Finance Committee Report Closing 2019 Marsha Watkins

With the close to 2019, I wish to share with you some of the activities

that the finance department has engaged in during this year to improve the efficiency of the staff and accuracy of the information to the community monthly.

The staff attended the annual Northstar software conference to learn more about its functionality and upgrades to the system and network with other HOA users of the software. Once the Northstar system is integrated and stable, then it will eliminate some manual data entry currently needed with two systems.

For the first time, the HOA now has a fixed asset tracking system. We now have a list of all assets, the cost of those items, how long each asset is expected to be in use and the amount of depreciation expense we should include in our tax return. This was a very extensive project and took staff over six months to implement. This project also resolved one of the audit questions that was raised in 2017.

Throughout the year, the staff has been working on streamlining accounting and payroll processes, ensuring there's a segregation of duties that are consistent with generally accepted accounting practices. They have also been updating and cross-training on all written procedures and processes A complete reconciliation of all balance sheet accounts is now being done monthly prior to the distribution of the financial statements.

There are four California Association of Community Manager (CACM) certified employees at SCLHCA and one Community Association Financial Management (CAFM) certified employee, with two more in the process of getting certification in the Accounting Department. The Human Resources Manager also attends the CACM law seminars to stay up-to-date on all legal issues affecting HOAs. The certification guidelines have been established to make sure that the Association is educated and compliant with regulations affecting a California HOA.

An all members billing system will be rolling out at the beginning of the new year. It will allow you to use your membership card to make charges for many of the services provided by each of the departments. An app is available through your phone to be able to track your charges.

It's been my honor to act as a Finance Committee liaison with the accounting staff this year.

Compliance Committee Give Me a Sign! David Mateer, Chair

There are lots of signs in our daily lives. Some such as

STOP signs help to keep us safe. Others try to provide information.

ALLOWED – Signs that provide important information are allowed. This includes security alarm signs, no soliciting



signs, beware of dog, and Neighborhood Watch signs. One sign is allowed for each of these types. Additional information on size and placement is provided in the Design Guidelines.

ALLOWED...SOMETIMES – Political signs are allowed in our community during the 60 days preceding and until seven days after an election. For 2020, we have several elections coming. The first is for our SCLH Board of Directors on February 20, followed by the California Primary on March 3 and the national election on November 3. Based on candidate agreement, signs for the Board of Directors would have signs starting January 1, after the holidays. These political signs may not exceed an aggregate size of 9 square feet or height of 4 feet. This allows for three typical candidate signs to be displayed and still be within the guidelines. This should be enough for our freedom of expression throughout the election seasons.

Throughout the years, some of us have some items to sell. Garage and Estate sales are allowed twice per year per residence. Each sale may be up to 2 days. This is also the city policy and limit. Garage/Estate sale signs also may not exceed 9 square feet total or height of 4 feet. Only one sign is permitted for any residence. Signs not permitted prior to 8:00 AM and need to be removed by 5:00 PM on the day of the sale.

NOT ALLOWED – One other type of sign we see from time to time is commercial advertising. This is usually from a company that is performing work at your home. It is important to know that these commercial signs are not allowed. It may seem you are trying to help advertise for a company that did some work for you, but it detracts from your landscape, fresh paint, and the community. Lots of ways to let your friends and neighbors know you were happy with the company, just skip the sign.



Architectural Review Committee
Tis the Season!

The "Most Wonderful Time of the Year" is here! How quickly the time goes,

as we look forward to another year in this beautiful community.

We want to briefly discuss issues that frustrate our homeowners and create many questions.

Setbacks are a critical requirement for many improvements in Sun City Lincoln Hills that are specific to this community. These are listed in Design Guideline 5.8.1 and the General Development Plan with the City of Lincoln.

Accessory Structures create the most confusion. These include casitas, freestanding shade structures, golf cart garages, gazebos, pergolas, pools, sheds, and spas. The minimum separation between a home and any accessory structure shall be ten feet, as stated in the General Development Plan for Del Webb Lincoln Hills and Ordinance 691B of the City of Lincoln.

Permanent Generators have additional setback requirements – contact Community Standards or these requirements.

The homeowner must request a site visit from ARC prior to submitting an application for any of the aforementioned projects. Requests should be directed to



tonya.benetiz@sclhca.com or sam.mckee@sclhca.com.

The City of Lincoln Building Department will not issue a permit without an "Approved" ARC application.

In addition, all newly planted trees must meet the setback requirement for the species selected. This information is provided in Appendix A of the Design Guidelines.

Revisions to the current Design Guidelines are forth-coming for all homeowners to review and provide their comments and concerns. We are still waiting on the City of Lincoln for policy on AB-670 Accessory Dwelling Units. This will be announced and published separately once the City has provided its requirements.

We thank all homeowners for their cooperation and eagerness to maintain our beautiful community.

Chef's Recipe of the Month:

Butternut Squash with Candied Pecans, Bacon, and Bleu Cheese

Great side dish for your holiday meal!

