The Board of Directors has a

major responsibility to represent the interests of the members of the Sun City Lincoln Hills Community Association (Association). One of the challenges with this responsibility is to find a way to communicate with every member. When making a major decision, the Board would like to hear from as many members as possible. However, at other times, we cannot communicate a Board action due to privacy or confidentiality. This article concerns the improved outreach that is needed in some cases and an example of a time when the Board cannot communicate more information.

This year, the Board has reached out to the community by holding an open workshop almost every month. With the Special Election, we have held a variety of special events. More outreach is needed if we are going to determine the future direction of our Association or approve any major capital projects. The Board should not make these decisions without your input. We have heard from many of you that you want more opportunities to impact the direction of the Association. Reaching everyone in a community is a challenging effort for any homeowners association.

A variety of processes are available to facilitate a broad discussion within the community. A large meeting can be scheduled in the ballroom, with a facilitator. A facilitator can help bring differing opinions together, looking for similarities that we can all support. We also have the capability, with the help of the Communications and Community Relations Committee, to survey the members. This

can help to determine an overall opinion on a specific subject matter. We can also continue the pocket park events that were so successful during the Special Election. We can also look for new ways to reach out to each village. We do not have all the answers. All suggestions are greatly appreciated.

One area where the Board is not always able to communicate is in explaining why a specific house in our community is not being maintained adequately. While we are unable to respond due to the member's privacy rights, we do spend considerable time following up on these situations. If a house is not being maintained, the Board can fine the homeowner. However, if the homeowner is also not paying their assessments (dues), we can charge late fees and interest on top of the unpaid dues. We also have the ability to: send a homeowner to collections in attempt to collect past dues; put a lien on the house to protect the Association's rights, and, as a last resort, we can foreclose on a homeowner. However, all these processes take time. If a house's landscape is in very poor condition, the Association can have staff clean it up and charge the homeowner. While we hear the frustrations of neighbors near a house that is not being maintained, please know that we are doing our best to address them all.

Sometimes more information and communication to members is needed, and we constantly look for new ways to do so. However, at times, we cannot share what is going on for privacy or confidentiality reasons. The Board will continue to reach out to the community and communicate in a variety of ways about everything that we can.

Greetings! I am John Bowman, Interim Executive Director of Sun City Lincoln Hills Community

Association. Your Board of Directors brought me on to bridge the gap between your outgoing Executive Director, Robert Richardson, and your incoming Executive Director, yet to be selected. We truly wish Mr. Richardson all the best as he goes forward.

I am very excited to have been given the opportunity to help this fine community. While I am new to Lincoln Hills, I am not new to community asso-

ciation management. 


In August, Association net expenses were \$4,000 higher

than budgeted, decreasing the year-to-date positive variance to \$456,000. Total expenses in August were \$1,437,000, \$45,000 more than budgeted, and non-dues revenue (primarily fees charged by operating departments) was \$519,000, \$41,000 more than budgeted. For the year-to-date, total expenses were \$9,397,000, \$217,000 less than budgeted, and total non-dues revenue was \$2,559,000, \$239,000 more than budgeted.

The chart shows the year-to-date expense savings and overages by function. Personnel

Costs continue as the largest contributor to overall savings. Savings in Landscape Maintenance are largely due to deferral of planned activities that may yet occur this year as additional Facilities staff is hired. Legal expenses for t h e eight months exce-



eding budget by \$110,000 and the costs of the Special Election (\$24,000 through August), which were not budgeted, made up the bulk of the overage in Administrative Expenses. The cost of water is driving the negative variance in Utilities. Increased usage and higher rates produced an \$88,000 overage through August, which will continue to grow in coming months.

Net expenses of the Administration Department, the Spa, and Food & Beverage were over

budget by a total of \$76,000; Communications, Lifestyle, WellFit, and Facilities net results were \$72,000 better than budget. However, all but Food & Beverage remain positive to budget for the year-to-date. The Administration Department's results were impacted by special election costs, increased accrual for the incentive plan, and higher charges for Human Resources services and recruiting. Salaries and wages over budget due to overtime and new employee training caused the Spa's negative result this month. Food & Beverage results continue to suffer from smaller catering revenue, higher food costs, and higher wage costs due to vacations, sick

time, and training of new employees.

The Reserve Study shows \$2.1 million of components qualified for replacement i n 2021. \$1,005,000 of reserve funds has been spent through August, primarily on street light replacement, fencing, the Kilaga pool,

and the Sports Plaza.

