Board of Directors' Report
Solar Recap
Clean, Green Source of Energy: Reducing Our Carbon Footprint

A few times over the years, our Community Association, through the Properties and Finance Committees, looked at installing a solar array to provide electricity for our Orchard Creek Lodge. In 2015 it was determined that it could be done in a cost-efficient manner and the solar array was constructed and operations began in November 2015. The cost of the solar installation at Orchard Creek was \$2,464,399 with \$1,797,765 coming from operations and a loan from reserves of \$666,633. The loan from reserves has been repaid.

In 2016 it was determined that adding a solar array at Kilaga Springs would also be prudent. The construction began in June of 2017 and delivery started in February of 2018. The cost of this solar array was \$1,450,523 with \$48,788 from operations and \$1,401,735 coming from reserves. The amount from reserves is expected to be fully paid back by August 2021. The saving on both solar arrays is \$32,500 a month and those funds are being used to repay the reserves. As of September 30, 2018, the amount now owed is \$1,098,326.

In order to reduce costs for these projects, a Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) was used. A third party owns and supplies us with the electricity for a specified period of time so the tax advantages can be used for the construction costs. The plan is to own the Orchard Creek solar array by November 2020 and Kilaga Springs by February of 2023. In order for the Association to use a PPA, it required 51% of the owners to approve, per our governing documents. An assent agreement was signed by over 51% of our owners.

Let's not forget the great shade structures as a result of these solar arrays.

Once again we had great attendance for the October Listening Post. As always, I want to thank everyone who took the time to attend. We started by addressing rumors; one is that the Association is using drones to inspect backyards. I am happy to report that nothing could be further from the truth. As stated in the SCLHCA Drone Policy, drones are restricted to

common areas only.

The residents were updated on the Association finances. I happily reported that the Food and Beverage department had a close to break-even year. In my humble opinion, the F&B Task Force has been the most effective Task Force we have developed; their input will assist in producing positive results long into the future. Thank you to the Task Force members for their hard work.

I also spoke to some "behavioral" issues that have come up recently; issues and behavior that are in some cases similar to what we see in the world around us. In one instance an anonymous letter was sent out that questioned the qualifications of an individual running for the board, another was abusive behavior from one resident towards another, and the last issue was inappropriate comments from a resident that was directed to a staff member.

Finance Committee Report
2019 Reserve Study
Hans Fokkema, Finance Committee

Every year all homeowners receive a summary copy of the Board appro-

ved Reserve Study. Last year the study included projected increases in homeowner contributions of \$4 in 2019 and an additional \$4 in 2020. While it is important to understand that these contribution increases are essential to maintaining a healthy level of reserves, this year we have made every effort to reduce the impact of those contributions because the minimum wage increases mandated by the State of California and the slowly increasing inflation levels already create upward pressure on our dues. However, contribution increases to our reserves cannot be eliminated.

Our goal is to assure that Lincoln Hills remains a high quality and very desirable community and we, therefore, want to reach and maintain what is called a "Strong Reserve Position," which means that we want to keep the funding level between 70% and 90%. This is the balance of the Reserve Fund expressed as a percentage of the total amount that ideally should have been reserved for all assets combined depending on where each one is in their life cycle.

In order to reach that objective the recently approved 2018 Reserve Study no longer includes a \$4

increase in homeowner contributions for two consecutive years but does include a \$1 increase for 2019 and a \$2 increase for 2020, 2021 and 2022. All increases beyond that will be kept below the anticipated inflation rate. This means that it will take longer to get the reserves to the desired funding level (70%), but we still remain adequately reserved. However, it is important for all of us to understand that the increasing contribution levels are absolutely necessary because we have no other way to keep the reserves healthy.

A different feature in the 2018 study is that under the category "Special Assessments/Other." It shows a contribution of \$400,000 from the CEF. This is a one-time contribution to strengthen the reserve position and to cover increased expenses for two specific large-scale projects that are charged to the Reserves. These are the WellFit renovation project and the upgrade from wood fencing to concrete fencing. We do not anticipate requesting similar contributions in the future. While they strengthen the reserves, they do so only temporarily. We will still need increased homeowner contributions to secure long-term stability of the reserve position.

For September we were \$79,935 better than budget, and we were \$104,650 better year-to-date.

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Architectural Review Committee
What's the Difference?

What's the difference between the Architectural Review and Compliance

Committees?

Even though the ARC and Compliance Committee works in tandem, they provide two different functions. Following CC&R Section 5.02, the ARC is given the authority to develop and review all proposed improvements including home construction, exterior alterations, landscaping, painting, yard decorations, accessory structures, etc. We must determine whether such improvements are consistent with the enhancement of the community, Design Guidelines and other governing documents with approval or disapproval based on this information.

