Capi-



tal Asset Acquisitions are a line item in the budget. In the recent past, Capital Acquisitions have been funded from Revenues in excess of Expenses. This year, Revenues in excess of Expenses from 2014 and estimated from 2015 have been returned to the budget to directly reduce the dues. While the operating costs for 2016 have increased 3%, the Operations Budget has only increased 2%. This accounts for \$2 of your monthly dues increase.

Fourth, the required contribution to the Reserve Fund has increased by 5%, or \$1 per month increase. This brings the net budget cost to owners to \$111 per month.

The Board often receives questions from residents about the financial benefits of "outside" bookings. These outside bookings actually account for a significant percentage of our overall revenues for 2016. If we rely solely on your dues to support the *entire* Operating, Reserve, and Capital Acquisition budges, your dues would be \$166 each month! That would *not* be one latte a month, but rather about one Pumpkin Spice Latte *every day*!





Board membership will be determined by counting the ballots on February 18, 2016. You will have the opportunities to support your Candidates by hosting coffee gatherings, fund raisers, sign placement, or flyer distribution prior to that time. 



Getting to Yes

The Finance Committee Dues Determination Process

One of the most important responsibilities the Finance Committee

faces each August through September is its assistance in developing next year's budget and eventual homeowner dues calculation. The process is long and often complicated, involving a number of meetings with staff and other committees.

While the Finance Committee makes a recommendation of next year's dues, it doesn't make the final decision. The committee has input into staff and committee planning through a series of meetings, the first of which was held with the Properties Committee who made several proposals for new projects and improvements to existing property, which were requested by staff, residents, committees, and groups. Discussions led to the acceptance of some projects, tabling and rejection of others. Later, toward the end of the budgeting process, there was a second meeting of the two committees. Since the Orchard Creek solar project was not financed through usual budget processes and has no expenses associated with the 2016 budget, it was not part of the discussions.

Next, the Finance Committee met on two separate occasions with various staff members in order to review their budgets related to their 2016 goals and expectations. Staff budgets were constrained due to changes in employment law, namely, the rise in hourly minimum wage and new government regulations regarding 24 hours sick leave for part-time employees. Additionally, workers' compensation insurance costs are likely to rise. Moreover, increased costs for water have affected the Maintenance budget and the cost of food products for the Food & Beverage Department.

Finance met with staff twice more to hone budgets. The last of these meetings was the budget rollup. Committee members were encouraged to ask questions to ensure that residents' dues will be the fairest they can be. The dues are calculated based on expenses offset by estimated outside revenues such as the HP event, concerts, catering, etc. Note that while electrical power costs will be lower at Orchard Creek Lodge due to the solar installation, the power savings will be utilized to return the monies taken from investment accounts to pay for this project.

Once all the various budgets have become the most streamlined they can possibly be, Finance presents its findings to the Board of Directors. The Board may take the Finance Committee's suggested 2016 dues rate or it can choose to have more meetings with various stakeholders before making its final decision on dues for the coming year.

El Niño

Cautionary tips from Neighbors InDeed Doug Brown, Resident Editor

We've heard a lot about El Niño in



recent months—the fascinating phenomenon in which warmer than normal ocean temperatures in the tropical Pacific Ocean can bring us "unusual" winter weather patterns. We're all of course hop-

ing *unusual* translates into lots of rain, but beware! Nothing about El Niño suggests absolute predictability.

So, for the time being, Neighbors In-

Deed urges caution and prudence. Until we actually *see* rain falling in significant amounts, maintain your summer *waterwise* irrigation timer settings. And stay tuned for city of Lincoln and Placer County directives on what's permitted and/or advisable.

If it looks like we indeed are experiencing a nice wet winter, then modify your settings to your usual *low settings* for the winter, or even turn your systems *off*. Just because it's raining doesn't mean we'll suddenly see full reservoirs with water aplenty for everyone. It'll take several years of wet winters to recover from four years of drought, so water remains a precious resource!

Perplexed about how to reset your irrigation timers? Call Neighbors InDeed at 223-2763 for a Handy Helper to come to your house and help you with that. The more recent timers have additional features that give you some options that the older timers didn't have. For example, the new Rainbird models allow you to make a customized setting for each station. So let's say your trees and shrubs need a different schedule from your lawns—presto! Your timer can do it all.

ceived a significant number of re-landscaping applications.

These have focused on landscaping and hardscape changes that reduce or eliminate natural turf and also replace existing plants with drought and frost tolerant plants.

As these applications are reviewed, the ARC's most important consideration is to determine if the proposal creates an integrated and unified design that is consistent with the character of the home and the community.

An Integrated Design Solution accomplishes the following:

- Incorporates elements and materials consistent with the home's architectural character.
- Is in scale with the size of the home, lot and adjacent properties.
- Exhibits a sensitive use of hardscape, walls, lighting and planting materials.
- Carefully incorporates the existing plants that are to remain in the new design.
- Selects plant and tree species for their location in the landscape, water usage, height, texture, color, and

eventual size at maturity.

- Incorporates seasonal color.
- Meets the minimum setback and coverage requirements.