The unallocated balance of the Community Enhancement Fund at August 31 remained at \$1.2 million. The only expenditures during the month were \$30,000 on the Kilaga pool and \$11,000 for security cameras at the softball complex.

New Co-Chair Announced

I am pleased to announce that Richard Bostdorff has been approved as the Co-Chair of ARC.

Richard and I will be sharing these duties for several months until he becomes the Chair.

He has a good understanding of our documents, a friendly demeanor, and is definitely an asset to Lincoln Hills. We will be alternating *Compass* articles, so please watch for his ideas and future input.

We are currently revising the Paint Application to provide more detailed information for our homeowners, as a few areas appear confusing. Hopefully, these revisions will be user friendly and provide a better understanding. As you look through the Paint Book, it becomes apparent the colors can be deceiving, so always make sure you request paint chips or buy samples of your selected paints to ensure these colors meet your expectations.

All hardscape staining and modifications require ARC approval. A hardscape modification is one of the areas we have been addressing and will be incorporated into our Design Guideline revisions. Once again, colors will be earth tones matching the house body color with all non-toxic materials. A California licensed contractor with this expertise must perform all work.

The Cameras – Video Surveillance document is being rewritten to provide more accurate descriptions and information for homeowners. Benches in landscape areas, gazebos, and garage doors have expanded language at the request of homeowners. These are all positive revisions to serve our community better.

All trees planted on residential lots require ARC approval and must meet the setback requirements shown in Appendix A. We are adding language to Appendix A Acceptable Plant List designating trees with an asterisk (\*) that meet the street tree requirements and are suitable for our residential lots, however, you are not limited to these trees providing you have space for the species you select.

amenities and common areas, the Association staff ensures we have what is needed. For the private residences, we have a team approach to keeping things nice. The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) assists with maintaining the Design Guidelines for the exterior of our homes and landscape items. They also review and approve changes to the look of your landscape and home. The Compliance Committee assists when unapproved changes are made, or normal maintenance items

have been deferred. This includes evaluating complaints and verifying the necessary

corrections are complete. There may be behavior complaints about residents or pets from time to time, but that is a very small part of what we do. Both of these committees are made up of residents who volunteer their time

to serve the com-

munity.

Members How do we keep all this work straight, you may wonder? Community Standards provides a vital role in keeping our community looking as good as it does. They are the Association staff that provides for tracking of all ARC application and compliance matters. Several years ago, they started using a software program to assist with this. This department also assists our members on these matters. They also handle all formal communications and letters for these matters. Should a member need a site visit for an ARC or compliance matter, these are usually requested through Community Standards.

I have not yet mentioned the largest and most important part of the team. It is you, our members.

Along with the wealth of amenities and activities in our community comes the responsibility of routine maintenance of our homes and landscape. When considering making improvements to your property, the Design Guidelines are an excellent resource to check. In addition to the actual guidelines, it provides information on when approval is and is not required. Additionally, there are six appendixes that provide additional information on items like acceptable plants and trees for the community.

Similarly, an ARC application and approval is needed when making any paint color changes on your home. This will really help get it done correctly and avoid problems down Sun City Lincoln Hills the road.

Sometimes we get asked why all these approval and design guidelines. This is common for all HOA communities similar to ours. Although they may vary some from Del Webb to Del Webb because of climate, they all have similar standards for their communities. Within our guidelines, there is still room for personal choice and

creativity. Another way to look at it is that we are a team and all in this together. The standards and design guidelines are a small part of everything that binds us. Sort of like all team uniforms, but with options for personalization.

The Community Standards Department, Architectural Review Committee, and Compliance Committee all have their area of responsibility but work closely together to support and serve our community. Also, fortunately, we have a great set of residents on our team. Your efforts and support make it possible to have the fantastic place that we call home.



The year was 1968. Louis Daniel Armstrong (Satchmo) was 66 years

and ten months old when his song "What A Wonderful World" reached the top of the UK Singles Chart. The song was offered to Tony Bennett first, who turned it down. This song sold only 1,000 copies in America. The head of ABC Records did not like the song and chose not to promote it. Fast forward 31 years. In 1999, "What a Wonderful World" was inducted into the

They work tirelessly to maintain the beauty of our grounds. It is a huge and endless job. Residents appreciate the hard work and enjoyment of our lovely median strips, parks, and planting beds.