The Compliance Committee is responsible for the enforcement of all governing documents in Lincoln Hills including the Design Guidelines. This committee works closely with Community Standards to resolve issues in a timely manner. This includes new improvements and on-going property maintenance.

The Design Guidelines were developed to provide detailed information regarding all external improvements enabling all ARC members the ability to make a non-discriminatory decision and compliance a clear definition of the requirement.

We cannot emphasize enough the need for you, the

owner, to review the topics relating to your improvement in the Design Guidelines and submit an application with the appropriate checklist to the ARC prior to the commencement of work. Noncompliance issues can result in frustration and become



costly. Obtaining ARC review and approval, when appropriate, will actually help to avoid non-compliance issues.

Community Standards plays two roles; one is they are available to answer questions about your project and help you with the necessary forms and documentations for ARC submittal, including paint selections. Their second role is to interface with the Compliance Committee on all non-compliant issues working with owners to resolve their proposed violations.

We all share the same goal, which is to accommodate owners while maintaining the integrity of this lovely community

Compliance Committee / Community Standards
What Color Goes Where?

Del Webb and Pulte spent a lot of time

designing the homes in our community. The great part about this is the houses have character. Add color, and our community becomes the beautiful place it is. Our community standards balance providing color choices for individual tastes with standards for some similar community themes.

We have noticed that over time, some owners have strayed from the exterior painting standards. Sometimes this was done intentionally to add some flair. Other times it was because they were not familiar with how the exterior painting standards applied to their home. Either way, it may generate a compliance issue. The best way to avoid problems is to obtain the required ARC review and approval before you repaint your whole house or make *any* color changes. There is also an excellent Exterior Painting Standards document available in the Resource Center by the Lifestyle Desk (OC). This document will assist in getting the paint right the first time.

1. If trim touch up is being done as part of your routine repair and maintenance, be sure your new paint matches your most recently approved paint application. If you are touching up the builders' original paint,

ensure you have the original color to match. **Do not** match the color as it looks today as it is likely faded from the original/approved color.

- 2. All stucco pop-out areas (those stucco areas which stick out 4-5") above the windows, doors and garage door all need to be the same secondary trim color. They should *not* be the same as the main stucco body of the house.
- 3. Garage doors are painted to match other areas of the house. They are generally either the main body color or the pop-out color mentioned above. If your garage door has been replaced due to normal wear and tear or other reasons, it needs to be painted accordingly.
- 4. There are specialty colors that can be used for front doors or shutters. These should only be used as approved for those areas.
- 5. Most of our wood fences are due for some paint. The fence has usually faded from the original standard color. The correct color for all wood fences and gates is Sherwin-Williams "Sanderling" No. SW7513.

The Community Standards department is available to assist in obtaining information on your home's latest ARC approved colors. They do not have color information for the builder's original colors for your home.

Chef's Recipe of the Month:

Turkey Scaloppine

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 pounds turkey breast cutlets (about 8 cutlets)
- salt
- freshly ground black pepper
- 1 cup flour
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1/3 cup thinly sliced pancetta (about 1 ounce)
- 2 tablespoons thinly sliced fresh sage
- 3/4 cup white wine
- 1/2 cup fat-free, less-sodium chicken broth
- 2 tablespoons butter, cut into small pieces

Instructions

- 1. Place a turkey cutlet on a large piece of saran wrap. Cover with another piece of saran wrap. Using a meat pounder (or another heavy object like a rolling pin or wine bottle), pound the cutlet till it is thin and flat, about 1/4-inch thick.
- 2. Season the turkey scaloppine generously with salt and pepper on both sides.
- 3. Coat lightly in the flour and shake off any extra flour.
- 4. Heat two large skillets over medium heat. Add 1 tablespoon of oil to each skillet.
- 5. Cook half of the turkey in one pan and the remaining turkey in the other pan. Cook until the turkey is lightly browned and no longer pink on the inside, 5-7 minutes. Remove turkey from pan and keep warm.
- 6. Add pancetta and sage to pan; cook 3 minutes or until pancetta
- is browned, stirring occasionally. Add wine; bring to a boil.
- 7. Cook until reduced to 1/2 cup (about 3 minutes). Add broth; bring to a boil. Cook until reduced to about 2/3 cup (about 2 minutes). Stir in butter.
- 8. Add the turkey scaloppine back to the pan and turn to coat with sauce. Cook for another minute to blend flavors. Enjoy immediately.