Ingredients

- 6 slices hickory-smoked bacon
- 1 ½ tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon water
- Pinch of cayenne pepper (optional)
- ½ cup whole pecans
- 1 large butternut squash, peeled, cored, and cut into 1" chunks
- Kosher salt and black pepper
- 4 sprigs thymes
- 2 ounces of bleu cheese crumbles (optional)

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.
- 2. In a large skillet over medium heat, cook bacon until crisp. Remove bacon, roughly chop and set aside; pour off the bacon fat into a small bowl, and set aside.
- 3. In a small bowl, stir together sugar, water, 1 teaspoon of the bacon fat, pinch of salt, and cayenne pepper
- 4. Place the skillet back over medium heat and toast the pecans, stirring occasionally, until fragrant, about 2-3 minutes. Add the sugar mixture to the pan and stir constantly until nuts are evenly coated, about 20 seconds. Remove from heat and spread on a single layer on a parchment-lined plate. Set aside to cool.
- 5. Spread squash and thyme sprigs in an even layer on a rimmed sheet pan. Drizzle with about 2 tablespoons of the bacon fat. Toss to coat evenly, season with salt and pepper. Roast until squash is soft and lightly caramelized, about 30 minutes. Remove sheet pan from oven and cool for 5 minutes. Discard Thyme Sprigs.
- 6. Break apart pecans if stuck together and roughly chop. Add pecans and bacon to the squash and toss gently to mix. Place mixture in a warm serving dish. Top with crumbled blue cheese if desired.

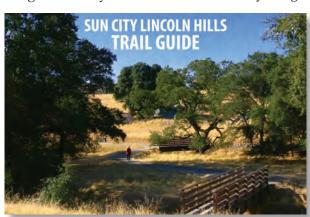
Find these and many more opportunities to stretch your legs while enjoying views of creeks and ponds,

all of the lights and decorations. Good cheer and warm wishes for the holiday season ring out from everywhere. Let's keep that warm feeling going for the whole year here at Lincoln Hills. It's easy with just a few kind thoughts toward your neighbors and a few easy things for you to do.

If your neighbor is having a health issue or if there has been a recent loss in the household, extend a helping hand. Instead of saying "let me know what I can do to help you?" Golf Cart Rules
Al Roten, Roving Reporter

Lincoln Hills is a Golf Cart Community. There are three levels of cart-like vehicles in our community: Golf Carts (used

only on golf courses), Permitted Golf Carts, and Neighborhood Electric Vehicles (NEV). When driven on our residential streets and major thoroughfares, all require that the driver have a valid Driver's License. The California Vehicle Code defines all the above as Motor Vehicles. Further, Section 12500 states "A person may not drive a motor vehicle upon a highway unless that person holds a valid driver's license." Then, special conditions are stipulated under Section 21251 as they apply to classes of Low-Speed Vehicles, which are driven within a Golf Cart Transportation Plan or a NEV Transportation Plan, such as adopted by the City of Lincoln. Under Section 21251, drivers are not exempt from the licensing provision.

California's DMV has authorized a Limited Area License that may be issued to people with physical limitations. This license requires a driving test, which may be given in one of the above-described vehicle categories. When issued, such a license is valid only when driven in the designated limited area.



Golf carts used only on golf courses may not be driven on our streets other than to cross streets at designated crossings. These are limited to go no more than 15 miles per hour (MPH).

Permitted golf carts, many of which are modified to go faster than 15 MPH,



must be inspected for safety features and owner financial liability every two years. Inspections and permit sticker applications are provided on the third Thursday of every month at Orchard Creek Lodge: look in the *Compass* and eNews for more information. These vehicles may be operated on our residential streets as well as in designated lanes within the Golf Cart Transportation Plan.

NEV's, when in the Golf Cart Community, are considered to be golf carts. However, this class of vehicle may speed to 25 MPH, with additional safety features. They must have license plates as any other vehicle traveling outside the Golf Cart Transportation Plan but within the NEV Transportation Plan. Both plans are available on the city website. However, an owner may decide to get a permit instead of a license plate, in which case the vehicle is classed as a Permitted Golf Cart, and may not leave the confines of the more restrictive plan.

Village 33 Knows How to Duck the Halls David Wright, Roving Reporter

The residents of The Duck Village do not fly south for the winter. Instead, they stick around to fowl up their Christmas

decorations. With street names like Garganey, Wood Duck, Elderberry, Cinnamon Teal, Loon Lake, Gadwell and Ruddy Duck, it fits the bill for the residents of Lincoln Hills Village 33 to decorate with ducks—a



fa-la-la-la-lot of ducks. Each year around Thanksgiving, residents unbox their decorations and start getting their ducks in a row.

Yellow-painted wooden cutouts of web-footed Kringles can be found in the front yards of most homes in the village. All are sporting Santa hats, and many are leading a line of ducklings personalized with names of grandkids. Some are engaging in mallard mayhem while others are discretely ducking

mistletoe. Creating a festive wonderland, these nut-quackers are interspersed with elves, snowmen, reindeer, colored lights, candy canes, and wreaths. One house even has a Christmas tree made of empty wine bottles—undoubtedly showing its holiday spirits.

Every Christmas Eve, the entire neighborhood accents the sidewalks with



glowing luminaries. Lines of cars slowly wind through the loon-acy. Passersby crane their necks to take in the displays. Mr. and Mrs. Claus have been known to suddenly appear—feathering some yuletide glee with special treats for visitors.

Sharon Craig remembers how it all began in 2004. She was among a core group of the first owners to move into the village. Her neighbor, Richard

Latreille, a retired San Carlos Fire Chief with a passion for woodworking, hatched the scheme. Having the tools and the talent of a craftsman, he carved his first Christmas duck. He floated the cutting-edged concept to neighbors, and requests for his quill skill took flight. As Richard churned out the plywood shapes, Sharon and her husband



turned their garage into a Santa's paint shop where neighbors would gather to duck-orate their whimsical mascots.

"It was all Richard's idea," Sharon explained. "We were just his little elves who implemented it. It made for good neighbors. Our village became very close—like college kids on campus. The idea became so popular that he had made wooden cutouts for other holidays as well."

Richard died in 2009, but his legacy lives on. When a resident moves, the ducks stay with the house—passed to the new owners to pay ho-ho-homage to the man who made it all possible. In The Duck Village, Richard Latreille's name is spelled with Noel.