Another memorable line of the song is: "The colors

of the rainbow, so pretty in the sky." Properties wishes, along with every Californian, for those water droplets, to form the array of colors in a rainbow. Rainbows are frequently represented as a sign of hope and promise of better times to come. We are all longing for rainbows in 2021.

"I see friends shaking hands, saying' 'How do you do?" They're really saying, "I love you." Do those words sound familiar? We want you to gather

and enjoy each other's company or have some friendly competition. We want places for people to meet and form friendships. ### Community Forums – Survey Says

At a CCRC meeting this summer, the committee discussed the dwindling attendance at the Community Forums. Was it lack of interest, bad topics, Zoom fatigue, or did it just need a refresh? Inquiring minds wanted to know and determine if there was still a desire to continue the Forums.

Fortunately, the survey sub-team works closely with the Community Forum group, and they put together a survey that went out to all residents who receive eNews. The team was extremely thorough in crafting objectives, providing a heads up on when to expect the survey and sending a reminder before the deadline. Initial results went out in an eNews in late August, and the formal presentation was given at the September 14 CCRC meeting.

The most significant data point from the survey is that the community values the Forums. With a 25% response rate, which is considered good, we found out the following:

- Most responses came from those who had not attended a Forum in the past
- In-person is the preferred method of attending, but Zoom is okay if appropriate
- Health, travel, local sites/events, and ballot measures had the most interest

- Many respondents took the time to give specific comments on the various questions
- The age of the respondent defines areas of interest

Some of the ideas that came out from the survey included cooking demonstrations, city and county planning issues, downsizing, and where to find various sources of assistance around topics such as gardening and technology. Many thanks to the team who created the survey and report. The work done has energized the Community Forum team, and they are anxious to move forward with new opportunities for community education and entertainment. Anyone interested in viewing the entire report, which includes statistical significance data, you can go to Home/Library/Committees Communications & Community Relations Committee (CCRC)/Documents Community Forum Survey Report.

At our upcoming meetings, the CCRC will be looking ahead to 2022 and what we can and should be doing to drive more robust communication and community outreach. ### Handy Helpers – What They Do and Don't Do and Why *Janet Roberts*

Do you ever wonder if the Neighbors InDeed Handy Helpers can perform a task in your home or whether you'll need to find a vendor to do it? The easiest first step to take is to call us at 916-223-2763 to find out. If the Handy Helpers can't do it, we'll provide you with referrals to vendors who have been recommended by Lincoln Hills residents.

However, here are some guidelines for you to use when you're looking at that task.

## Routinely provided – these tasks are performed frequently by the Handy Helpers and comprise the bulk of their services:

- Furnace filters: replaced or washed
- Smoke alarms: replace batteries and alarms
- Thermostat: program/replace batteries
- Sprinkler controller: adjust
- Electrical: diagnose, repair GFIs/switches/plugs
- Light bulbs: replace
- Garage doors: lube/adjust

#### Less routine services – some require Handy Helper specialists:

- Doorbell: replace button/adjust chimes
- Refrigerator filter: replace
- Sprinkler heads: replace/adjust a few that are obviously faulty
- Telephones: diagnose/adjust
- TV-VCR-DVD: adjust/connect
- Hang pictures/mirrors (<20 lbs)
- Mattress: turn (1 HH + assistant)
- Moving: light furniture/boxes (<35 lbs)
- Assemble artificial Christmas trees 6' and under
- Plumbing: replace showerhead only

#### Services that are NOT PROVIDED:

- Working on 14' or higher ceilings
- Climbing on the roof or into the attic, working on eaves, cleaning gutters
- Checking all of the drippers in a system
- Plumbing services except for showerhead replacement
- Lifting or moving anything over 35 lbs.
- Hanging anything on outside walls
- Hanging holiday indoor/outdoor lights and decorating
- Relighting pilot lights (call PG&E for this)
- Computer-related services

#### Why are these services not provided? For the following reasons:

- Too high a risk for the Handy Helper
- Too complex or specialized a job one that requires professional services
- Jobs that might carry liability issues
- Too long a job (more than 30 40 minutes)

We hope this information is useful to you as you consider the service(s) you need. If in doubt, call us, and we'll let you know. Sometimes a request slips through that the Handy Helpers cannot do. Then you'll be contacted by the I&R Volunteer with referrals for the service.