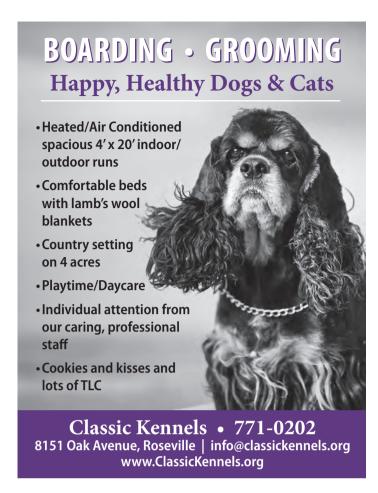

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Down in the Delta *Richard Pearl, Roving Reporter*

There's the Mississippi Delta, the Mekong Delta, the Ganges Delta, and then there's the Sacramento Delta.

The Sacramento Delta...what's up with that? A lot, actually. Our delta – bounded by the cities of Sacramento, Stockton, and Pittsburg – consists

of 1,100 square miles of land and waterways, producing such crops as asparagus, peaches, and potatoes. It's also home to the famous Crawdad Festival, where 25,000 pounds of crawdads (mini-

lobsters) are consumed each Father's Day weekend in the tiny town of Isleton.

From downtown Sacramento (35 minutes from Lincoln), it's only 10 miles south before you enter another world...slow-paced and incredibly diverse. The Delta contains 1,000 miles of waterways, which makes for some interesting travels. On our one-day trip we "island hopped" using

several bridges and two ferries. The ferries crossed channels 100 feet and 300 feet, respectively and, since CalTrans operates them, they are free.

Start your trip in Freeport, accessed by heading south on I-5

for ten miles. Then check out the wineries in Clarksburg and continue south to the town of Locke (population about 80). Locke was originally built by Chinese immigrants for Chinese immigrants (this was before the Chinese immigrants were allowed

to own land). In its heyday, it had five gambling halls, five brothels, and several speakeasies and opium dens. Locke is also famous for the quaint

restaurant with the politically incorrect name of "Al the Wop's." The restaurant actually gets some pretty good dining reviews.

Continue on to Walnut Grove (population 1,500) and have lunch at Tony's. If it

wasn't recommended to us, and now to you, there's no way you would stop there. Fantastic Philly Steak sandwiches, burgers and fries.

For something much more upscale, backtrack to the Grand Island Mansion Inn. This structure is the largest private estate in northern California and consists of 24,000 square feet of building (58 rooms), an Olympic-sized swimming pool, and incredible gardens. It's a great spot for Sunday

brunch or to hold a unique party.

End your journey in Rio Vista, where a must-see spot is Foster's Bighorn restaurant. Another politically incorrect location featuring 250 mounted heads of animals shot all over the

world, acquired primarily by former owner Billy Foster. Yes, definitely politically incorrect in today's California but the commentary associated with most pictures tells interesting stories of a different era. From Rio Vista, you're back in Lincoln Hills in an hour and a half.

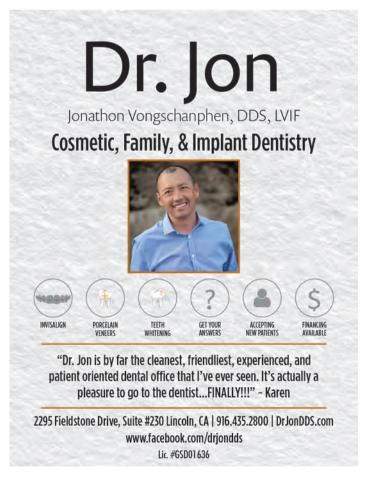

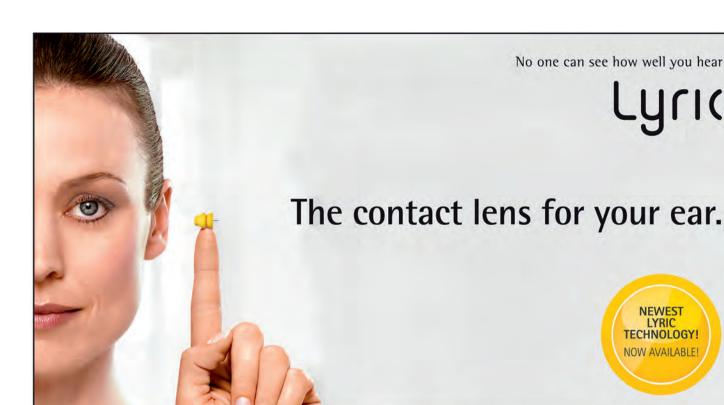
Beyond the social impact of your contribution, your IRA transfer will count toward your IRA's required minimum distribution. IRA distributions are not subject to annual charitable deduction limitations, even if you continue to itemize. No income taxes will need to be paid on your gift. You benefit, even if you don't itemize your deductions. And, your IRA distribution will not increase your adjusted gross income. You may transfer any amount (up to the \$100,000 limit) of your annual "required minimum distribution."

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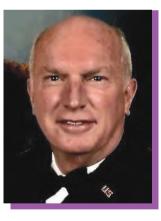
In Memoriam