Within the bird watching world, birds of prey are known as raptors. Birds of this category have keen vision, powerful talons, and strong curved beaks. We are very fortunate

> to have a wide variety of raptors in and around Lincoln.

All of the beautiful birds pictured with this article are raptors. The photos were taken here in Lincoln by Phil Robertson, Truman Holtzclaw, and Larry White.



mas Bird Count. In last

winter's count, the Lincoln area had the highest number of Red-tailed Hawks in the country.

Raptors eat other birds, insects, small mammals, lizards, snakes, and fish. A characteristic of all raptors is that they can see small things from far away. They can swoop in and pick up and kill their prey with their strong talons and take it away swiftly. Their sharp curved beaks are used for tearing the food to eat. Larger raptors such as eagles, hawks, and owls have even been known to pick up small household pets.

> Most raptors are diurnal—active during the day and sleeping at night. However, owls are nocturnal—active at night. We sometimes hear owls hoot in the night from a perch on our roof. I have admired the hawks and eagles as they effortlessly soar, riding the thermals. Such strength

and freedom is awesome. There is a varied and large number of raptors in our area. The Bird Group participates in the National Audubon Society's annual Christ-

Many raptors are migra-

tory. Some come from Alaska to this area; the Rough-legged Hawk winters here then returns to the tundra of Canada. Swainson's Hawks are here in the summer, but in fall, fly to South America.

A major threat to raptors is poisoning of rats, mice, and voles. The usual poison is a blood thinner that causes internal bleeding and death. If other animals such as raptors eat the poisoned critters, they too will be poisoned. As many as 75% of raptors have some poison in their systems. We must use humane traps for pests to help preserve nature's balance. Due to many threats, only about 20% of young birds will make it through their first year.



Meet Paula Horsley

Landscape "techie" extraordinaire!

Every Lincoln Hills resident proudly views our community landscaping as strik-



ingly attractive with stunning arrays of flowers, shrubs, trees, and manicured lawns. What our untrained eyes don't see is the technological wizardry responsible for generating the beauty.

Meet Paula Horsley, Landscape Supervisor, the brains—and personality—behind it all. When the *Compass* caught up with Paula, she excitedly embarked on a fascinating demonstration of how computerization was a major player in keeping our common space green and colorful. Well, how else would *you* manage over 2100 irrigation stations to provide *optimal* watering for hundreds of acres?

And optimal doesn't mean simply "timed," but regulated by weather, rain, and soil moisture content. A few clicks of her mouse and Paula's screen displayed data from SCLH's weather station: .02 inches of rainfall in overnight sprinkles—not enough to cause automated adjustments in watering schedules.

Paula noted with irony, "However, all that incredible technology doesn't give us 'X-ray' vision to pinpoint the exact spot where an underground supply line has sprung a leak!"

Paula, who with her husband, has been a Lincoln Hills resident since 2001, brought with her 18 years of facilities management experience with Hewlett-Packard in Silicon Valley, and it shows! But her day's work is spent less behind an array of computers, monitors, and digital sensors than interfacing with a slew of supervisees, where

she puts her vibrant personality and friendly approach to maximum benefit!

Can you imagine overseeing mowers, planters, hedge trimmers, tree pruners, irrigation techs, weed abatement personnel, annual sheep grazing, and, yes, even the worker who faithfully services 86 mutt-mitt stations and trash cans?

Those red trucks and carts that you see on our streets belong to Valley Crest, subcontracted by SCLH to carry out routine landscaping services. The mowing crew alone takes four-and-a-half days to make the rounds; the detail/pruning team covers our entire community in a four-week schedule; flowerbeds are replanted three times a year; and the arborist inspects all of our trees twice a year.

Water-wise practices have been in place for several years now, but especially this year. Among recent landscaping Master Plan items have been the remodeling of two Village parks to save water, Leavell and Stonehouse. "Already we have saved thousands of gallons of water on those two parks alone," Paula noted.

The next time you stroll or drive through this beautiful community, tip your hat to Paula for her excellent work!

I know it is still warm,

but cooler weather is coming. Now is a good time to plan your clothing for the cooler weather. Here are some tips for cold weather cycling.

Don't overdress. Wear layers with a good base layer that will wick moisture. Cotton does not have good wicking capac-

ity. As one of your layers, consider using a turtleneck to protect your neck. Wear a light windbreaker that can easily be folded and put into a pocket.

Take care of your extremities. Use leg and arm warmers. Put on two pair of thin cycling socks. Wear long fingered or split fingered gloves with liners. Don't forget your head. You lose a lot of body heat through your head. Skull caps, balaclavas or helmet covers work well. Protect your ears with ear bands, ear bags or helmet caps with ear flaps.

The entire operation pivots on W. H. Dentzel Carousels dating back to 1909. William H. Dentzel built carousels that were all over the United States. Today this facility is manned by volunteer labor and reflects the same craftsmanship used in the beginning. Beautiful animals are being carved and finished for positions on a rebuilt original Dentzel carousel. The next day was touring Crator Lake on our southbound trek. We did enter the National Park but we saw very little. We bumped into an impressive snow storm that whited out the Lake and left visibility of about 50 yards. Driving was slick as