**Lincoln Hills Foundation Need a Ride? – A Lincoln Hills Foundation Partnership**

The Lincoln Hills Foundation is rapidly heading toward the milestone of 20 years of serving Sun City Lincoln Hills. There have been many members of the Board and Advisory Board over the years, but the one consistent trait in all of them was the passion they had for deploying programs that made life better for the residents in this community.

The work continues in Dial-a-Ride, our newest partnership pilot program. Transportation or lack thereof, continues to be a challenge that many here face. The Foundation is testing out a pilot program in conjunction with Dial-a-Ride, a shared ride service operating with the city limits of Lincoln, to make it easier for seniors to get around. The 20-Ride ticket book is available to seniors over 60 and people with disabilities under 60. (Note: wheelchairs can be accommodated.) The usual price of the packet is \$21.25, but the Lincoln Hills Foundation is underwriting part of the cost and selling the packet for only \$10.00. Reservations can be made up to two weeks prior to a planned trip, and though there may be availability up to a few days before, it is recommended to reserve early. This service runs from 6:30 AM

to 6:30 PM Monday through Friday and 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM on Saturdays. If you would like to learn about the program or buy a ticket book, please call 916-434-6852.

WellFit News Walking and Breast Cancer Awareness Month Deborah McIlvain, Lifestyle, WellFit & Spa Director

Walking does more than you think.

1. Reduces weight-promoting genes: Harvard researchers looked at 32 obesity-promoting genes in over 12k people to determine how much

these genes contribute to body weight. With participants who walked briskly for about an hour a day, the effects of those genes were cut in half.

2. Tames a sweet tooth: The University of Exeter found that a 15-minute walk can curb chocolate cravings and even reduce the amount of chocolate you eat in stressful situations. They also found that walking can reduce cravings and intake of a variety of sugary snacks.

3. Reduces the risk of Breast Cancer: Any kind of physical activity can successfully reduce the risk of breast cancer. An American Cancer Society study that zeroed in on walking found that women who walked seven or more hours a week had a 14% lower risk of breast cancer than those who walked three hours or fewer per week. They also discovered that walking provided this protection even for women with breast cancer risk factors such as being overweight or using supplemental hormones.

4. Joint pain: Walking can reduce arthritisrelated pain, and walking five to six miles a week can even prevent arthritis from forming in the first place. Walking protects the joints, especially the knees and hips, which are most susceptible to osteoarthritis.

> tion: Walking can also help protect you during cold and flu season. A study of over 1k men and women found that those who walked at least 20 minutes a day, at least five days a week, had 43% fewer sick days than those who exercised once a week or less, and if they did get sick, it was for a shorter duration, and their symptoms were milder.

> 5. Enhances immune func-


It is harvest time. Harvesting means to gather, reap, bring in garner, glean, or cull. This article will address the rich body of information that has been brought in, gleaned, and culled over the years since 1979 when the initiative, Healthy People: The Surgeon General's Report on Health Promotion åand Disease Prevention, was initiated and reiterated every ten years since then. This initiative, managed by the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion under the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), serves as a basis for preventive health measure recommendations and

governmental health policy. As of August 2020 the fifth iteration, *Healthy People* 2030, is in progress.

Healthy People 2030 provides science-based national health objectives to improve the health and well-being of Americans. Word limitations will not allow any comprehensive discussion here of the topic. Still, it is worth noting that, for the first time, the Healthy People framework aims to attain health literacy as an "Overarching Goal and Foundational Principle to achieving health and well-being." In non-technical language, each of us must strive to comprehend and understand our health-related information, and health care providers and organizations are to facilitate that goal. It means one should ask questions and do not leave the doctor's office without an understanding and usually a written description of what your treatment plan involves. Know the names and details of your health problems, treatments, and medications. Your health depends on it. An actual case in point: a man went to surgery thinking he was having prostate surgery — instead, he came out with a circumcision.

Go to MyHealthfinder at https:// health.gov to get a personalized list of important ways to stay healthy. This writer's list includes: get the seasonal Flu vaccine and other adult vaccinations, get tested for Hepatitis C, talk with your doctor about depression, get your blood pressure checked, to name a few. Seniors younger than me and those of the male sex will have some different recommendations. Healthy People 2030 objectives address the most important health conditions in our nation today including addiction, arthritis, blood disorders, cancer, chronic pain, dementia, diabetes, healthcareassociated infections, heart disease and stroke, infectious diseases, mental health and mental disorders, oral conditions, osteoporosis, overweight and obesity, respiratory disease, and sensory or communication disorders.

Harvest for the health of it. Ignore your health, and it will go away.

#### **Harvesting Wine History**

It's harvest time at local farmlands as well as throughout nearby vineyards. Let's toast the hardworking vintners who produce and offer their fine wines for tasting and purchase at the more than 20 picturesque wineries located in Placer County.

Here are some rather fascinating facts you may not know.

#### **Deep Roots**

If you're sipping on some

chardonnay, cabernet sauvignon, or merlot, you are partaking in a ritual that dates back to around 7000 BC in ancient China. (Let's hope that what's in *your* glass isn't that old!) The early wines were thought to be a concoction of fermented rice, honey, and grapes.

Cheers to Dionysus (also called "Bacchus" in Rome), who is the mythological god of wine and winemaking.

#### California in the Red—and White

Fast forward to our neck of the woods centuries later. The first vineyards were planted by Spanish missionaries so there would be wine for religious services; the first variety was planted by Father Junipero Serra, also called the father of California wine, who put down roots in about 1769 in Southern California. The common grape grown at that time was the Mission

grape, the only known grape until the arrival of European settlers during the mid-1800s. Abraham Lincoln was the first president to purchase and serve California wine.

The Gold Rush in Northern California from 1848 to 1855 produced some thirsty miners and a high demand for wine, a kind of 'liquid gold.' The wine centers of today, including Sutter, El Dorado, Napa, and Sonoma counties, were first planted in those early Gold Rush days. California became a significant exporter of wine around the world.

#### Dry Spell

Then it stopped. Prohibition began in 1920 with the 1919 ratification of the 18th amendment declaring the sale of alcohol illegal, shuttering more than 700 California wineries. Only small amounts of alcoholic beverages, often called "moonshine," were either made legally at home or sold illegally as "bootleg."

By the demise of Prohibition in 1933, California wineries had been crushed. Grapes that transported well were often shipped throughout the country for sacramental wines. The recovery of the California wine industry slowly began to flow.

Today, California makes about 81% of the wine in the U.S. and is the world's fourth-leading wine producer, according to *Discover California Wines*. More than 100 grape varietals (including French, Italian, and Spanish) are grown here.

## Harvesting Hops on the Lincoln Ale Trail

It's no secret that Placer County has more than a score of wineries, including several award-winners.

What's less known is that our region is becoming recognized for its craft beer breweries. There are now 17 breweries in Placer County, with five either in Lincoln or just outside the city limits. Several of the breweries adhere to the concept of farmto-tap, including growing their own hops, and all are family-owned and operated. Hops are generally harvested in September and gives beer a particular flavor and aroma. Don't like either in your beer, switch to ales, which don't use hops.

There are two downtown Lincoln breweries: Slice Brewing Company and Oliver's Brewhouse and Grill.

Slice Brewing combines the brewing skill of Zach Frasher and entrepreneur and co-owner of Old Town Pizza Russ Yaeger. Their slogan "Upper Crust Beers for Everyone" says it all. They are currently pouring 11 beers, and the full menu from neighboring Old Town Pizza can be delivered to your taproom table.

Oliver's Brewhouse & Grill recently opened, and the taproom – Big Sexy Brewing – is incorporated into the main restaurant – formerly

Beermann's. Big Sexy was ranked number 7 in the nation at the 2020 U.S. Open Beer Championship.

Dueling Dogs Brewing Co. is ten minutes from downtown. Co-owners Earl and Adrianna Stephens started the brewery in 2014 and currently produce ten beers and eight ciders/meads (a honey-based brew). Of course, there are dogs – black Labradors Rocco and Nitro.

Goat House Brewing is owned by Michael and Catherine Johnson, who left the high-tech San Francisco Bay area rat race for the peaceful farm existence. They converted the barn into a brewery and tasting room, farm 20 different varietals of hops, and currently have 13 beers on tap. Of course, there are goats...17 in all keeping watch over a donkey named Rory and all the beer tasters.

Hillenbrand Farmhaus Brewery opened in 2016 and sits on 13 acres of farmland. A beautiful location with a bucolic pond and stage for weddings or events. Owner Patrick Hillenbrand left the insurance industry to follow his passion for brewing. They have their own food truck serving German-oriented delicacies such as beer brats, pretzels, smoked tri-tip, and cheese boards.

Carbon is more susceptible to damage from direct impact than aluminum. Fortunately, carbon can be easily repaired, whereas aluminum frames cannot. Aluminum is cheaper.
